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#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

This report presents results from the 2008 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual census of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

- The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2008 was 94.1 percent. Thirty-two States or jurisdictions had response rates that equaled or surpassed the overall rate [Tables 1.1 and 6.1].
- A total of 14,423 facilities completed the survey. The 13,688 facilities eligible for this report had a one-day census of 1,192,490 clients enrolled in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008 [Tables 1.1 and 3.1]
- In the United States, there were 474 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and older on March 31, 2008. The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (214 per 100,000 population aged 18 and older), followed by drug problems only (171 per 100,000), and alcohol problems only (89 per 100,000) [Table 6.33].

#### **Trends in Facility and Client Characteristics 2004-2008**

- The *total number* of substance abuse treatment facilities remained relatively constant between 2004 and 2008, while the number of clients in treatment increased slightly. The number of facilities increased by 2 percent, from 13,454 facilities in 2004 to 13,688 facilities in 2008. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 11 percent, from 1,072,251 in 2004 to 1,192,490 in 2008 [Tables 2.2 and 3.1].
- The *operational structure* of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility: private non-profit, private for-profit, or government—local, State, Federal, or tribal) changed very little between 2004 and 2008 [Tables 2.2 and 3.1 and Figures 2 and 6].
- The *primary focus of activity* of facilities (substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care, or other activity) changed very little between 2004 and 2008 [Tables 2.2 and 3.1 and Figure 3].

- The *major types of care*—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—changed very little from 2004 to 2008 in terms of the proportion of facilities offering each type of care or the proportion of clients in treatment in each type of care [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figures 4 and 7].
- Opioid Treatment Programs certified by SAMHSA for the provision of medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine were provided by 8 to 9 percent of all facilities between 2004 and 2008. The proportion of clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine ranged from 22 percent to 24 percent in that period [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figures 4 and 7].
- Agreements or contracts with managed care organizations were reported by 46 to 49 percent of all facilities from 2004 to 2008 [Table 2.4 and Figure 5].
- The proportion of *clients in treatment for three broad categories of substance abuse problems*—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse only, and alcohol abuse only—changed very little between 2004 and 2008. Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse made up 45 to 46 percent of all clients. Clients in treatment for drug abuse only made up 34 to 36 percent, and clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only made up 18 to 20 percent [Table 3.3].
- Clients under age 18 made up between 7 and 8 percent of all clients in treatment between 2004 and 2008. The type of care (outpatient, residential (non-hospital), or hospital inpatient) received by clients under age 18 differed little from that received by adults, and was stable between 2004 and 2008 [Table 3.4].

#### Facility Operation—March 31, 2008<sup>2</sup>

- Private non-profit organizations operated 58 percent of all facilities and were treating 53 percent of all clients.
- Private for-profit organizations operated 29 percent of all facilities and were treating 30 percent of all clients.
- Local governments operated 6 percent of all facilities and were treating 7 percent of all clients.
- State governments operated 3 percent of all facilities and were treating 4 percent of all clients.
- The Federal government operated 2 percent of all facilities and was treating 5 percent of all clients
- Tribal governments operated 1 percent of all facilities and were treating 1 percent of all clients [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

#### Primary Focus of Activity—March 31, 2008<sup>2</sup>

- The provision of substance abuse treatment services was the primary focus of activity of 61 percent of facilities with 67 percent of all clients in treatment.
- A mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services was the primary focus of 30 percent of facilities with 27 percent of all clients in treatment.
- The provision of mental health services was the primary focus of 7 percent of facilities with 4 percent of all clients in treatment.

- General health care was the primary focus of 1 percent of facilities with 2 percent of all clients in treatment.
- Other activities were the primary focus of 1 percent of facilities with 1 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

#### Type of Care—March 31, 2008<sup>3</sup>

- Outpatient treatment was offered by 80 percent of all facilities, and accounted for 90 percent of all clients in treatment.
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 27 percent of all facilities, and accounted for 9 percent of all clients in treatment.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 6 percent of all facilities and accounted for 1 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 4.2 and 5.2].

### Client Substance Abuse Problem and Co-occurring Mental Health Disorders—March 31, 2008

- Clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse made up 46 percent of all clients.
- Clients in treatment for drug abuse only made up 35 percent of all clients.
- Clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol only made up 19 percent of all clients [Table 5.3].
- Thirty-nine percent of all clients in treatment had diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders [Table 5.3].

#### Facility Size and Utilization Rates—March 31, 2008

- The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility was 41 [Table 4.4].
- Ninety-two percent of all residential (non-hospital) beds and 85 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use [Tables 4.6 and 4.7].

#### Medication-Assisted Opioid Therapy—March 31, 2008

- Clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) accounted for 24 percent of all clients in treatment, although OTPs were available in only 1,132 (8 percent) of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Tables 2.3 and 3.2].
- Forty-nine percent of OTPs were operated by private for-profit organizations compared to 29 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Tables 4.1 and 4.20].
- Of the 272,351 clients receiving medication-assisted opioid therapy in OTPs, 98 percent (268,071) received methadone. Of the 15,732 clients receiving buprenorphine, 73 percent received it in facilities that were not OTPs [Table 4.20].
- More than half (52 percent) of clients receiving methadone were in private for-profit facilities compared to 38 percent of clients receiving buprenorphine. Clients receiving buprenorphine were more likely than those receiving methadone to be in private non-profit facilities (46 percent) [Table 4.20].

• Most (92 percent) of the clients receiving methadone were in facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services, while these facilities accounted for only 59 percent of buprenorphine clients. Nearly one-third (32 percent) of buprenorphine clients were treated in facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services [Table 4.20].

#### CHAPTER 1

## DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2008 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), conducted between March and October 2008, with a reference date of March 31, 2008. It is the 31st in a series of national surveys begun in the 1970s. The surveys were designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and utilization of alcohol and drug treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities<sup>2</sup> in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment. (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix A.)

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. The objectives of N-SSATS are to collect multipurpose data that can be used to:

- Assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services
  provided in State-supported and other substance abuse treatment facilities and in forecasting
  substance abuse treatment resource requirements
- Update SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities (see Appendix A)
- Analyze substance abuse treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States
- Generate the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs*, a compendium of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment
- Update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Treatment Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

#### **Data Collection Procedures for the 2008 N-SSATS**

Field period and reference date

The survey reference date for the 2008 N-SSATS was March 31, 2008. The field period was from March 31, 2008, through October 17, 2008.

#### Survey universe

The 2008 N-SSATS facility universe included all 16,486 active treatment facilities on SAMHSA's I-SATS at a point 6 weeks before the survey reference date. It also included 837 facilities that were added by State substance abuse agencies or through annual frame enhancement (see Appendix A), or discovered during the first 3 weeks of the survey. Thus, the total survey universe was 17,323 facilities.

#### Content

The 2008 N-SSATS questionnaire was a 15-page document with 46 numbered questions (see Appendix B). Topics included:

- Facility identification information
- Facility operating entity
- Facility focus of activity
- Type of care provided
  - Outpatient treatment services (regular outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, day treatment or partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/buprenorphine maintenance)
  - Residential (non-hospital) treatment services (long-term—more than 30 days, short-term—30 days or fewer, detoxification)
  - Hospital treatment services (inpatient treatment, inpatient detoxification)
- Services offered (assessment and pre-treatment services, counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, ancillary services)
- Clinical/therapeutic approaches
- Special programs or groups provided for specific client types
- Services provided in sign language or in languages other than English
- Detoxification from alcohol, benzodiazepines, opiates, cocaine, methamphetamine, or other drugs, and routine use of medication during detoxification
- Client outreach (hotline operation, maintenance of website)
- Licensure, certification, or accreditation agencies or organizations
- Standard operating procedures
- Payment options accepted, including use of sliding fee scale and/or treatment at no charge
- Facility funding (public funding, agreements or contracts with managed care organizations)

- Operation of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by SAMHSA and offering maintenance and/or detoxification with methadone and/or buprenorphine
- Clients in treatment on March 31, 2008 (total, clients under age 18, clients receiving methadone, and clients receiving buprenorphine)
- Annual admissions and number funded by Access To Recovery (ATR) vouchers
- Percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, for abuse of both alcohol and drugs, alcohol abuse only, drug abuse only
- Percentage of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008 with diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders
- Number of beds designated for residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008

#### Data collection

Two primary data collection modes were employed—a paper questionnaire sent by mail and a secure web-based questionnaire. Respondents could select either method to complete the survey. Six weeks before the survey reference date (March 31, 2008), letters were mailed to all facilities to alert them to expect the survey. The letters also served to update records with new address information received from the Post Office. On March 31, 2008, data collection packets (including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter, State-specific letter of endorsement, information on completing the survey on the web, and a sheet of *Frequently Asked Questions*) were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Web-based support for facilities completing the questionnaire on the web was also available. Four to 5 weeks after the initial questionnaire mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately 8 weeks after the initial questionnaire mailing, non-responding facilities were mailed a second questionnaire packet. About 4 to 5 weeks after the second questionnaire mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within 2 to 3 weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by computer-assisted telephone interview (CATI).

#### Facility status and response rate

*Table 1.1* presents a summary of response rate information. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 17,323 facilities believed to be actively providing substance abuse treatment services. Of these facilities, 11.5 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or did not provide substance abuse treatment or detoxification. Of the remaining 15,335 facilities, 94.1 percent completed the survey.

#### Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed manually for consistency and for missing data. Calls were made to facilities to clarify questionable responses and to obtain missing data. If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were replaced by imputation. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. The reviews incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks and checks for data outliers not readily identified by manual review.

The web questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing; that is, respondents were prompted to complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses.

Item non-response was minimized through careful editing and extensive follow-up. The item response rate for the 2008 N-SSATS averaged 98.3 percent across 193 separate items. Appendix C details item response rates and imputation procedures.

#### **Facility Selection for the 2008 N-SSATS Report**

*Table 1.1.* The N-SSATS questionnaire serves several purposes, as noted earlier. Four hundred and four of the 14,423 questionnaire respondents provided information but were deemed out of the scope of this report. They were excluded from the analyses presented here. The excluded facilities and reasons for exclusion fell into three categories:

- 171 facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment. These facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the *Directory* and the Treatment Facility Locator.
- 170 facilities were solo practitioners. I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they are included in the survey. The excluded solo practitioners had not been identified for inclusion by the State substance abuse agency.
- 63 facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients exclusively.

An additional 331 facilities whose client counts were included in or "rolled into" other facilities' counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately were excluded from facility counts in this report. However, their client counts are included.

After the exclusion of 404 out-of-scope facilities and 331 rolled-up facilities, 13,688 eligible respondent facilities were included in the 2008 N-SSATS report.


Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

There were 13,688 eligible respondents to the 2008 N-SSATS. The breakdown of facility data and client counts reported by these respondents is summarized below.

- 11,940 facilities reported facility data and client counts for their own organizations.
- 625 facilities reported facility characteristics for themselves and provided client counts for their own facility and for 1,352 other facilities.
- 1,123 facilities reported facility characteristics only. Their client counts were reported by another facility.

#### **Survey Response Mode**

Figure 1. The proportion of facilities using the web survey to respond to N-SSATS has increased steadily since introduction of the option in 2002. The percentage of facilities responding via the web increased from 30 percent in 2004 to 48 percent in 2008. Mail response declined from 48 percent in 2004 to 33 percent in 2008. Telephone response, which represents follow-up of facilities that have not responded by mail or web, changed less, from 22 percent in 2004 to 19 percent in 2008.



#### **Data Considerations and Limitations**

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2008 N-SSATS. Some general issues are listed below; other considerations are detailed in Appendix A. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There was no adjustment for the 5.9 percent facility non-response.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

#### **Organization of the Report**

- Appendix C contains information on item response and imputation.

#### **Terminology**

The majority of tables in the report are organized by facility operation and by primary focus of the facility. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

- Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility:
  - Private for-profit
  - Private non-profit
  - Government
    - Local, county, or community
    - State
    - Federal (Dept. of Veterans Affairs, Dept. of Defense, Indian Health Service, other)
    - Tribal
- *Primary focus* indicates the services the facility primarily provides:
  - Substance abuse treatment services
  - Mental health services
  - A mix of substance abuse treatment and mental heath services
  - General health care
  - Other
- *Clients in treatment* were defined as:
  - Hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse services at the facility on March 31, 2008

and

■ Outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2008, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2008

#### CHAPTER 2

#### TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS


T his chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 2004 to 2008.

#### **Number of Facilities**

Table 2.1. The total number of substance abuse treatment facilities remained relatively constant between 2004 and 2008, although there was considerable turnover from year to year in the individual facilities responding to the survey. Every year, between 88 and 90 percent of the facilities responding to a given survey had also responded to the previous year's survey. Some 10 to 12 percent of the facilities had closed or were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, but were replaced by similar numbers of new facilities.

There was a net increase of 40 facilities between 2007 and 2008, to 13,688 facilities. Of the facilities responding to the 2008 survey, 89 percent had also responded to the 2007 survey and 11 percent were new to the 2008 survey. Eleven percent of the facilities responding in 2007 had closed or were no longer providing substance abuse treatment in 2008.

Despite the year-to-year changes in the facilities reporting, several core structural characteristics of the substance abuse treatment system remained stable from 2004 to 2008.



#### **Facility Operation**


*Table 2.2 and Figure 2.* The operational structure of the substance abuse treatment system (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility) changed very little between 2004 and 2008.

- Private non-profit organizations operated 60 percent of all facilities in 2004, decreasing slightly to 58 percent in 2008.
- Private for-profit organizations operated 26 percent of facilities in 2004, increasing slightly but steadily to 29 percent of facilities in 2008.
- Local, county, or community governments operated between 6 and 7 percent of facilities.
- State governments operated 3 percent of facilities each year.
- The Federal government operated 2 percent of facilities each year.<sup>1</sup>
- Tribal governments operated 1 percent of facilities each year.

#### **Primary Focus of Facility**

*Table 2.2 and Figure 3.* The primary focus of activity of the facility (i.e., the services the facility primarily provides) changed very little between 2004 and 2008.

- Facilities providing substance abuse treatment services made up 61 to 62 percent of facilities.
- Facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental heath services made up 26 percent of facilities in 2004, increasing slightly but steadily to 30 percent in 2008.

- Facilities providing mental health services made up 7 to 8 percent of facilities each year.
- Facilities providing general health care made up 1 to 2 percent of facilities each year.
- Facilities whose main focus was another activity made up 1 to 2 percent of facilities each year.

#### **Type of Care Offered**

*Table 2.3 and Figure 4.* The proportions of facilities offering the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2004 and 2008.

- Outpatient treatment was provided by 80 to 81 percent of facilities.
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 27 to 28 percent of facilities.
- Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 6 to 8 percent of facilities.

#### **Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs**

*Table 2.3 and Figure 4.* Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), certified by SAMHSA, provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine, the only two opioid medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction. OTPs can be associated with any type of care. They were provided by 8 to 9 percent of all facilities between 2004 and 2008.






#### **Managed Care**

*Table 2.4 and Figure 5.* In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed."

- The proportions of facilities that had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations and were operated by private for-profit and private non-profit organizations decreased after 2004. However, by 2008, they had returned to the 2004 level. The proportions of privately-operated facilities with managed care agreements or contracts in 2008 were:
  - 52 percent of private non-profit facilities
  - 50 percent of private for-profit facilities
- Local, State, Federal, and tribal government-operated facilities all reported net increases between 2004 and 2008 in the proportions of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts.
  - Local government-operated facilities reported an increase from 39 percent in 2004 to 43 percent in 2008.
  - State government-operated facilities reported an increase from 35 percent in 2004 to 43 percent in 2008.
  - Federal government-operated facilities reported an increase from 15 percent in 2004 to 18 percent in 2008.
  - Tribal government-operated facilities reported an increase from 23 percent in 2004 to 28 percent in 2008.

#### CHAPTER 3

#### TRENDS IN CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS


T his chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 2004 to 2008.

*Table 3.1.* The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 11 percent from 2004 to 2008, from 1,072,251 in 2004 to 1,192,490 in 2008.

#### **Facility Operation**

*Table 3.1 and Figure 6.* In almost all categories of facility operation, the proportions of clients in treatment changed slightly between 2004 and 2008.

- Private non-profit facilities treated 55 percent of clients in each year from 2004 to 2007, but treated 53 percent in 2008.
- Private for-profit facilities treated 28 percent of clients, increasing slightly but steadily to 30 percent in 2008. (The number of clients in private for-profit facilities increased by 23 percent, from 296,533 in 2004 to 363,695 in 2008.)
- Local government-operated facilities treated 9 percent of clients in 2004, decreasing slightly but steadily to 7 percent in 2008. (The number of clients in local government-operated facilities decreased by 15 percent, from 97,261 in 2004 to 82,632 in 2008.)

- State government-operated facilities treated 4 percent of clients in each year.
- Federal government-operated facilities treated 3 percent of clients from 2004 to 2007, but treated 5 percent in 2008.<sup>1</sup>
- Tribal government-operated facilities treated 1 percent of clients in each year.

#### **Primary Focus of Facility**

*Table 3.1.* In almost all categories of facility primary focus of activity, the proportions of clients in treatment changed very little from 2004 to 2008.

- Facilities providing substance abuse treatment services treated 67 to 69 percent of clients.
- Facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental heath services treated 23 percent of all clients in 2004, increasing slightly but steadily to 27 percent in 2008.
- Facilities providing mental health services treated 4 to 5 percent of clients.
- Facilities providing general health care treated 1 to 2 percent of clients.
- Facilities whose main focus was another activity treated 1 to 2 percent of clients.

#### **Type of Care Received**

*Table 3.2 and Figure 7.* The proportions of clients in treatment for the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2004 and 2008.

- Clients in outpatient treatment made up 89 to 90 percent of clients in each year.
- Clients in residential (non-hospital) treatment made up 9 to 10 percent of all clients in each year.
- Clients in hospital inpatient treatment made up 1 percent of all clients in each year.

#### **Clients Receiving Methadone or Buprenorphine in Opioid Treatment Programs**

Table 3.2 and Figure 7. Clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine could be in any type of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), or hospital inpatient. Clients could receive methadone only in Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine. However, clients could receive buprenorphine in any facility.

- The proportion of all clients receiving methadone was 22 to 24 percent between 2004 and 2008.
- The proportion of clients receiving buprenorphine was less than 1 percent in every year from 2004 to 2007, but increased to 1 percent in 2008.

#### **Substance Abuse Problem Treated**

*Table 3.3.* The proportion of clients in treatment for three broad categories of substance abuse problems—both alcohol and drug abuse, drug abuse only, and alcohol abuse only—changed very little between 2004 and 2008. Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse made up 45 to 46 percent of all clients from 2004 to 2008. Clients in treatment for drug abuse only ranged from 34 to 36 percent of all clients from 2004 through 2008. The proportion of clients treated for alcohol abuse only ranged from 18 to 20 percent between 2004 and 2008.

#### **Clients under Age 18 in Treatment**

*Table 3.4.* Clients under age 18 made up between 7 and 8 percent of all clients from 2004 through 2008.

- The types of care received by clients under age 18 were stable between 2004 and 2008.
  - Clients under age 18 in outpatient treatment made up 87 to 88 percent of all clients under age 18.
  - Clients under age 18 in residential (non-hospital) treatment made up 11 to 12 percent of all clients under age 18.
  - Clients under age 18 in hospital inpatient treatment made up 1 percent of all clients under age 18 in every year.
- The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents ranged from 82 to 84 percent between 2004 and 2008.

#### CHAPTER 4

## FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter outlines key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2008.

## **Facility Operation and Primary Focus**

*Table 4.1.* Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility. They were also asked to designate the facility's primary focus of activity.

• The proportions of all facilities by facility operation were:1

•	Private non-profit organizations	58 percent
•	Private for-profit organizations	29 percent
•	Local, county, or community governments	6 percent

## **Type of Care Offered**

*Table 4.2.* Type of care offered was made up of three broad categories (outpatient, residential (non-hospital, and hospital inpatient), each with several subcategories. A facility could offer more than one type of care. The proportions of all facilities offering the different types of care were:<sup>3</sup>

Almost three quarters (74 percent) of private non-profit facilities provided outpatient care and more than one third (35 percent) provided residential (non-hospital) care. In contrast, 90 percent of private for-profit facilities provided outpatient care and 13 percent provided residential (non-hospital) care.

#### Client Substance Abuse Problem and Co-occurring Mental Health Disorders

*Table 4.3.* Facilities were asked to estimate the proportions of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, for alcohol abuse only, and for drug abuse only. They were also asked to estimate the proportion of clients with diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders.

- Almost all facilities (92 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse on March 31, 2008. Eighty percent had clients in treatment for drug abuse only and 78 percent had clients in treatment for alcohol abuse only.
- Most facilities (88 percent) also had clients in treatment with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders on March 31, 2008.

#### **Facility Size**

*Table 4.4.* Facility size, i.e., the median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility on March 31, 2008, was 41 clients.

- The median number of clients ranged from 40 in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations and by tribal governments to 58 in facilities operated by the Federal government.
- By facility focus of activity, the median ranged from 20 clients in facilities providing mental health services to 45 in those providing substance abuse treatment services.
- By type of care, the median number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, was:

*Table 4.5.* Facilities were grouped into five groups of approximately equal number, based on the total number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008.

- Facilities operated by the Federal government were generally larger than facilities operated by other entities—33 percent had 120 clients or more in treatment on March 31, 2008, compared to 21 percent of all facilities.
- Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of mental health services tended to be smaller than facilities with other foci of activity—40 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, compared to 20 percent of all facilities.

## **Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates**

Facilities were asked to report the number of residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient clients by the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates could be more than 100 percent.

- *Table 4.6.* Some 3,201 facilities reported having 112,004 residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008. The utilization rate<sup>3</sup> was 92 percent, and ranged from 88 percent in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations to 117 percent in facilities operated by the Federal government.
- Table 4.7. Some 788 facilities reported having 11,668 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008. The utilization rate<sup>4</sup> was 85 percent, and ranged from 79 percent in facilities operated by private non-profit agencies to 130 percent in facilities operated by tribal governments. By facility focus, utilization rates ranged from 80 percent in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services to 103 percent in facilities providing mental health services.




Figure 8 Residential (Non-Hospital) and Hospital Inpatient Utilization Rates:

- Tables 4.6 and 4.7 and Figure 8 show the distribution of facility-level utilization rates for residential (non-hospital) beds and for hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Fifty-nine percent of facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent or more, while 39 percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range.

#### **Services Provided**

Tables 4.8 and 4.9. Facilities were asked about the types of services they provided. Services were grouped into the six broad categories shown below.

- Assessment and pre-treatment services were offered by 98 percent of all facilities.
  - Screening for substance abuse was provided by 92 percent of all facilities.
  - Comprehensive substance abuse assessment or diagnosis was provided by 89 percent of all facilities.
  - Screening for mental health disorders was provided by 62 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in facilities providing mental health services (94 percent), facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services (91 percent), and facilities providing general health care (81 percent).
  - Comprehensive mental health assessment or diagnosis was provided 43 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in facilities providing mental health services (87 percent) and facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services (77 percent).
  - Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 50 percent of all facilities, but by 83 percent of tribal government-operated facilities.
- Testing services were provided by 87 percent of all facilities.
  - Drug or alcohol urine screening was provided by 83 percent of all facilities.
  - Breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing was provided by 58 percent of all facilities, but by 77 percent of Federal government-operated facilities.
  - Testing for each of TB, HIV, hepatitis B and C, and STDs was provided by between 20 and 34 percent of all facilities, but by 82 to 84 percent of facilities providing general health care.

- Counseling was provided by 99 percent of all facilities.
  - Individual counseling was provided by 96 percent of all facilities.
  - Group counseling was provided by 92 percent of all facilities.
  - Family counseling was provided by 72 percent of all facilities, but by 81 percent of facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services.
- *Transitional services* were provided by 96 percent of all facilities.
  - Discharge planning was provided by 92 percent of all facilities.
  - Aftercare/continuing care was provided by 81 percent of all facilities.
- *Pharmacotherapies* were provided by 46 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in facilities providing general health care (83 percent) and by Federal government-operated facilities (82 percent).
  - Medications for psychiatric disorders were most frequently available—in 34 percent of all facilities and in 78 percent of facilities providing general health care.
- Ancillary services were provided by 99 percent of all facilities.
  - Substance abuse education was provided by 94 percent of all facilities.
  - Case management services were provided by 77 percent of all facilities.
  - Mental health services were provided by 56 percent of all facilities; rates were higher in facilities providing mental health services (97 percent), facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services (93 percent), facilities providing general health care (84 percent), and Federal government-operated facilities (76 percent).

# **Clinical/Therapeutic Approaches**

*Table 4.10.* Facilities were asked to indicate whether they used any of 12 specific clinical/therapeutic approaches.

- Two approaches were each used always or often by more than three-quarters of facilities:
  - Substance abuse counseling was used always or often by 96 percent of facilities.
  - Relapse prevention was used always or often by 88 percent of facilities.
- A number of approaches were used at least sometimes (always, often, or sometimes) by more than half of facilities:
  - Cognitive-behavioral therapy was used at least sometimes by 90 percent of facilities.
  - Motivational interviewing was used at least sometimes by 84 percent of facilities.
  - Anger management was used at least sometimes by 84 percent of facilities.
  - Brief intervention was used at least sometimes by 82 percent of facilities.
  - 12-step facilitation was used at least sometimes by 81 percent of facilities.
  - Trauma-related counseling was used at least sometimes by 65 percent of facilities.
  - Contingency management/motivational incentives was used at least sometimes by 61 percent of facilities.

- Approaches that were used rarely or never, or were unfamiliar to the respondent, for more than half of all facilities were:
  - Rational emotive behavioral therapy was used rarely or never by 43 percent of facilities, and was unfamiliar to an additional 8 percent of facilities.
  - The matrix model was used rarely or never by 43 percent of facilities, and was unfamiliar to an additional 24 percent of facilities.
  - Community reinforcement plus vouchers was used rarely or never by 70 percent of facilities, and was unfamiliar to an additional 16 percent of facilities.

#### **Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types**

*Table 4.11*. Facilities were asked about the provision of treatment programs or groups specially designed for specific types of client. Overall, 82 percent of facilities offered at least one special program or group to serve a specific client type.

• The proportions of facilities providing special programs or groups were:

## Services in Sign Language for the Hearing Impaired and in Languages Other than English

*Table 4.12.* Facilities were asked about the provision of substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired. They were also asked whether treatment was provided in languages other than English, whether this treatment was provided by a staff counselor or by an on-call interpreter, and in what languages staff counselors provided treatment.

- Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 28 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local and State governments were most likely to offer these services (43 and 40 percent, respectively). By primary focus of activity, facilities providing mental health services or a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental heath services (39 and 35 percent, respectively) were the most likely to offer sign language.
- Substance abuse treatment services in languages other than English were provided in 43 percent of all facilities, ranging from 20 percent of Federal government-operated facilities to 54 percent of local government-operated facilities.
- In 44 percent of facilities providing a language other than English, a staff counselor provided the service; another 21 percent of facilities used both a staff counselor and an on-call interpreter.

• Facilities with staff counselors most frequently provided services in Spanish (93 percent), although 23 percent provided other languages. American Indian/Alaska Native languages were provided by 3 percent of these facilities overall, but by 98 percent of those operated by tribal governments and by 92 percent of those operated by the Indian Health Service.

#### **Detoxification Services**

*Table 4.13.* Facilities that provided detoxification services were asked to indicate whether they detoxified clients from specified substances, and whether medication was routinely used during detoxification.

• The proportions of detoxification facilities providing detoxification from specific substances were:

• Medications were routinely used during detoxification in 73 percent of the facilities providing detoxification services.

#### Client Outreach

*Table 4.14.* Facilities were asked whether they operated a hotline responding to substance abuse problems and whether they had a website providing information about their substance abuse treatment programs.

- A hotline responding to substance abuse problems was operated by 22 percent of facilities overall. Hotline operation ranged from 13 percent among Federal government-operated facilities to 35 percent among local government-operated facilities.
- Websites providing information about a facility's substance abuse treatment programs were maintained by 69 percent of all facilities. Website availability ranged from 36 percent among tribal government-operated facilities to 78 percent among private non-profit facilities.

#### Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked to report licensure, certification, or accreditation by specified agencies or organizations. These included the State substance abuse agency, State mental health department, State public health department or board of health, hospital licensing authority, the Joint Commission, CARF, NCQA, COA, and other State or local agency or organization.<sup>6</sup>

• *Table 4.15*. Overall, 95 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations. The proportions of facilities reporting the specified agencies or organizations were:

- *Table 4.16.* Facility licensing, certification, or accreditation was associated with the type of care offered.
  - The State substance abuse agency licensed, certified, or accredited 82 percent each of facilities offering outpatient treatment and residential (non-hospital) treatment, but only 56 percent of facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment.
  - The State mental health department licensed, certified, or accredited 46 percent of hospital inpatient facilities but only 36 percent of outpatient facilities and 26 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.
  - Facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment were more likely than facilities offering other types of care to report licensure, certification, or accreditation by the following:

## **Facility Standard Operating Procedures**

*Table 4.17*. Facilities were asked to indicate whether they followed specified practices as part of their standard operating procedure. Almost all the standard practices listed were used by 80 percent or more of all facilities.

• The proportions of facilities reporting use of the specified standard practices were:

#### **Payment Options**

*Table 4.18.* Facilities were asked to indicate whether they accepted specified payment or insurance options for substance abuse treatment. They were also asked about use of a sliding fee scale and whether they offered treatment at no charge to clients who could not pay.

• The proportions of all facilities reporting acceptance of specific payment options were:

Cash or self-payment	89 percent
Private health insurance	62 percent

State-financed health insurance	38 percent

Federal military insurance	32 percent

- Facilities operated by Federal and tribal governments were least likely to accept cash or self-payment (39 and 42 percent, respectively). Private for-profit and Federal government-operated facilities were less likely to accept Medicare, Medicaid, and State-financed health insurance than were facilities operated by private non-profits and State and local governments.
- Acceptance of Access to Recovery vouchers was reported by 14 States. The proportion of facilities accepting Access to Recovery vouchers ranged from 11 percent in California to 62 percent in Idaho [Table 6.20].
- Use of a sliding fee scale was reported by 62 percent of all facilities, ranging from 15 percent of facilities operated by the Federal government to 82 percent of facilities operated by local governments.
- Treatment at no charge was offered by 52 percent of all facilities, ranging from 23 percent of private for-profit facilities to about 76 percent of facilities operated by Federal and State governments.

#### **Facility Funding**

*Table 4.19.* Facilities were asked about agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services, and whether they received Federal, State, or local government funds or grants to support their substance abuse treatment programs.

- About half of all facilities (49 percent) reported that they had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. In general, private non-profit and private for-profit organizations were more likely to have such agreements or contracts (52 and 50 percent, respectively) than were government-operated facilities (43 percent or less). Facilities that provided a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental heath services or provided mental health services were most likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations (58 and 55 percent, respectively).
- Overall, 59 percent of facilities reported receiving government funds to support substance abuse treatment programs. The proportions were highest in facilities operated by local and State governments (86 and 82 percent, respectively). Seventy-three percent of programs operated by non-profit organizations reported receiving public funds compared to 21 percent of facilities operated by for-profit organizations.

## **Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs)**

Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) are certified by SAMHSA to provide medication-assisted therapy in the treatment of opioid addiction. Currently, methadone and buprenorphine are the only opioid medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction.

- *Tables 2.3 and 3.2.* Clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine in OTPs accounted for 24 percent of all clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, although OTPs were available in only 1,132 (8 percent) of all substance abuse treatment facilities.
- *Tables 4.1 and 4.20*. Private for-profit organizations operated 49 percent of OTPs, but operated only 29 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities.
- *Table 4.20*. Of the 272,351 clients receiving medication-assisted opioid therapy in OTPs, 98 percent (268,071) received methadone. Of the 15,732 clients receiving buprenorphine, 73 percent received it in facilities that were not OTPs.
  - More than half (52 percent) of clients receiving methadone were in private for-profit facilities compared to 38 percent of clients receiving buprenorphine. Most (92 percent) of clients receiving methadone were in facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services.
  - Clients receiving buprenorphine were more likely than those receiving methadone to be in private non-profit facilities (46 vs. 38 percent) or in Federal government-operated facilities (9 percent vs. 1 percent).
  - Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services accounted for 59 percent of buprenorphine clients. Nearly one-third (32 percent) of buprenorphine clients were treated in facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services.
- *Table 4.21*. Most facilities with OTPs offered outpatient treatment (92 percent). Eighty-nine percent offered outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance and 47 percent offered detoxification.
- *Table 4.22*. OTPs were more likely than all facilities combined [Table 4.16] to be licensed, certified, or accredited by a State public health department or board of health (59 vs. 41 percent), by the Joint Commission (32 vs. 21 percent) or CARF (63 vs. 20 percent).

#### CHAPTER 5

## **CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS**

This chapter describes key characteristics of the 1,192,490 clients in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008. *Clients in treatment* were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services on March 31, 2008, and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2008, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 31, 2008.

## **Facility Operation and Primary Focus**

*Table 5.1.* Facilities were asked to designate the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility. They were also asked to designate the facility's primary focus of activity.

• The proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, by facility operation were:

## Type of Care

*Tables 5.2a, 5.2b, and 5.2c.* The 2008 N-SSATS requested the number of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, who received specified subcategories of type of care within three broad categories.

- The majority of clients (53 percent) were in private non-profit facilities. The majority of clients in most of the individual types of care were also in private non-profit facilities. However, the majority of clients in outpatient detoxification (56 percent) were in private for-profit facilities, as were the majority of clients in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance (52 percent).
- Three-quarters (75 percent) of clients in residential treatment and 79 percent of clients in long-term residential treatment were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations.

#### **Substance Abuse Problem and Co-occurring Mental Health Disorders**

*Table 5.3.* The 2008 N-SSATS requested the proportions of clients in treatment on March 31, 2008, by substance abuse problem treated (alcohol only, drug abuse, or both alcohol and drug abuse).

- On March 31, 2008, 46 percent of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, 35 percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 19 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.
  - By facility operation, the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of both alcohol and drugs was in tribal-operated facilities (57 percent). For abuse of drugs only, the highest proportion of clients was in private for-profit facilities (47 percent); for abuse of alcohol only, the highest proportion was in Federal government-operated facilities (29 percent).
  - By primary focus, facilities providing general health care had the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of both alcohol and drugs (65 percent).

The 2008 N-SSATS also requested the proportion of clients in treatment with diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders.

• On March 31, 2008, 39 percent of clients were in treatment for diagnosed co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders.

■ The highest proportions of clients with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders were in Federal government-operated facilities (59 percent) and in facilities providing mental health services (67 percent).

## **Clients Under Age 18**

There were 86,465 clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008, some 7 percent of the total 1,192,490 clients in treatment on that date.

*Table 5.4.* Clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 31, 2008, were more likely to be in private non-profit facilities than the general client population (63 vs. 53 percent, respectively) [Table 5.1]. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 30 percent of all clients in treatment but only 22 percent of clients under age 18.

Fifty-four percent of clients under age 18 were in facilities with a primary focus of substance abuse treatment, compared to 67 percent of all clients. More than one third (39 percent) of clients under age 18 were in facilities whose focus was provision of a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services compared to 27 percent of the total client population.

*Table 5.5.* The proportion of adolescents receiving each type of care was similar to the total treatment population [Table 5.2b]. Most (88 percent) were in outpatient treatment, 11 percent were in residential (non-hospital) treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

#### CHAPTER 6

#### STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility data by State and jurisdiction for March 31, 2008. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

*Table 6.1* details the 2008 N-SSATS response rate. The next group of tables provides State- or jurisdictional-level detail for:

- Tables 6.2 to 6.4: treatment facility and client trends presented in Chapters 2 and 3.
- *Tables 6.5 to 6.24:* facility tables presented in Chapter 4.
- Tables 6.25 to 6.32: client tables presented in Chapter 5.

*Table 6.33* presents the number of clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over, according to substance abuse problem treated, by State or jurisdiction.

#### **Survey Response**

*Table 6.1.* The overall response rate for the survey was 94.1 percent. Thirty-two States or jurisdictions had response rates that equaled or surpassed the overall rate.

#### **Trends**

*Table 6.2.* California and New York had the largest numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment in every year from 2004 through 2008. On March 31, 2008, California had 13 percent of all facilities and 12 percent of all clients. New York had 7 percent of all facilities and 10 percent of all clients.


Florida and Illinois ranked 3rd or 4th in the total number of facilities from 2004 through 2008. Florida was 3rd or 4th for number of clients, but the number of clients in Illinois has been decreasing.

A core group of States (Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington) has generally ranked 5th to 10th in both the numbers of facilities and of clients from 2004 to 2008. Colorado is part of this group based on the number of facilities, and Maryland and Massachusetts are part of it based on the numbers of clients.

# Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population Aged 18 and Older

*Table 6.33 and Figure 9.* For the United States, there were 474 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over on March 31, 2008. The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug abuse (214 per 100,000 population), followed by drug abuse only (171 per 100,000 population), and alcohol abuse only (89 per 100,000 population). *Figure 9* maps the rates of clients in treatment by State by quartile of rates—there are between 12 and 14 States in each quartile.

#### APPENDIX A

# N-SSATS BACKGROUND

# **Survey History**

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version called the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory was used. In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993.

In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and it was conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned, and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full mail survey was reinstated with telephone follow-up; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS). The reference date for the annual survey had always been the end of September or beginning of October. After the 2000 survey, the reference date was changed to the end of March, and no survey was conducted during 2001.

In 2000, the use of an Internet-based questionnaire was tested, and beginning in 2002, all facilities were offered the opportunity to respond via the Internet.

# N-SSATS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

N-SSATS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), a continuously updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities. The other components of DASIS are N-SSATS and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of admissions to substance abuse treatment. Together, the components provide national- and State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-SATS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-SATS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (about 14,000 in 2008) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of I-SATS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State agency. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service. I-SATS records for Federally operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by State substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (about 4,000 in 2008) represents the SAMHSA effort since the mid-1990s to make I-SATS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that State substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See *Special efforts to improve survey coverage* below.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

#### **Survey Coverage**

The use of I-SATS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-SATS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

# Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that State substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. It also requests that facilities be included in I-SATS, N-SSATS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. Because of the different State administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-SATS ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year.

However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

# Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-SATS are administratively monitored by State substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-SATS is affected by differences in State systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on I-SATS. Some 15 source lists were considered, and facilities not on I-SATS were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on I-SATS. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's biannual Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, the source lists that yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks, also identify additional facilities during the survey itself. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the State substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided yielded a net increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. The number of facilities reporting continued to increase in 1999, but at a slower pace, a net increase of 1,800 facilities. The increase between 1998 and 1999 was in large part because of the improved survey response rate (95 percent in 1999 vs. 90 percent in 1998). Between 2004 and 2008, the number of facilities remained constant, at between 13,400 and 13,800. The total number is deceptive, however. There was significant turnover as facilities closed and others opened. (See Table 2.1.)

#### Data collection

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed facility survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities, and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee.

# Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated

version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. Between 2004 and 2008, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in an annual follow-up rate (i.e., facilities in the sample either completed the survey or were determined to be closed or otherwise ineligible) of 94 to 96 percent. In 2008, the follow-up rate was 94.7 percent.

#### **Exclusions**

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998.

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 UFDS survey and subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.<sup>1</sup> During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on I-SATS. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-SATS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on I-SATS and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs* and on the Treatment Facility Locator (http://findtreatment.samhsa.gov). These facilities are excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

#### **Changes in Survey Content**

*Table A.1* shows the major content areas for the survey from 1995 to 2008. Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest. For example, questions on the number of clients in treatment receiving buprenorphine were added in 2004. Questions about clinical/therapeutic methods, standard practices, and Access to Recovery grants were added in 2007.

There have also been changes within content areas. For example, in response to concerns about over-reporting of programs or groups for specific client types, the survey question was revised in 2003 to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that offered specially designed programs or groups for that client type. As a result, the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased after 2002. Surveys from 2003 and later are believed to more accurately represent the number and proportions of facilities providing programs or groups for the specified client types.





#### APPENDIX C

#### ITEM RESPONSE AND IMPUTATION FOR N-SSATS 2008

This Appendix contains Table C.1, a list of item response rates for questions from the N-SSATS 2008 questionnaire. Item non-response was minimized through careful editing and extensive follow-up.

The item response rate for the 2008 N-SSATS averaged 98.3 percent across 193 separate responses.

Item non-response was 10 percent or more for only 6 of 193 separate responses.

Imputation was conducted for the 92 facilities that were missing client census counts for one or more service types (i.e., the number of clients in hospital inpatient, residential [non-hospital], or outpatient treatment, and their subcategories). An imputed value for a service type was assigned if a facility reported that it provided the service but had not provided a client count for the service.

Imputation was also conducted for client count values identified as outliers. Outliers were defined as cases where the number of clients reported exceeded the 75th percentile of the distribution of client counts for all cases of one of the main service types. The 2008 value was compared with the average of previous years' data. If the difference exceeded 1.8 times the 2007 value in either direction, the value was imputed.

When available, client values from the 2007 N-SSATS were used to impute the missing client counts on the 2008 N-SSATS. In all other cases, the average client value, stratified by State and facility operation, was used to impute the missing client counts. If a facility were unique in its State and facility operation category, values were imputed using average values for the State only. Missing client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, residential [non-hospital] detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger service type totals (total hospital inpatient clients, total residential (non-hospital) clients, and total outpatient clients), and finally to total clients.
