Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century—Agreement: Senate resumed consideration of S. 1813, to reauthorize Federal-aid highway and highway safety construction programs, taking action on the following amendments proposed thereto:

Pages S1592-S1610

By 50 yeas to 47 nays (Vote No. 37), Bingaman/ Durbin Amendment No. 1759, to remove privatized highways from consideration in apportioning highway funding among States. **Pages S1593–94**, **S1595–96**

Brown (OH)/Merkley Amendment No. 1819, to close a loophole in current law which has allowed public infrastructure projects to be outsourced, to standardize the process by which the Secretary of Transportation responds to requests for waivers to applicable Buy America provisions, and to require the Secretary to report annually to Congress regarding such waivers. **Pages S1601-02**

Blunt/Casey Amendment No. 1540, to modify the section relating to off-system bridges.

Merkley Modified Amendment No. 1814, to provide exemptions from requirements for certain farm vehicles. Pages S1602-03

Klobuchar/Roberts Amendment No. 1617, to amend the Motor Carrier Safety Improvement Act of 1999 to provide clarification regarding the applicability of exemptions relating to the transportation of agricultural commodities and farm supplies.

Rejected:

By 30 yeas to 67 nays (Vote No. 36), Coats (for DeMint) Amendment No. 1756, to return to the individual States maximum discretionary authority and fiscal responsibility for all elements of the national surface transportation systems that are not within the direct purview of the Federal Government.

By 41 yeas to 57 nays (Vote No. 38), Roberts Modified Amendment No. 1826, of a perfecting nature. (Pursuant to the order of Wednesday, March 7, 2012, the amendment having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

Pages S1593, S1596-97

By 49 yeas to 49 nays (Vote No. 39), Stabenow Modified Amendment No. 1812, to prevent a tax increase on American businesses and to provide certainty to job creators by extending certain expiring tax credits relating to energy. (Pursuant to the order of Wednesday, March 7, 2012, the amendment having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.) Pages S1597-99

By 26 yeas to 72 nays (Vote No. 40), Coats (for DeMint) Amendment No. 1589, to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to terminate certain energy tax subsidies and lower the corporate income tax rate. (Pursuant to the order of Wednesday, March 7, 2012, the amendment having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

Pages S1593, S1599-S1600

By 51 yeas to 47 nays (Vote No. 41), Menendez Amendment No. 1782, to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to modify certain tax credits relating to energy. (Pursuant to the order of Wednesday, March 7, 2012, the amendment having failed to achieve 60 affirmative votes, was not agreed to.)

By 28 yeas to 70 nays (Vote No. 42), Coats/Lugar Amendment No. 1517, to modify the apportionment formula to ensure that the percentage of apportioned funds received by a State is the same as the percentage of total gas taxes paid by the State. **Page S1601**

By 30 yeas to 68 nays (Vote No. 43), Portman/ Coburn Amendment No. 1736, to free States to spend gas taxes on their transportation priorities.

Pages S1593, S1604

By 12 yeas to 86 nays (Vote No. 45), Portman Amendment No. 1742, to allow States to permit nonhighway uses in rest areas along any highway.

McCain Modified Amendment No. 1669, to enhance the natural quiet and safety of airspace of the Grand Canyon National Park. Page S1593

Corker Amendment No. 1810, to ensure that the aggregate amount made available for transportation projects for a fiscal year does not exceed the estimated amount available for those projects in the Highway Trust Fund for the fiscal year. Page S1593

Coats (for Alexander) Amendment No. 1779, to make technical corrections to certain provisions relating to overflights of National Parks. Page S1593

During consideration of this measure today, Senate also took the following action:

By 40 yeas to 58 nays (Vote No. 44), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn, not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected the motion to waive pursuant to section 904 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 and section 4(g)(3) of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010, with respect to Corker Modified Amendment No. 1785, to lower the FY13 discretionary budget authority cap as set in the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 by \$11,000,000,000 in order to offset the general fund transfers to the Highway Trust Fund. Subsequently, the Chair sustained a point of order against Corker Modified Amendment No. 1785, as being in violation of section 306 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

A unanimous-consent request was granted permitting Senator Ayotte to change her yea vote to a nay vote on Vote No. 28 changing the outcome of the vote to 43 yeas to 55 nays relative to Vitter Amendment No. 1535. Page S1606

A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing for further consideration of the bill at approximately 10:30 a.m., on Wednesday, March 14, 2012; with the time until 11:30 a.m. equally divided between the two Leaders, or their designees; that upon the disposition of the bill, Senate proceed to a period of morning business until 2 p.m.

Groh Nomination-Agreement: A unanimousconsent-time agreement was reached providing that at 2 p.m., on Wednesday, March 14, 2012, Senate resume consideration of the nomination of Gina Marie Groh, of West Virginia, to be United States District Judge for the Northern District of West Virginia, and that there be 30 minutes for debate equally divided prior to the vote on the motion to invoke cloture on the nomination.
