A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2014, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6 30, 2014, and for other purposes, namely:

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

SENATE

PAYMENT TO WIDOWS AND HEIRS OF DECEASED

MEMBERS OF CONGRESS

For a payment to Bonnie Englebardt Lautenberg,
widow of Frank R. Lautenberg, late a Senator from New
Jersey, \$174,000.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

For expense allowances of the Vice President,
\$18,760; the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
\$37,520; Majority Leader of the Senate, \$39,920; Minor-
ity Leader of the Senate, \$39,920; Majority Whip of the
Senate, \$9,980; Minority Whip of the Senate, \$9,980;
Chairmen of the Majority and Minority Conference Com-
mittees, \$4,690 for each Chairman; and Chairmen of the
Majority and Minority Policy Committees, \$4,690 for each
Chairman; in all, \$174,840.

2 WORKERS COMPENSATION PAYMENTS

3 SEC. 1. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of ex-
 4 pired appropriations which are subject to disbursement by
 5 the Secretary of the Senate shall be available to the Sec-
 6 retary of the Senate to make the deposit to the credit of
 7 the Employees' Compensation Fund required by section
 8 8147(b) of title 5, United States Code.

9 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
 10 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2014, and each
 11 fiscal year thereafter.

12 JOINT ITEMS

13 For Joint Committees, as follows:

14 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

15 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic
 16 Committee, \$4,203,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary
 17 of the Senate.

18 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

19 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
 20 Taxation, \$10,004,000, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-
 21 ministrative Officer of the House of Representatives.

22 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

23 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-
 24 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending
 25 Physician and his assistants, including:

1 (1) an allowance of \$2,175 per month to the
2 Attending Physician;

3 (2) an allowance of \$1,300 per month to the
4 Senior Medical Officer;

5 (3) an allowance of \$725 per month each to
6 three medical officers while on duty in the Office of
7 the Attending Physician;

8 (4) an allowance of \$725 per month to 2 assist-
9 ants and \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 as-
10 sistants on the basis heretofore provided for such as-
11 sistants; and

12 (5) \$2,603,000 for reimbursement to the De-
13 partment of the Navy for expenses incurred for staff
14 and equipment assigned to the Office of the Attend-
15 ing Physician, which shall be advanced and credited
16 to the applicable appropriation or appropriations
17 from which such salaries, allowances, and other ex-
18 penses are payable and shall be available for all the
19 purposes thereof, \$3,400,000, to be disbursed by the
20 Chief Administrative Officer of the House of Rep-
21 resentatives.

1 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Congres-
4 sional Accessibility Services, \$1,363,000, to be disbursed
5 by the Secretary of the Senate.

6 CAPITOL POLICE

7 SALARIES

8 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-
9 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay differential, and
10 Government contributions for health, retirement, social se-
11 curity, professional liability insurance, and other applica-
12 ble employee benefits, \$281,459,000, of which not more
13 than \$21,413,795 shall be for overtime, to be disbursed
14 by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee.

15 GENERAL EXPENSES

16 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, includ-
17 ing motor vehicles, communications and other equipment,
18 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons,
19 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic
20 services, stenographic services, personal and professional
21 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-
22 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances,
23 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-
24 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more
25 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the

1 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-
2 resentation and reception expenses, \$57,000,000, to be
3 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-
4 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-
5 sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police
6 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-
7 cal year 2014 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland
8 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-
9 land Security.

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AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER AMOUNTS BETWEEN SALARIES

AND GENERAL EXPENSES

13

SEC. 1001. During fiscal year 2014 and any suc-
14 ceeding fiscal year, the Capitol Police may transfer
15 amounts appropriated for the fiscal year between the cat-
16 egory for salaries and the category for general expenses,
17 upon the approval of the Committees on Appropriations
18 of the House of Representatives and Senate.

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FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION

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PAYMENTS

SEC. 1002. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of
22 expired United States Capitol Police appropriations shall
23 be available to the Capitol Police to make the deposit to
24 the credit of the Employees' Compensation Fund required
25 by section 8147(b) of title 5, United States Code.

1 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 1018 of the
2 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2003 (2 U.S.C.
3 1907) is amended by striking subsection (f).

4 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
5 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2014 and each
6 fiscal year thereafter.

7 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

8 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

9 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-
10 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional
11 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,868,000,
12 of which \$720,000 shall remain available until September
13 30, 2015: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be ex-
14 pended on the certification of the Executive Director of
15 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-
16 resentation and reception expenses.

17 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
20 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
21 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director
22 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-
23 cial representation and reception expenses, \$45,700,000.

1 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

2 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

3 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and
4 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law;
5 for surveys and studies in connection with activities under
6 the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary
7 expenses for the general and administrative support of the
8 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the
9 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Sen-
10 ate and House office buildings, and other facilities under
11 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including
12 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than
13 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses,
14 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-
15 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-
16 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$94,400,000, of which
17 \$599,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2018.

18 CAPITOL BUILDING

19 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
20 and operation of the Capitol, \$55,931,000, of which
21 \$14,900,000 shall remain available until September 30,
22 2018, and of which \$15,940,000 shall remain available
23 until expended solely for expenses related to rehabilitation
24 of the U.S. Capitol Dome.

1 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the
2 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be
3 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of
4 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited
5 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
6 \$110,827,000, of which \$24,300,000 shall remain avail-
7 able until September 30, 2018: *Provided*, That not more
8 than \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed
9 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available
10 for obligation during fiscal year 2014.

11 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

12 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
13 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
14 buildings and grounds, \$64,164,000 of which \$38,474,000
15 shall remain available until September 30, 2018.

16 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND SECURITY

17 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
18 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-
19 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-
20 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
21 operations, \$21,341,000, of which \$3,314,000 shall re-
22 main available until September 30, 2018.

23 BOTANIC GARDEN

24 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
25 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,

1 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-
2 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger
3 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-
4 mittee on the Library, \$12,136,000, of which \$2,082,000
5 shall remain available until September 30, 2018: *Provided*,
6 That of the amount made available under this heading,
7 the Architect of the Capitol may obligate and expend such
8 sums as may be necessary for the maintenance, care and
9 operation of the National Garden established under sec-
10 tion 307E of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act,
11 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Ar-
12 chitect of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee.

13 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

14 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
15 Capitol Visitor Center, \$21,276,000.

16 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

17 COLLECTION AND SALE OF RECYCLABLE MATERIALS

18 SEC. 1101. Section 1101(c) of Legislative Branch
19 Appropriations Act, 2009 (division G of Public Law 111–
20 8, 123 Stat. 823, 2 U.S.C. 1811 note) is amended by
21 striking “each of the fiscal years 2009 through 2013” and
22 inserting “fiscal year 2009 and each fiscal year there-
23 after”.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

1 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
2 not otherwise provided for, including development and
3 maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-
4 dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-
5 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of
6 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation
7 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the
8 Library; activities under the Civil Rights History Project
9 Act of 2009; preparation and distribution of catalog
10 records and other publications of the Library; hire or pur-
11 chase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the
12 Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly
13 chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the
14 Board, \$427,988,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000
15 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropria-
16 tion during fiscal year 2014, and shall remain available
17 until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter
18 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than
19 \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal
20 year 2014 and shall remain available until expended for
21 the development and maintenance of an international legal
22 information database and activities related thereto: *Pro-*
23 *vided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or

1 expend any funds derived from collections under the Act
2 of June 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for
3 obligation or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided*
4 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
5 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
6 less than \$6,350,000: *Provided further*, That of the total
7 amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex-
8 pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress,
9 in connection with official representation and reception ex-
10 penses for the Overseas Field Offices: *Provided further*,
11 That of the total amount appropriated, \$7,119,000 shall
12 remain available until expended for the digital collections
13 and educational curricula program.

14 COPYRIGHT OFFICE

15 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

16 For necessary expenses of the Copyright Office,
17 \$52,640,000, of which not more than \$28,029,000, to re-
18 main available until expended, shall be derived from collec-
19 tions credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2014
20 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Pro-*
21 *vided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-
22 pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-
23 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or
24 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That
25 not more than \$5,590,000 shall be derived from collections

1 during fiscal year 2014 under sections 111(d)(2),
2 119(b)(2), 803(e), 1005, and 1316 of such title: *Provided*
3 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
4 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
5 less than \$33,619,000: *Provided further*, That not more
6 than \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for
7 the maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute”
8 in the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the
9 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in
10 intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further*,
11 That not more than \$6,500 may be expended, on the cer-
12 tification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with
13 official representation and reception expenses for activities
14 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright
15 delegations, visitors, and seminars: *Provided further*, That
16 notwithstanding any provision of chapter 8 of title 17,
17 United States Code, any amounts made available under
18 this heading which are attributable to royalty fees and
19 payments received by the Copyright Office pursuant to
20 sections 111, 119, and chapter 10 of such title may be
21 used for the costs incurred in the administration of the
22 Copyright Royalty Judges program, with the exception of
23 the costs of salaries and benefits for the Copyright Royalty
24 Judges and staff under section 802(e).

1 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions
4 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
5 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-
6 tated Constitution of the United States of America,
7 \$108,841,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount
8 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection
9 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor
10 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued
11 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has
12 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House
13 Administration of the House of Representatives or the
14 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

15 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of
18 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.
19 135a), \$51,400,000: *Provided*, That of the total amount
20 appropriated, \$650,000 shall be available to contract to
21 provide newspapers to blind and physically handicapped
22 residents at no cost to the individual.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

2 REIMBURSABLE AND REVOLVING FUND ACTIVITIES

3 SEC. 1201. (a) IN GENERAL.—For fiscal year 2014,
4 the obligational authority of the Library of Congress for
5 the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed
6 \$185,579,000.

7 (b) ACTIVITIES.—The activities referred to in sub-
8 section (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities
9 that are funded from sources other than appropriations
10 to the Library in appropriations Acts for the legislative
11 branch.

12 (c) TRANSFER OF FUNDS.—During fiscal year 2014,
13 the Librarian of Congress may temporarily transfer funds
14 appropriated in this Act, under the heading “Library of
15 Congress”, under the subheading “Salaries and Ex-
16 penses”, to the revolving fund for the FEDLINK Program
17 and the Federal Research Program established under sec-
18 tion 103 of the Library of Congress Fiscal Operations Im-
19 provement Act of 2000 (Public Law 106–481; 2 U.S.C.
20 182c): *Provided*, That the total amount of such transfers
21 may not exceed \$1,900,000: *Provided further*, That the ap-
22 propriate revolving fund account shall reimburse the Li-
23 brary for any amounts transferred to it before the period
24 of availability of the Library appropriation expires.

TRANSFER AUTHORITY

1

2 SEC. 1202. (a) IN GENERAL.—Effective in fiscal year
3 2014 and each succeeding fiscal year, amounts appro-
4 priated for the Library of Congress may be transferred
5 during the fiscal year between any of the headings under
6 the heading “Library of Congress” upon the approval of
7 the Committees on Appropriations of the Senate and the
8 House of Representatives.

9 (b) LIMITATION.—Not more than 10 percent of the
10 total amount of funds appropriated to the account under
11 any heading under the heading “Library of Congress” in
12 the fiscal year may be transferred from that account by
13 all transfers made under subsection (a).

15

CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING

16

(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

17 For authorized printing and binding for the Congress
18 and the distribution of Congressional information in any
19 format; printing and binding for the Architect of the Cap-
20 itol; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly
21 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-
22 ized by law (section 902 of title 44, United States Code);
23 printing and binding of Government publications author-
24 ized by law to be distributed to Members of Congress; and
25 printing, binding, and distribution of Government publica-

1 tions authorized by law to be distributed without charge
2 to the recipient, \$79,736,000: *Provided*, That this appro-
3 priation shall not be available for paper copies of the per-
4 manent edition of the Congressional Record for individual
5 Representatives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates au-
6 thorized under section 906 of title 44, United States Code:
7 *Provided further*, That this appropriation shall be available
8 for the payment of obligations incurred under the appro-
9 priations for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years:
10 *Provided further*, That notwithstanding the 2-year limita-
11 tion under section 718 of title 44, United States Code,
12 none of the funds appropriated or made available under
13 this Act or any other Act for printing and binding and
14 related services provided to Congress under chapter 7 of
15 title 44, United States Code, may be expended to print
16 a document, report, or publication after the 27-month pe-
17 riod beginning on the date that such document, report,
18 or publication is authorized by Congress to be printed, un-
19 less Congress reauthorizes such printing in accordance
20 with section 718 of title 44, United States Code: *Provided*
21 *further*, That any unobligated or unexpended balances in
22 this account or accounts for similar purposes for preceding
23 fiscal years may be transferred to the Government Print-
24 ing Office revolving fund for carrying out the purposes of
25 this heading, subject to the approval of the Committees

1 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and
2 Senate.

3 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS

4 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

5 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-
7 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-
8 ing of Government publications and their distribution to
9 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-
10 cies, and designated depository and international exchange
11 libraries as authorized by law, \$31,500,000: *Provided*,
12 That amounts of not more than \$2,000,000 from current
13 year appropriations are authorized for producing and dis-
14 seminating congressional serial sets and other related pub-
15 lications for fiscal years 2012 and 2013 to depository and
16 other designated libraries: *Provided further*, That any un-
17 obligated or unexpended balances in this account or ac-
18 counts for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years may
19 be transferred to the Government Printing Office revolv-
20 ing fund for carrying out the purposes of this heading,
21 subject to the approval of the Committees on Appropria-
22 tions of the House of Representatives and Senate.

23 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

24 For payment to the Government Printing Office Re-
25 volving Fund, \$8,064,000 for information technology de-

1 velopment: *Provided*, That the Government Printing Of-
2 fice is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, with-
3 in the limits of funds available and in accordance with law,
4 and to make such contracts and commitments without re-
5 gard to fiscal year limitations as provided by section 9104
6 of title 31, United States Code, as may be necessary in
7 carrying out the programs and purposes set forth in the
8 budget for the current fiscal year for the Government
9 Printing Office Revolving Fund: *Provided further*, That
10 not more than \$7,500 may be expended on the certifi-
11 cation of the Public Printer in connection with official rep-
12 resentation and reception expenses: *Provided further*, That
13 the revolving fund shall be available for the hire or pur-
14 chase of not more than 12 passenger motor vehicles: *Pro-*
15 *vided further*, That expenditures in connection with travel
16 expenses of the advisory councils to the Public Printer
17 shall be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of
18 title 44, United States Code: *Provided further*, That the
19 revolving fund shall be available for temporary or intermit-
20 tent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United
21 States Code, but at rates for individuals not more than
22 the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for
23 level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of
24 such title: *Provided further*, That activities financed
25 through the revolving fund may provide information in any

1 format: *Provided further*, That the revolving fund and the
2 funds provided under the headings “Office of Super-
3 intendent of Documents” and “Salaries and Expenses”
4 may not be used for contracted security services at GPO’s
5 passport facility in the District of Columbia.

6 GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE

7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 For necessary expenses of the Government Account-
9 ability Office, including not more than \$12,500 to be ex-
10 pended on the certification of the Comptroller General of
11 the United States in connection with official representa-
12 tion and reception expenses; temporary or intermittent
13 services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States
14 Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily
15 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level IV of
16 the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of such title;
17 hire of one passenger motor vehicle; advance payments in
18 foreign countries in accordance with section 3324 of title
19 31, United States Code; benefits comparable to those pay-
20 able under sections 901(5), (6), and (8) of the Foreign
21 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), (6), and (8));
22 and under regulations prescribed by the Comptroller Gen-
23 eral of the United States, rental of living quarters in for-
24 eign countries, \$505,383,000: *Provided*, That in addition,
25 \$32,368,000 of payments received under sections 782,

1 3521, and 9105 of title 31, United States Code, shall be
 2 available without fiscal year limitation: *Provided further*,
 3 That this appropriation and appropriations for adminis-
 4 trative expenses of any other department or agency which
 5 is a member of the National Intergovernmental Audit
 6 Forum or a Regional Intergovernmental Audit Forum
 7 shall be available to finance an appropriate share of either
 8 Forum’s costs as determined by the respective Forum, in-
 9 cluding necessary travel expenses of non-Federal partici-
 10 pants: *Provided further*, That payments hereunder to the
 11 Forum may be credited as reimbursements to any appro-
 12 priation from which costs involved are initially financed.

13 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

14 ELECTRONIC SYSTEM FOR FILING BID PROTESTS

15 SEC. 1301. Section 3555(c) of title 31, United States
 16 Code, is amended—

17 (1) by inserting “(1)” after “(c)”; and

18 (2) by adding at the end the following new
 19 paragraph:

20 “(2) The Comptroller General may charge and
 21 collect fees for filing protests under this subchapter
 22 for the purpose of covering the costs of developing,
 23 maintaining, and operating an electronic system for
 24 filing such protests. The Comptroller General may

1 retain and use such fees immediately and without
2 fiscal year limitation for such purpose.”.

3 OPEN WORLD LEADERSHIP CENTER TRUST
4 FUND

5 For a payment to the Open World Leadership Center
6 Trust Fund for financing activities of the Open World
7 Leadership Center under section 313 of the Legislative
8 Branch Appropriations Act, 2001 (2 U.S.C. 1151),
9 \$4,000,000.

10 JOHN C. STENNIS CENTER FOR PUBLIC
11 SERVICE TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

12 For payment to the John C. Stennis Center for Pub-
13 lic Service Development Trust Fund established under
14 section 116 of the John C. Stennis Center for Public Serv-
15 ice Training and Development Act (2 U.S.C. 1105),
16 \$430,000.

17 TITLE II

18 GENERAL PROVISIONS

19 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

20 SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this
21 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private
22 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as
23 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-
24 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the

1 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate
2 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

3 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

4 SEC. 202. No part of any appropriation contained in
5 this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the
6 current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

7 RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

8 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position
9 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of
10 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate
11 of compensation or designation of any office or position
12 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-
13 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-
14 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-
15 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act
16 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-
17 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-
18 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of
19 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law
20 with respect thereto.

21 CONSULTING SERVICES

22 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation
23 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-
24 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States
25 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-

4 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

5 SEC. 208. None of the funds made available in this
6 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-

9 vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

10 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

11 SEC. 209. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),
12 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the
13 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict
14 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led
15 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-
16 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives
17 and Senate.

18 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or
19 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the
20 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the
21 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-
22 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-
23 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-
24 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the

1 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of
2 the Capitol.

3 OPEN WORLD LEADERSHIP CENTER

4 SEC. 210. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision
5 of law, the Librarian of Congress may transfer up to
6 \$6,000,000 from the funds described in section 1201 of
7 title I of this Act to the Open World Leadership Center
8 Trust Fund for use as provided under section 313 of the
9 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2001 (2 U.S.C.
10 1151).

11 (b) The Board of Trustees of the Open World Lead-
12 ership Center may, pursuant to its authority under section
13 313(c)(2) of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act,
14 2001 (2 U.S.C. 1151(c)(2)), solicit, accept, and use dona-
15 tions to the Open World Leadership Center Trust Fund
16 for the purpose of reimbursing the funds described in sub-
17 section (a) for any amounts transferred to the Trust Fund
18 under subsection (a).

19 This Act may be cited as the “Legislative Branch Ap-
20 propriations Act, 2014”.
