OSHA Training Institute (OTI) Education Centers

The OSHA Training Institute (OTI) Education Centers are a national network of nonprofit organizations authorized by OSHA to deliver occupational safety and health training to private sector workers, supervisors, and employers. These organizations are selected through a competitive process based upon their occupational safety and health training experience. The OTI Education Centers offer courses and seminars on a variety of safety and health topics. They also support the OSHA training mission through other safety and health programs, including community outreach efforts, courses offered in Spanish, and various youth initiatives. The OTI Education Centers help to ensure safe and healthful working conditions for working men and women by providing training on hazard recognition and avoidance to workers, employers, and safety professionals.

Program Background

The OTI Education Centers Program was created to meet the growing demand for private sector training received at the OSHA Training Institute (OTI) in Arlington Heights, Illinois. While OTI provides training designed for Federal and State compliance officers, and State consultation program staff, the OTI Education Centers provide training for private sector personnel and personnel from federal agencies other than OSHA. The program began with four organizations selected in 1992.

Program Growth

OSHA continues to add new organizations to the program in order to increase the availability of OSHA training for the private sector. There are currently 25 OTI Education Centers, comprised of 44 member organizations, located throughout the country, including at least one in each OSHA Region. The program features permanent training locations in 28 of the 48 most populous major metropolitan areas. The number of participants trained through the OTI Education Centers has increased every year since the program's inception. Between FY 2001 and FY 2010, more than 225,000 participants were trained through the OTI Education Centers.

Who Should Attend Courses?

OTI Education Centers offer training courses designed for workers, employers, supervisors and managers. Training is offered through an open enrollment format and on a contract basis for organizations within OSHA's jurisdiction.
