- Work on future iterations of VVSG is ongoing
 - Must keep pace with technology
 - Must address security issues



VVSG -- Moving Forward

- Future iterations
 - Security software & wireless
 - VVPAT
 - Test suites
 - More forms of independent verification



VVSG -- Moving Forward

- Modular updates not practical
 - Multiple iterations may create confusion
 - Based on feedback from stakeholders
 - Practical & fiscal considerations-publishing costs, board review & approval
- Larger updates, less frequent
- Technical amendments
- Certification program



TGDC's Role

- Increased involvement
- Integrate efforts of Standards Board and Board of Advisors
- EAC staff will participate in subgroup teleconferences
- Looking to TGDC for information about systems that have no standards
- Congress wants to know: How do we better serve military and overseas voters?



EAC Certification

- Getting certification program up and running a top priority
- Process must be transparent no stumbles out of the starting gate
- EAC will attend pre-assessments for voting system test labs



Beyond the VVSG

- VVSG only half of the equation
- Voting is a human exercise
- Training and support must accompany VVSG
 - Election Management Guidelines
