Initially prioritized as the last funded Army Reserve Recovery Act project, PN 682 was reduced in scope to meet the initial Army Reserve Recovery Act funding target. The original intent was to phase this project by using conjunctive (non-Recovery Act) funding to complete the full requirements of a whole building modernization. The availability of bid savings now allows the project to be fully funded using Recovery Act funds, including an expanded scope of work to a whole facility modernization. Therefore, the original project is cancelled and replaced with a whole building modernization project, PN 2404. Scope of work includes: flooring, insulation, ceiling tile, windows, fire alarm system walls, reinforced concrete footings and walls, restrooms, security fence, painting exterior and interior surfaces, demolition, excavation, electrical system, lighting, stairs, parking lot, heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system, etc.
