Potential Government Shutdown

To the Men and Women of the United States Air Force:

We remain hopeful that a government shutdown will be averted. However, prudent management requires that the Department of Defense plans for an orderly shutdown should Congress be unable to pass a funding bill before our current funding expires on April 8. We fully understand that a shutdown is extremely disruptive to our mission, to you, and to your families. Therefore, the Air Force will continue to conduct activities in support of our National security-particularly, urgent operational requirements in Afghanistan, Iraq, Libya, and Japan, and other immediate military needs.

In a government shutdown, active duty military members will continue to report for duty, although they will experience disruptions in their pay. Civilians who are employed to accomplish functions that are considered necessary to national security, safety of human life, and protection of property will be "excepted" from furlough if their function cannot be accomplished by a military member. Those military members and "excepted" civilian employees will continue to report to work. Civilian employees who are employed for other, non-excepted functions will be furloughed until an appropriations bill or continuing resolution is enacted. Unique rules apply to the Guard and Reserve, and more information will follow from DoD.

An employee's designation as "non-excepted" says nothing about the quality of their work or the value of their service. These designations reflect a careful interpretation of the activities allowable under the law without an appropriations bill

However, prudent management requires that we plan for an orderly shutdown should Congress be unable to pass a funding bill before our current funding expires on April 8.

"The President and the secretary know that the uncertainty of the current situation puts federal employees in a difficult position, and are very much aware that a shutdown would impose hardships on our military and civilian personnel as well as our military families. As we approach the expiration of the current continuing resolution, we will provide you with updated information as soon as it becomes available."

CSAF discusses 'Don't Ask-Don't Tell' repeal, budget with Congress

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz spoke to members of the House of Representatives on the training Airmen will receive in preparation for allowing openly gay and lesbian members to serve. According to a security agreement between the U.S. and Iraq, USF-I must return all bases to the government of Iraq by Dec. 31. As Army units reposture, Air Force leaders want to make sure the movement of Airmen is synchronized to those plans.

Air Force chief information officer discusses way ahead for cyberoperations

The Air Force chief information officer, Lt. Gen. William T. Lord, emphasized that despite recent budgetary constraints, the Air Force needs to remain vigilant in cybersecurity, applications management and compatibility to new devices in order to ensure military networks are available in the fight for U.S. and coalition partners.

DOD to drop Social Security numbers from ID cards

Beginning in June, when current cards expire, they will be replaced with new cards having a DOD identification number replacing the SSN. The DOD identification number is a unique 10-digit number that is assigned to every person with a direct relationship with the department. An 11-digit DOD benefits number also will appear on the cards of those people eligible for DOD benefits. The first nine digits are common to a sponsor, and the last two digits will identify a specific person within the sponsor's family.

Sexual Assault Awareness Month encourages bystander intervention

The Air Force began observing Sexual Assault Awareness Month starting April 1. The Defense Department theme for the month is "Hurts one. Affects all," which is designed to point out how sexual assault affects not only the victim, but the department as well. The Air Force's slogan supporting the DOD theme is "Real Wingmen Act!" emphasizing the duty of all Airmen to intervene whenever they see questionable behavior.

AIR FORCE HERITAGE TO HORIZONS

This Week in Air Force History

April 10, 1959 – The Northrop T-38 Talon flew for the first time.

April 11, 1966 – Airman 1st Class William H. Pitsenbarger loses his life while saving the lives of nine U.S. Army Soldiers in Cam My, South Vietnam. He received the Air Force Cross posthumously; later in 2000, his Air Force Cross was upgraded to the Medal of Honor.

April 12, 1945 – Staff Sgt. Henry Erwin saves a B-29 and its crew from a malfunctioned phosphorus bomb. These actions resulted in earning a Medal of Honor.

April 12, 1951 - Sgt. Billie Beach shot down two MIGs during an assault on Yalu River bridges in Korea.

April 12, 1966 – Strategic Air Command B–52 bombers struck targets in North Vietnam for the first time. They hit a supply route in the Mu Gia Pass about 85 miles north of the border.

April 14, 1986 – U.S. forces launched Operation Eldorado Canyon, a retaliatory bombing raid in response to terrorist activities supported by Libyan leader Muammar Qadhafi.
