1026	What is the most important information I should know about Rituxan?	
1027	Rituxan can cause serious side effects that can lead to death, including:	
1028 1029 1030 1031	1. Infusion reactions. Infusion reactions are the most common side effect of Rituxan treatment. Serious infusion reactions can happen during your infusion or within 24 hours after your infusion of Rituxan. Your doctor should give you medicines before your infusion of Rituxan to decrease your chance of having a severe infusion reaction.	
1032 1033	Tell your doctor or get medical help right away if you get any of these symptoms during or after an infusion of Rituxan:	
1034	 hives (red itchy welts) or rash 	
1035	• itching	
1036	 swelling of your lips, tongue, throat or face 	
1037	• sudden cough	
1038	 shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, or wheezing 	
1039	• weakness	
1040	 dizziness or feel faint 	
1041	 palpitations (feel like your heart is racing or fluttering) 	
1042	• chest pain	
1043 1044 1045 1046 1047	2. Progressive Multifocal Leukoencephalopathy (PML). PML is a rare, serious brain infection caused by a virus. People with weakened immune systems can get PML. Your chance of getting PML may be higher if you are treated with Rituxan alone or with other medicines that weaken your immune system. PML can result in death or severe disability. There is no known treatment, prevention, or cure for PML.

1055 1056	3. Tumor Lysis Syndrome (TLS). TLS is caused by the fast breakdown of cancer cells. TLS can cause you to have:	
1057	 kidney failure and the need for dialysis treatment 	
1058	abnormal heart rhythm	

1059 Your doctor may do blood tests to check you for TLS. Your doctor may give you medicine to help prevent TLS. 1060 **4.** Severe skin and mouth reactions. Tell your doctor or get medical help right away if you get 1061 any of these symptoms at anytime during your treatment with Rituxan: 1062 1063 painful sores or ulcers on your skin, lips or in your mouth 1064 blisters 1065 peeling skin rash 1066 1067 pustules See "What are possible side effects of Rituxan?" for more information about side effects. 1068 1069 What is Rituxan? 1070 Rituxan is a prescription medicine used to treat: 1071 Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma (NHL): alone or with other chemotherapy medicines. 1072 Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL): with the chemotherapy medicines fludarabine and cyclophosphamide. 1073 1074 Rheumatoid Arthritis (RA): with another prescription medicine called methotrexate, to reduce the signs and symptoms of moderate to severe active RA in adults, after treatment with at least 1075 1076 one other medicine called a Tumor Necrosis Factor (TNF) antagonist has been used and did not work well enough. 1077 1078 Wegener's Granulomatosis (WG) and Microscopic Polyangiitis (MPA): with glucocorticoids, to treat WG and MPA. 1079 1080 People with serious infections should not receive Rituxan. $\begin{array}{c} 1081 \\ 1082 \end{array}$ It is not known if Rituxan is safe or effective in children What should I tell my doctor before receiving Rituxan? 1083 Before receiving Rituxan, tell your doctor if you: 1084 have had a severe infusion reaction to Rituxan in the past 1085 have a history of heart problems, irregular heart beat or chest pain 1086 1087 have lung or kidney problems 1088 have an infection or weakened immune system. 1089 have or have had any severe infections including: 1090 Hepatitis B virus (HBV) Hepatitis C virus (HCV) 1091 • 1092 Cytomegalovirus (CMV) • 1093 Herpes simplex virus (HSV)

Varicella zoster virus (chickenpox or shingles)

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- have had a recent vaccination or are scheduled to receive vaccinations. You should not receive certain vaccines before or after you receive Rituxan. Tell your doctor if anyone in your household is scheduled to receive a vaccination. Some types of vaccines can spread to people with a weakened immune system, and cause serious problems.
- have taken Rituxan for WG or MPA in the past.
- have any other medical conditions
- are pregnant or planning to become pregnant. Rituxan may affect the white blood cell counts of your unborn baby. It is not known if Rituxan may harm your unborn baby in other ways.
- Women who are able to become pregnant should use effective birth-control (contraception) while using Rituxan and for 12 months after you finish treatment. Talk to your doctor about effective birth control.
- are breast-feeding or plan to breast-feed. It is not known if Rituxan passes into your breast milk. You and your doctor should decide the best way to feed your baby if you receive Rituxan.
- Tell your doctor about all the medicines you take, including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Especially tell your doctor if you take or have taken:
 - a Tumor Necrosis Factor (TNF) inhibitor medicine
 - a Disease Modifying Anti-Rheumatic Drug (DMARD)
- 1114 If you are not sure if your medicine is one listed above, ask your doctor or pharmacist.
- 1115 Know the medicines you take. Keep a list of them to show to your doctor and pharmacist when you
- get a new medicine. Do not take any new medicine without talking with your doctor.
- 1117 How will I receive Rituxan?

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- Rituxan is given by infusion through a needle placed in a vein (intravenous infusion), in your arm. Talk to your doctor about how you will receive Rituxan.
- Your doctor may prescribe medicines before each infusion of Rituxan to reduce side effects of infusions such as fever and chills.
- Your doctor should do regular blood tests to check for side effects to Rituxan.
- Before each Rituxan treatment, your doctor or nurse will ask you questions about your general
- health. Tell your doctor or nurse about any new symptoms.
- 1125 What are the possible side effects of Rituxan?
- Rituxan can cause serious and life-threatening side effects, including:
- 1127 See "What is the most important information I should know about Rituxan?"
- **Hepatitis B virus (HBV) reactivation.** If you have had hepatitis B or are a carrier of hepatitis B virus, receiving Rituxan could cause the virus to become an active infection again. Hepatitis B reactivation may cause serious liver problems including liver failure, and death. You should not receive Rituxan if you have active hepatitis B liver disease. Your doctor should monitor you for
- hepatitis B infection during and for several months after you stop receiving Rituxan.
- **Serious infections.** Serious infections can happen during and after treatment with Rituxan, and can lead to death. Rituxan can lower the ability of your immune system to fight infections.
- 1136 Types of serious infections that can happen with Rituxan include bacterial, fungal, and viral
- infections. After receiving Rituxan, some patients have developed low levels of certain
- antibodies in their blood for a long period of time (longer than 11 months). Some of these

- patients with low antibody levels developed infections. Call your doctor right away if you have any symptoms of infection:

 o fever
 - o cold symptoms, such as runny nose or sore throat that do not go away
 - o flu symptoms, such as cough, tiredness, and body aches
 - earache or headache
 - o pain during urination
 - o white patches in the mouth or throat
 - o cuts, scrapes or incisions that are red, warm, swollen or painful
- **Heart problems.** Rituxan may cause chest pain and irregular heart beats which may need treatment, or your doctor may decide to stop your treatment with Rituxan.
- **Kidney problems,** especially if you are receiving Rituxan for NHL. Your doctor should do blood tests to check how well your kidneys are working.
- Stomach and Serious bowel problems that can sometimes lead to death. Bowel problems, including blockage or tears in the bowel can happen if you receive Rituxan with chemotherapy medicines to treat non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. Tell your doctor right away if you have any stomach area pain during treatment with Rituxan.
- **Low blood cell counts.** Your doctor may do blood tests during treatment with Rituxan to check your blood cell counts.
 - o **White blood cells.** White blood cells fight against bacterial infections. Low white blood cells can cause you to get infections, which may be serious. See "Increased risk of infections" above for a list of symptoms of infection.
 - o **Red blood cells.** Red blood cells carry oxygen to your body tissues and organs.
 - o **Platelets.** Platelets are blood cells that help your blood to clot.

1163 Common side effects during Rituxan treatment include:

- infusion reactions (see What is the most important information I should know about Rituxan?)
- 1165 chills

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- 1166 infections
- body aches
- 1168 tiredness
- 1169 low white blood cells
- 1170 Other side effects with Rituxan include:
- aching joints during or within hours of receiving an infusion
- more frequent upper respiratory tract infection
- Tell your doctor about any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.
- 1174 These are not all of the possible side effects with Rituxan. For more information, ask your doctor or
