
#### Alaska's Russian Jack-Federal Prison to Fairly Proper

It is not often that an alleged bootlegger and convicted murderer gets an elementary school, a development district, a golf course, and a park named after him—except for Jacob Marunenko, also known as Russian Jack.

In March 1937, Russian Jack was in a cabin with another homesteader, Milton Hamilton. Fueled by alcohol, he and Hamilton began to argue. Shortly after, Russian Jack was severely beaten and Hamilton was dead. Russian Jack was tried for manslaughter, claiming self defense. Given the bruised sternum, two broken ribs, a badly bruised face, eyes swollen shut, a broken nose, broken teeth, and a fractured skull, it seemed a reasonable defense. Russian Jack was still convicted of manslaughter on January 22, 1938, and served two-and-a-half years at the Federal prison in Washington State. After returning to Alaska, he kept a very low Federal profile, resurfacing only to pursue naturalization. NARA at Anchorage holds documentary evidence from both the trial and his naturalization process. He received his citizenship in 1954, at age 70.

So, how does a convicted criminal beget the kind of honors usually reserved for the pillars of society? Alaska is just kind of like that. Russian Jack had a homestead that he'd been trying to improve about five miles from Anchorage. "Out near Russian Jack's" was just part of the directional vernacular, due to the man's notoriety. It became the unofficial name of that district and through time, the official name. The conventional population insists that things are not named after the man, but the district in which it resides. The more amused set kindly does not point out that the district got its name after the man himself.
