

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

While there is a provision of law whereby the status of an alien temporarily in the United Status may be adjusted to that of a lawful permanent resident, such adjustment council be accomplished in the ense of an alien who has been convicted of a narrestic violation. Section 212(a)(23) of the lamigration and Nationality Act, as assembled, provides in part, for the exclusion of an alien who has been convicted of a violation of, or a compliancy to violate, any law or regulation relating to the illicit persection of or traffic in anymostic drags or narihumn. There is no provision in the law whereby that ground of excludability may be unived to peculic an alien to obtain personnel resident status in this country.

You will be interested to learn that during the present session of Congress, top bills were introduced which would amend the Emmigration and Nationality Act, to give the Attoursey Convai, and through him, the Countesioner of Emmigration and Naturalization, the discustion to unive the emmindeddity or deportability of an alien who has been convicted for illegally possessing maximums.


