THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. Dr. Potter

there were some recent news reports within the last
month or so that suggested at least a correlation

between the rising incidents of HIV/AIDS in young

African American men and a large number of African

American men who have been incarcerated and

allegedly sexually assaulted while incarcerated.

Are you saying that those reports have no empirical
data to support that the rise in HIV/AIDS is a

result of sexual assault of inmates?

DR. POTTER: Sir, those articles that

I've seen rarely cite a source of their

information. And as far as I can tell through

trying to do an exhaustive review of the

literature, there are no carefully controlled

studies out there that do that. We have found in

one study, a very small study in North Carolina,

for example, in a recent MMWR that CDC puts out,

that among a group of four women who contracted HIV

in the community, not once you mix everything else in, that there was a tendency for those women to report that they have had a sexual relationship with a man who had a history of incarceration.

This history of incarceration was undefined, so we don't know whether these men might have had HIV before they were incarcerated, whether they got it after they were incarcerated, or whether they got it while they were incarcerated.

We simply do not have the research out there, sir, that makes the necessary links to make those data.
