Selective Service Kicks Off Air Show Season

Selective Service kicked off the 4th year of its air show season beginning with two air shows back to back: Andrews Air Force Base's Joint Service Open House – Air Show, May 16 – 17, 2009, and the 2009 Bethpage Federal Credit Union New York Air Show at Jones Beach State Park, May 23 – 24, 2009. Set against the backdrop of the patriotism of air shows, the program is an essential part of Selective Service's awareness program for promoting its registration message.

At the nation's capital, registration for 19-year-old men turning 20 years old continues to drop for Washington, DC, and Maryland, but remains stable in Virginia. According to the statistical compilations of Calendar Year 2008, at 60 percent, Washington, DC, ranked the fourth lowest in the country for the 19-year-old age group of men who registered with Selective Service, dropping six points from Calendar Year 2007. At 83 percent, Maryland dropped one point from Calendar Year 2007, still ranking below the national average at 87 percent

for Calendar Year 2008. Virginia, on the other hand, rated at nearly 100 percent, unchanged from Calendar Year 2007, for the 19-year-old age group, due to state legislation supporting registration. Statistics for New York showed a significant drop of 12 points in registration compliance for the 19-year-old age group. In Calendar 2007, at 77 percent, New York fell behind the national average of 91 percent for 19-year-old men, and ranked fifth from the bottom, at 65 percent, in Calendar Year 2008.

Major Michael DePiro, U.S. Army Reserve, said that Selective Service Reserve Force Officers (RFOs) from the Richmond, VA, detachment manned the Selective Service exhibit booth at the Andrews Air Show over the Armed Forces Day weekend.

DePiro stated that Selective Service's booth had a steady flow of traffic across the two days. He added, "Most people were interested in the premiums we had on hand, which gave us the opportunity to explain our agency and its mission. I also had to explain what we did to a handful of curious NATO (Bulgarian) military officers, as well as the usual student/ parent/interested citizen mix; so, I'm newly convinced of the usefulness of keeping a knowledgeable RFO close by to handle complex inquiries about our agency." The booth attendants also assisted with a handful of online registrations and verifications through the use of laptop connection to the Selective Service's Web site.

New York City Detachment Commander Lieutenant Colonel Miles Gilmore said that several thousand air show attendees stopped by the Selective Service booth, received a brochure, or asked a question. director, ATF agent, financial services president, airline pilot, and more.


The training went exceptionally well and the Region III staff provided professional guidance throughout.

The usual myths were all corrected: females must also register, a draft is about to start, registration means enlistment in the U.S. Armed Forces, and Selective Service belongs to the Department of Defense. Much information was exchanged; and all enjoyed the seminar.
