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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announces the availability of funds to expand and enhance grant activities funded under the Primary and Behavioral Health Care Integration (PBHCI) grant announcement. I. FUNDING OPPORTUNITY DESCRIPTION

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) announces the availability of funds to expand and enhance grant activities funded under the Primary and Behavioral Health Care Integration (PBHCI) grant announcement. The purpose of this one-year supplemental award is to expand the use of interoperable electronic health records to increase the grantees' abilities to quickly identify both the behavioral health and primary care needs of their patients. It supports the grantees' provision of high quality clinical services that respond to the complete health care needs of their patients. As a part of the Draft National Prevention Strategy, it paves the way for the delivery of prevention services that link primary care and behavioral health needs, and allows the timely tracking of outcomes. The exchange of health information between PBHCI behavioral health providers and physical health providers, and the documenting and tracking of preventive health efforts across both settings, will improve the overall health of patients.

This supplement supports the PBHCI program for improving the physical health status of people with serious mental illnesses and substance abuse and co-occurring disorders. It facilitates the integration of primary care services with the care delivered in publicly funded community mental health and other community-based behavioral health settings. HHS's expectation is that individuals with serious mental illnesses and substance abuse problems will show improvement in their overall health status through a coordinated approach to prevention and treatment.

In the past, the specialty behavioral health system has often operated independently from the broader health system and differed in the type and scope of information technology used. Through this initiative, SAMHSA will work to increase the use of interoperable, certified electronic health record systems so that Americans with behavioral health conditions can benefit from the advantages afforded by the existence of an integrated health record.

This supplement supports SAMHSA Strategic Initiative #5: Health Reform. Additionally, the supplement supports SAMHSA Strategic Initiative #6: Health Information Technology, by increasing the use of interoperable electronic health records.

PBHCI HIT grants are authorized under Section 520A of the Public Health Service Act, as amended. This announcement addresses Health People Mental Health and Mental Disorders Topic Area HP 2020-MHMD and/or Substance Abuse Topic Area HP 2020-SA.

2. EXPECTATIONS

SAMHSA's grants are designed to address gaps in substance abuse and mental health prevention and treatment services and increase the ability of States, units of local government, American Indian/Alaska Native Tribes and tribal organizations, and community- and faith-based organizations to help specific populations or geographic

areas with serious, emerging physical health, mental health and substance abuse problems.

2.1 Required Activities

Supplemental grants funds to the PBHCI Grantees must be used to support both of the following activities (A and B):

- A. Electronic Health Records (EHR)
 - Development or enhancement of a certified Electronic Health Record System; and/or
 - Development to achieving Stage 1EHR meaningful Use Specification
- B. Health Information Exchange (HIE)
 - Development and implementation to participate in appropriate health information exchange (local, regional or state); and
 - Development and implementation to use the exchange of health information to achieve improved health outcomes for patients.

By the end of this 1-year supplement, grantees will be expected to demonstrate the ability to:

- Submit at least 40% of prescriptions electronically (as allowable given statespecific laws regarding the use of e-prescriptions for controlled substances);
- Receive structured lab results electronically;
- Share a standard continuity of care record between behavioral health providers and physical health providers; and
- Participate in the regional extension center program.

Technical assistance on development and implementation of EHRs and HIEs will be provided to grantees by the SAMHSA/HRSA Center for Integrated Health Solutions (under cooperative agreement with the National Council for Community Behavioral Health Care).

SAMHSA strongly encourages all grantees to provide a smoke-free workplace and to promote abstinence from all tobacco products (except in regard to accepted tribal traditions and practices).

2.2 Data Collection and Performance Measurement

All SAMHSA grantees are required to collect and report certain data so that SAMHSA can meet its obligations under the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) Modernization Act of 2010. You must document your ability to collect and report the required data in "<u>Section D:</u> Evaluation" of your application. Grantees will be required to report performance on the following performance indicators:

- The <u>number of people</u> in the mental health and related workforce trained in mental health-related practices/activities that are consistent with the goals of the grant
- The <u>number of organizations</u> making changes to accountability mechanisms in order to improve mental health-related practices/activities that are consistent with the goals of the grant
- The <u>number of communities</u> that establish management information/information technology system links across multiple agencies in order to share service population and service delivery data as a result of the grant

This information will be gathered using the Transformation Accountability System (TRAC), which can be found at https://www.cmhs-gpra.samhsa.gov, along with instructions for completing it. Hard copies are available in the application kits available by calling SAMHSA's Office of Communications at 1-877-SAMHSA7 [TDD: 1-800-487-4889]. Data will be collected quarterly after entry of annual goals. Data are to be entered into a web-based system supported by quarterly written fiscal reports and written annual reports. Technical assistance for the web-based data entry, fiscal and annual report generation is available.

The collection of these data will enable CMHS to report on the National Outcome Measures (NOMs), which have been defined by SAMHSA as key priority areas relating to mental health. Performance data will be reported to the public, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and Congress as part of SAMHSA's budget request.

2.3 Performance Assessment

Grantee must periodically review the performance data they report to SAMHSA (as required above) and assess their progress and use this information to improve management of their grant projects. The assessment should be designed to help you determine whether you are achieving the goals, objectives and outcomes you intend to achieve and whether adjustments need to be made to your project. You will be required to report on your progress achieved, barriers encountered, and efforts to overcome these barriers in a performance assessment report to be submitted quarterly.

At a minimum, your performance assessment should include the required performance measures identified above. You may also consider outcome and process questions, such as the following:

Outcome Questions:

- What was the effect of the infrastructure developed on key outcome goals?
- What program/contextual factors were associated with outcomes?
- What individual factors were associated with outcomes?,
- How durable were the effects?

As appropriate, describe how the data, including outcome data, will be analyzed by racial/ethnic group or other demographic factors to assure that appropriate populations are being served and that disparities in services and outcomes are minimized.

Process Questions:

- How closely did implementation match the plan?
- What types of changes were made to the originally proposed plan?
- What led to the changes in the original plan?
- What effect did the changes have on the planned intervention and performance assessment?
- Who provided (program staff) what services (modality, type, intensity, duration), to whom (individual characteristics), in what context (system, community), and at what cost (facilities, personnel, dollars)?
- What strategies were used to maintain fidelity to the evidence-based practice or intervention across providers over time?
- How many individuals were reached through the program?

No more than 20% of the total grant award may be used for data collection, performance measurement, and performance assessment, e.g., activities required in <u>Sections</u> <u>I-2.2</u> and <u>2.3</u> above.

II. AWARD INFORMATION

1. AWARD AMOUNT

It is expected that up to \$11,200,000 will be available to fund up to 56 awards in FY 2011. Awards are expected to be approximately \$200,000 in total costs (direct and indirect) for up to 1 year. Proposed budgets cannot exceed the allowable amount.

Funding estimates for this program are based on an annualized Continuing Resolution (CR) for FY 2011 and subject to finalizing the FY 2011 operating plan. Funding is dependent upon the availability of resources.

2. FUNDING MECHANISM

Awards will be made as cooperative agreements.

Role of Grantee:

- Comply with all terms and conditions of the award and satisfactorily perform activities to achieve the program goals;
- Consult with and accept guidance and respond to requests for information from the Government Project Officer, the Grants Management Specialist, and other relevant SAMHSA and Federal staff;
- Agree to provide SAMHSA with all required data;
- Respond to requests for information from SAMHSA and other Federal partners;
- Support and participate in grantee meetings;
- Produce required SAMHSA reports;
- Keep Federal program staff informed of emerging issues, developments, and problems; and
- Submit quarterly reports to the GPO with updates on progress to date (with regards to meeting proposal goals), details cost breakouts of activities, and obstacles encountered. Quarterly report format will be provided upon award.

Role of SAMHSA Staff:

- Review and approve sub-recipient contracts and awards;
- Work cooperatively with grantees to ensure that the project continues after the funding period ends;
- Consult with the PBHCI grant investigators on all phases of the project development and implementation to ensure accomplishment of the goals;
- Approve key staff (e.g., project director, supervisors) responsible for the management,
- leadership, and oversight of the grants;
- Review critical project activities for conformity to the mission of the PBHCI grant program;
- Provide guidance on project design and components, as needed;
- Participate in policy and steering groups or related work groups;
- Approve data collection plans;
- Recommend outside consultants, if needed;
- Facilitate collaboration, as needed; and
- Assume overall responsibility for monitoring the conduct and progress of the PBHCI grant program, review semi-annual reports, conduct site visits, and make recommendations to SAMHSA regarding continuation funding.

III. ELIGIBILITY INFORMATION

1. ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS

Eligibility for this funding opportunity is limited to current PBHCI grantees. SAMHSA believes that the most effective way to accomplish the goals of this one-year supplemental program is to limit eligibility to current PBHCI grantees since they have the infrastructure in place to quickly and effectively initiate the activities required.

Since supplemental funding is for one-year, it is critical that the applicant be able to quickly and effectively initiate the activities required by the cooperative agreement.

2. COST SHARING and MATCH REQUIREMENTS

Cost sharing/match are not required in this program.

3. OTHER

Additional Eligibility Requirements

You must use the HHS 5161-1 application package and comply with the formatting requirements in <u>Appendix A</u> of this document and certain program requirements, such as provisions relating to participant protection and the protection of human subjects specified in <u>Appendix F</u> of this document.

2.2 Required Application Components

Applications must include the following 11 required application components:

- Face Page SF 424 v2 is the face page. This form is part of the HHS 5161-1. [Note: Applicants must provide a Dun and Bradstreet (DUNS) number to apply for a grant or cooperative agreement from the Federal Government. SAMHSA applicants are required to provide their DUNS number on the face page of the application. Obtaining a DUNS number is easy and there is no charge. To expedite the process, let Dun and Bradstreet know that you are a public/private nonprofit organization getting ready to submit a Federal grant application. In addition, you must be registered in the Central Contractor Registration (CCR) prior to submitting an application and maintain an active CCR registration during the grant funding period. REMINDER: CCR registration expires each year and must be updated annually. Additional information on the Central Contractor Registration (CCR) is available at http://www.ccr.gov].
- **Abstract** Your total abstract must not be longer than 35 lines. It should include the project name, population(s) to be served (demographics and clinical characteristics), strategies/interventions, project goals and measurable objectives, including the number of people to be served annually and throughout the lifetime of the project, etc. In the first five lines or less of your abstract, write a summary of your project that can be used, if your project is funded, in publications, reporting to Congress, or press releases.
- **Table of Contents** Include page numbers for each of the major sections of your application and for each attachment.

- **Budget Form** Use SF 424A, which is part of the HHS 5161-1. Fill out Sections B, C, and E of the SF 424A. If you are requesting supplemental funding for one year, complete Section B only. A sample budget and justification is included in <u>Appendix E</u> of this document.
- **Project Narrative and Supporting Documentation** The Project Narrative describes your project. It consists of Sections A through D. Sections A-D together may not be longer than 25 pages. (Remember that if your Project Narrative starts on page 5 and ends on page 30, it is 26 pages long, not 25 pages.) More detailed instructions for completing each section of the Project Narrative are provided in "Section V Application Review Information" of this document.

The Supporting Documentation provides additional information necessary for the review of your application. This supporting documentation should be provided immediately following your Project Narrative in Sections E through G. There are no page limits for these sections, except for Section E, Biographical Sketches/Job Descriptions. Additional instructions for completing these sections are included in <u>Section V</u> under "Supporting Documentation." Supporting documentation should be submitted in black and white (no color).

- Attachments 1 through 3 In your application, include the attachments below. Use only the attachments listed below. Please label the attachments as: Attachment 1, Attachment 2, etc.
- Attachment 1: Data Collection Instruments/Interview Protocols If you are using standardized data collection instruments/interview protocols, you do <u>not</u> need to include these in your application. Instead, provide a Web link to the appropriate instrument/protocol. If the data collection instrument(s) or interview protocol(s) is/are not standardized, you must include a copy in Attachment 1.
- Attachment 2: Sample Consent Forms
- Attachment 3: Letter to the SSA (if applicable; see <u>Appendix C</u> of this document)
- **Project/Performance Site Location(s) Form** The purpose of this form is to collect location information on the site(s) where work funded under this grant announcement will be performed.
- Assurances Non-Construction Programs. You must read the list of assurances provided on the SAMHSA Web site and check the box marked 'I Agree' before signing the face page (SF 424 v2) of the application.
- **Certifications** You must read the list of certifications provided on the SAMHSA Web site and check the box marked 'I Agree' before signing the face page (SF 424 v2) of the application.

- **Disclosure of Lobbying Activities** You must submit Standard Form LLL found in the HHS 5161-1. Federal law prohibits the use of appropriated funds for publicity or propaganda purposes or for the preparation, distribution, or use of the information designed to support or defeat legislation pending before the Congress or State legislatures. This includes "grass roots" lobbying, which consists of appeals to members of the public suggesting that they contact their elected representatives to indicate their support for or opposition to pending legislation or to urge those representatives to vote in a particular way. If no lobbying is to be disclosed, mark N/A on the form. All applicants must sign the form.
- **Checklist** Use the Checklist found in HHS 5161-1. The Checklist ensures that you have obtained the proper signatures, assurances and certifications. If you are submitting a paper application, the Checklist should be the last page.

2.3 Application Formatting Requirements

Applications must comply with basic application requirements. Failure to comply with these requirements may affect the ability of your application to be funded. See <u>Appendix A</u> of this document for a list of the specific formatting requirements and screen out criteria for SAMHSA grant applications.

3. APPLICATION SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applications are due by **June 20, 2011**. SAMHSA provides two options for submission of grant applications: 1) electronic submission, **or** 2) paper submission. Hard copy applications are due by **5:00 PM** (Eastern Time). Electronic applications are due by **11:59 PM** (Eastern Time). **Applications may be shipped using only, Federal Express (FedEx), United Parcel Service (UPS), or the United States Postal Service (USPS).** You will be notified by postal mail that your application has been received.

Note: If you use the USPS, you must use Express Mail.

SAMHSA will not accept or consider any applications that are hand carried or sent by facsimile.

Submission of Electronic Applications

Please refer to <u>Appendix B</u> for "Guidance for Electronic Submission of Applications." If you plan to submit electronically through Grants.gov it is very important that you read thoroughly the application information provided in <u>Appendix B</u> "Guidance for Electronic Submission of Applications."

Submission of Paper Applications

If you are submitting a paper application, you must submit an original application and 2 copies (including attachments). The original and copies must not be bound and nothing

should be attached, stapled, folded, or pasted. Do not use staples, paper clips, or fasteners. You may use rubber bands.

In Sections A-D of the Project Narrative, you must clearly describe how you intend to use grant funds. Sections A-D of your application may not exceed 25 pages.

Section A: Progress to Date (25 points)

- Describe your organization's experience with the existing grant program. Report on accomplishments to date. Discuss any obstacles/problems that have been encountered and actions taken towards their resolution.
- Describe your day-to-day communications with referral sources, other providers, and consumers.

- Describe your organization's current capacity around HIT, if it exists. Do you
 have an electronic health record? If so, is your system interoperable with general
 medical/primary care systems? If partnering with a primary care provider, do they
 have an electronic health record? Explain how your current HIT infrastructure
 enhances or limits the quality of care your organization provides, particular for
 your PBHCI program. Explain how it enhances or limits your efficiency as an
 organization. What are the PRIMARY barriers (if any) to your implementation of
 HIT in the context of your PBHCI program?

Section B: Proposed Approach for Program Expansion/Enhancement (35 points)

- Describe your plans to expand or enhance your existing program and how your planned activities will meet the expected goals and objectives of the supplemental program. Clearly describe all activities that will be supported with the supplemental grant funds. Explain how this supplement will enhance the quality of care in the services you provide. Describe how the generation of quality measures may impact care.
- Discuss how the supplemental activities will be integrated into the ongoing project and/or your organization as a whole.
- Describe roles and responsibilities of collaborating organizations, where applicable. Where applicable, provide the projected number of persons to be served, along with a clinical and demographic description of the projected number of persons to be served.
- Explain how you will address the following factors influencing the adoption of an EHR system
 - Organizational Factors (i.e., redesign of workflows, capabilities of your practice, day-to-day operations of your practice, etc.)
 - Provider Training and Competence Factors (i.e., disparity in IT dexterity among clinicians and staff)
 - Provider-Patient Relationship Factors (i.e., immediate versus long term impact on care)
 - Technical Factors Require Additional Staff or Consultants (i.e., support, maintenance, and operation of the system)

Section D: Evaluation (15 points)

(Note: If there is other information about your proposed project that you deem important to the application, discuss it in the appropriate section(s) above, while staying within the 25 page limit.)

NOTE: Although the budget for the proposed project is not an evaluation criterion, the review group will be asked to comment on the appropriateness of the budget after the merits of the application have been considered.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION

Section E: Job Descriptions and Biographical Sketches

- Include a biographical sketch for the Project Director and other key positions. Each sketch should be 2 pages or less. If the person has not been hired, include a position description and/or a letter of commitment with a current biographical sketch from the individual.
- Include job descriptions for key personnel. Job descriptions should be no longer than 1 page each.
- Information on what should be included in biographical sketches and job descriptions can be found on page 22, Item 6, in the Program Narrative section of the HHS 5161-1 instruction page, available on the SAMHSA Web site.

Section F: Budget Justification, Existing Resources, Other Support. You must provide a narrative justification of the items included in your proposed budget, as well as a description of existing resources and other support you expect to receive for the proposed project. Use SF 424, which is included in the HHS 5161-1. Fill out Sections B, C, and E. If you are requesting funding for one year, complete Section B only. An illustration of a budget and narrative justification is included in <u>Appendix E</u> of this document.

Section G: Confidentiality and SAMHSA Participant Protection/Human Subjects: You must describe procedures relating to Confidentiality, Participant Protection and the Protection of Human Subjects Regulations in Section G of your application. Problems with confidentiality, participant protection, and protection of human subjects identified during peer review of your application may result in the need to request additional information and may delay funding. See <u>Appendix F</u> for guidelines on these requirements.

2. REVIEW AND SELECTION PROCESS

SAMHSA applications are peer-reviewed according to the evaluation criteria listed above.

Decisions to fund a grant are based on:

- the strengths and weaknesses of the application as identified by peer reviewers;
- when the individual award is over \$150,000, approval by the Center for Mental Health Services'National Advisory Council;
- availability of funds; and
- equitable distribution of awards in terms of geography (including urban, rural and remote settings) and balance among populations of focus and program size.

1. AWARD NOTICES

You will receive a letter from SAMHSA through postal mail that describes the general results of the review of your application, including the score that your application received.

If you are approved for funding, you will receive an **additional** notice through postal mail, the Notice of Award (NoA), signed by SAMHSA's Grants Management Officer. The Notice of Award is the sole obligating document that allows you to receive Federal funding for work on the grant project.

2. ADMINISTRATIVE AND NATIONAL POLICY REQUIREMENTS

- If your application is funded, you must comply with all terms and conditions of the grant award. SAMHSA's standard terms and conditions are available on the SAMHSA Web site at http://www.samhsa.gov/grants/management.aspx.

Appendix A – Checklist for Formatting Requirements and Screen Out Criteria for SAMHSA Grant Applications

SAMHSA's goal is to review all applications submitted for grant funding. However, this goal must be balanced against SAMHSA's obligation to ensure equitable treatment of applications. For this reason, SAMHSA has established certain formatting requirements for its applications. Failure to adhere to these requirements, may impact the ability of your application to be funded.

- Use the HHS 5161-1 application package.
- Applications must be received by the application due date and time, as detailed in <u>Section IV-3</u> of this grant announcement.
- Information provided must be sufficient for review.
- Text must be legible. Pages must be typed in black ink, single-spaced, using a font of Times New Roman 12, with all margins (left, right, top, bottom) at least one inch each. (For Project Narratives submitted electronically, see separate requirements in <u>Appendix B</u>, "Guidance for <u>Electronic Submission of</u> <u>Applications."</u>)
- To ensure equity among applications, page limits for the Project Narrative cannot be exceeded.
- Paper must be white paper and 8.5 inches by 11.0 inches in size.

To facilitate review of your application, follow these additional guidelines. Failure to adhere to the following guidelines will not, in itself, result in your application being screened out and returned without review. However, the information provided in your application must be sufficient for review. Following these guidelines will help ensure your application is complete, and will help reviewers to consider your application.

- If you are submitting a paper application, the application components required for SAMHSA applications should be submitted in the following order:
 - Face Page (Standard Form 424 v2, which is in HHS 5161-1)
 - Abstract
 - Table of Contents
 - Budget Form (Standard Form 424A, which is in HHS 5161-1)

 - Attachments

- Project/Performance Site Location(s) Form
- Disclosure of Lobbying Activities (Standard Form LLL, which is in HHS 5161-1)
- Checklist (a form in HHS 5161-1)
- Applications should comply with the following requirements:
 - Provisions relating to confidentiality and participant protection specified in <u>Appendix F</u> of this announcement.
 - Budgetary limitations as specified in <u>Sections I</u>, <u>II</u>, and <u>IV-5</u> of this announcement.
 - Documentation of nonprofit status as required in the HHS 5161-1.
- Black ink should be used throughout your application, including charts and graphs. Pages should be typed single-spaced with one column per page. Pages should not have printing on both sides.
- Pages should be numbered consecutively from beginning to end so that information can be located easily during review of the application. The abstract page should be page 1, the table of contents should be page 2, etc. The four pages of Standard form 424 v2 are not to be numbered. Attachments should be labeled and separated from the Project Narrative and budget section, and the pages should be numbered to continue the sequence.
- The page limits for Attachments stated in Section IV-2.2 of this announcement should not be exceeded.
- Send the original application and two copies to the mailing address in <u>Section</u> <u>IV-3</u> of this document. Please do not use staples, paper clips, and fasteners. Nothing should be attached, stapled, folded, or pasted. You may use rubber bands. Do not use heavy or lightweight paper or any material that cannot be copied using automatic copying machines. Odd-sized and oversized attachments such as posters will not be copied or sent to reviewers. Do not include videotapes, audiotapes, or CD-ROMs.

Appendix B – Guidance for Electronic Submission of Applications

Use of file formats other than Microsoft Office or PDF may result in your file being unreadable by our staff.

The Project Narrative must be a separate document in the electronic submission. Formatting requirements for SAMHSA grant applications are described in <u>Appendix A</u> of this announcement. These requirements also apply to applications submitted electronically, with the following exceptions only for Project Narratives submitted electronically in Microsoft Word. These requirements help ensure the accurate transmission and equitable treatment of applications.

- Text legibility: Use a font of Times New Roman 12, line spacing of single space, and all margins (left, right, top, bottom) of at least one inch each. Adhering to these standards will help to ensure the accurate transmission of your document.
- Amount of space allowed for Project Narrative: The Project Narrative for an electronic submission may not exceed 12,875 words. If the Project Narrative for an electronic submission exceeds the word limit, the application will be screened out and will not be reviewed. To determine the number of words in your Project Narrative document in Microsoft Word, select file/properties/statistics.

Keep the Project Narrative as a separate document. Please consolidate all other materials in your application to ensure the fewest possible number of attachments. Be sure to label each file according to its contents, e.g., "Attachments 1-3", "Attachments 4-5."

With the exception of standard forms in the application package, all pages in your application should be numbered consecutively. **Documents containing scanned images must also contain page numbers to continue the sequence.** Failure to comply with these requirements may affect the successful transmission and consideration of your application.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit their applications to Grants.gov early enough to resolve any unanticipated difficulties prior to the deadline. After you electronically submit your application, you will receive an automatic acknowledgement from Grants.gov that contains a Grants.gov tracking number. Appendix D – Funding Restrictions

SAMHSA grant funds must be used for purposes supported by the program and may not be used to:

- Pay for any lease beyond the project period.
- Provide services to incarcerated populations (defined as those persons in jail, prison, detention facilities, or in custody where they are not free to move about in the community).
- Pay for the purchase or construction of any building or structure to house any part of the program. (Applicants may request up to \$75,000 for renovations and alterations of existing facilities, if necessary and appropriate to the project.)
- Provide residential or outpatient treatment services when the facility has not yet been acquired, sited, approved, and met all requirements for human habitation and services provision. (Expansion or enhancement of existing residential services is permissible.)
- Pay for housing other than residential mental health and/or substance abuse treatment.
- Provide inpatient treatment or hospital-based detoxification services. Residential services are not considered to be inpatient or hospital-based services.
- Make direct payments to individuals to induce them to enter prevention or treatment services. However, SAMHSA discretionary grant funds may be used for non-clinical support services (e.g., bus tokens, child care) designed to improve access to and retention in prevention and treatment programs.
- Make direct payments to individuals to encourage attendance and/or attainment of prevention or treatment goals. However, SAMHSA discretionary grant funds may be used for non-cash incentives of up to \$20 to encourage attendance and/or attainment of prevention or treatment goals when the incentives are built into the program design and when the incentives are the minimum amount that is deemed necessary to meet program goals. SAMHSA policy allows an individual participant to receive more than one incentive over the course of the program. However, non-cash incentives should be limited to the minimum number of times deemed necessary to achieve program outcomes. A grantee or treatment or prevention provider may also provide up to \$20 cash or equivalent (coupons, bus tokens, gifts, child care, and vouchers) to individuals as incentives to participate in required data collection follow up. This amount may be paid for participation in each required interview.

Appendix F – Confidentiality and SAMHSA Participant Protection/Human Subjects Guidelines

Confidentiality and Participant Protection:

Because of the confidential nature of the work in which many SAMHSA grantees are involved, it is important to have safeguards protecting individuals from risks associated with their participation in SAMHSA projects. All applicants must address the seven elements below. If some are not applicable or relevant to the proposed project, simply state that they are not applicable and indicate why. In addition to addressing these seven elements, read the section that follows entitled Protection of Human Subjects Regulations to determine if the regulations may apply to your project. If so, you are required to describe the process you will follow for obtaining Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval. While we encourage you to keep your responses brief, there are no page limits for this section and no points will be assigned by the Review Committee. Problems with confidentiality, participant protection, and the protection of human subjects identified during peer review of the application must be resolved prior to funding.

- 1. Protect Clients and Staff from Potential Risks
 - Identify and describe any foreseeable physical, medical, psychological, social, and legal risks or potential adverse effects as a result of the project itself or any data collection activity.
 - Describe the procedures you will follow to minimize or protect participants against potential risks, including risks to confidentiality.
 - Identify plans to provide guidance and assistance in the event there are adverse effects to participants.
 - Where appropriate, describe alternative treatments and procedures that may be beneficial to the participants. If you choose not to use these other beneficial treatments, provide the reasons for not using them.

2. Fair Selection of Participants

- Describe the population(s) of focus for the proposed project. Include age, gender, and racial/ethnic background and note if the population includes homeless youth, foster children, children of substance abusers, pregnant women, or other targeted groups.
- Explain the reasons for including groups of pregnant women, children, people with mental disabilities, people in institutions, prisoners, and individuals who are likely to be particularly vulnerable to HIV/AIDS.
- Explain the reasons for including or excluding participants.

- Explain how you will recruit and select participants. Identify who will select participants.

 - State how volunteer participants will be told that they may receive services intervention even if they do not participate in or complete the data collection component of the project.
- 4. Data Collection
 - Identify from whom you will collect data (e.g., from participants themselves, family members, teachers, others). Describe the data collection procedures and specify the sources for obtaining data (e.g., school records, interviews, psychological assessments, questionnaires, observation, or other sources). Where data are to be collected through observational techniques, questionnaires, interviews, or other direct means, describe the data collection setting.
 - Identify what type of specimens (e.g., urine, blood) will be used, if any. State if the material will be used just for evaluation or if other use(s) will be made. Also, if needed, describe how the material will be monitored to ensure the safety of participants.
 - Provide in Attachment 1, "Data Collection Instruments/Interview Protocols," copies of all available data collection instruments and interview protocols that you plan to use.
- 5. Privacy and Confidentiality
 - Explain how you will ensure privacy and confidentiality. Include who will collect data and how it will be collected.

- Describe:
 - How you will use data collection instruments.
 - Where data will be stored.
 - Who will or will not have access to information.
 - How the identity of participants will be kept private, for example, through the use of a coding system on data records, limiting access to records, or storing identifiers separately from data.
- Attach or supply an internet link to your state's patient privacy and confidentiality law or regulations for medical information, mental health information, and substance abuse treatment information. These are laws your state enforces over and beyond HIPAA and 42CFR Part 2. If your state has no specific law dealing with these three areas please state that.

NOTE: If applicable, grantees must agree to maintain the confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse client records according to the provisions of **Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part II.**

Include, as appropriate, sample consent forms that provide for: (1) informed consent for participation in service intervention; (2) informed consent for participation in the data collection component of the project; and (3) informed consent for the exchange (releasing or requesting) of confidential information. The sample forms must be included in Attachment 2, "Sample Consent Forms", of your application. If needed, give English translations.

NOTE: Never imply that the participant waives or appears to waive any legal rights, may not end involvement with the project, or releases your project or its agents from liability for negligence.

- Describe if separate consents will be obtained for different stages or parts of the project. For example, will they be needed for both participant protection in treatment intervention and for the collection and use of data?
- Additionally, if other consents (e.g., consents to release information to others or gather information from others) will be used in your project, provide a description of the consents. Will individuals who do not consent to having individually identifiable data collected for evaluation purposes be allowed to participate in the project?
- 7. Risk/Benefit Discussion
 - Discuss why the risks are reasonable compared to expected benefits and importance of the knowledge from the project.

Protection of Human Subjects Regulations

SAMHSA expects that most grantees funded under this announcement will not have to comply with the Protection of Human Subjects Regulations (45 CFR 46), which requires Institutional Review Board (IRB) approval. However, in some instances, the applicant's proposed performance assessment design may meet the regulation's criteria for research involving human subjects.
