Most of those against when the ellegations have been made entered the country fullowing Horld War II, as refugees or displaced persons.

Soon after, we began to receive information that some persons who entered may have been guilty of war eximes, and EMB began is undicted to investigate such charges. Our investigation resulted in a case coming to fruition in 1971 against Meanine Brownsteiner Ryan; at that time a comment agreement to her denaturalization (revocation of United States citizenship) was obtained. Following this action, the Government of West Gernany initiated a successful entradition proceeding against her on the grounds that she had been guilty of crimes as a guard at an interment comp.

These actions received wide coverage by the name media which resulted in additional allegations and information being received by the Innigration Service concerning other persons. Further wide scale investigations involving 61 persons alleged to be Beni war criminals residing in the United States were initiated. The New York District Office of the EMS was designated the Project Control Office for the effort and assigned responsibility to review, sudit and coordinate allections on these cases.

Impulsies disclosed that 19 of the persons on the list were deceased; information on 17 others was so limited as to preclude identification either from 200 records or those of other agencies; since July, 1973, more names have been added to the original list, and there are 48 active investigations underway.

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These investigations have involved the interview of more than 800 persons by 85 investigators in 49 196 effices throughout the United States and oversens. Note than 80 separate sources of information have been contacted.

Recently, to hacten the day when these cases can be brought to a conclusion, IMS has taken the following stope:

- 1. assigned a full-time supervisory investigator in IMS headquerters the sole responsibility for overseeing the project;
- each case has been assigned top priority and one investigator has been assigned to each case to follow through all leads to their conclusion;
- the State Department has agreed to conduct expeditionally all
 oversees investigations, except in Israel;
- 4. investigations involving Israel are being conducted through the Israeli Consul General in New York.

I should point out that there is no authority to deport an alien because of allegations unde against him. Deportation proceedings may be began only after establishment of a prima facie case that the individual has counitted a violation of one or more of the statutes covering entry to the country or naturalization, in the case of those who have become citizens.

The Supreme Court has ruled that charges leading to such action must be supported by clear, convincing and unequivocal evidence. Hence, there is great difficulty in establishing convincing cases when consideration is given to the fact that the allegations relate to occurrences of 30 or more years ago in war-torn countries for removed from the Smited States.

I might add that we have just recently sent to the Jestice Department the results of our investigation of Bishop Valerian Trifa, who resides in the Detroit eres, and is accused of war crimes. As a result of this investigation, the United States Atterney has initiated court action to revoke the citizenskip of Bishop Trifa.

Mr. John Lemmen is ineligible for a vise and admission into the United States because of a conviction of possessing examisis resis. An alien convicted of such an offense may not be admitted for permanent residence although his entry may be authorized under a special provision of law for a temperary visit.


