Congressional Notification under Title 10 U.S.C. 2811 Operation and Maintenance Funded Projects in Excess of \$7.5 Million

Pursuant to Section 2811 of Title 10, United States Code, the Department of Defense intends to proceed with the Facility Sustainment, Restoration and Modernization project shown below, which is funded by the Operation and Maintenance, Navy Recovery Act appropriation.

NAVY

ARRA Repair Main Runway 8/26, Naval Air Facility, El Centro, CA – Estimated cost of this project is \$16.6 million (ARRA project number 144).

<u>Description</u>: This project repairs and replaces inadequate airfield pavements on primary Runway 8/26 at Naval Air Facility, El Centro, CA. Asphalt concrete pavements and aggregate base material will be demolished, crushed and recycled and runway and asphalt concrete shoulder pavements will be replaced with Portland cement concrete on a prepared sub-grade and compacted aggregate base. This project repairs the Portland cement concrete slab cracks, spalls, joints, and joint sealants on the Runway 8/26 primary impact zone; aircraft arresting gear, steel plate anchorages, and foundations; and the runway aircraft carrier deck lighting system. Runway shoulder lighting will be removed and replaced. All Runway 8/26 runway pavement markings will be restriped.
