Do You Have A Plan To Protect Your Products From Intellectual Property Theft In China?

A 2005 U.S. Patent and Trademark Office study found that 85 percent of SMEs who export do *not realize* their U.S. patents/trademarks do not protect them overseas. For example, if you enter the China market with your product but don't register your mark at China's Trademark Office, one of your competitors, distributors or partners may be able to register the trademark before you and bar you from manufacturing or selling your products with your mark in China.
