The Eco-Healthy Child Care Checklist offers these easy-to-follow steps that will immediately benefit the health and well-being of all the children in your care.



Follow these instructions to get started on going green!

1. Answer all 30 questions on the checklist.	2. Comply with at least 24 of 30 items, including #1, #6 and #11, which are required.	3. If you can't answer "yes" to 24 items, take steps to make improvements. Visit www. oeconline.org/ ehcc for tips and tools.	4. FALSE TRUE **Pesticides and Pest Prevention**

- **O O I.** We use non-toxic techniques both inside and outside the facility to prevent and control pests (both insects and weeds). If a serious threat remains and pesticide application is the only viable option, parents are notified in advance and a licensed professional applies the least toxic, effective product at a time when children will not be exposed to the application area for at least 12 hours (see manufacturer's instructions to ensure 12 hours is enough time). **REQUIRED**
- OOO 2. We thoroughly wash all fruits and vegetables to avoid possible exposure to pesticides, and we take the opportunity to educate children about the importance of doing so.

Air Quality

- OOO 3. We avoid conditions that lead to excess moisture, because moisture contributes to the growth of mold and mildew. We maintain adequate ventilation (suitable fans or open screened windows). We repair water leaks and keep humidity within a desirable range (30-50%).
- **O O O 5.** We do not use scented or unscented candles or manufactured air fresheners.
- **OO 6.** During operating hours, we do not permit smoking anywhere on the premises or in sight of children. (Note: For the healthiest environment for children and staff, smoking should not be allowed on the premises at any time). REQUIRED

Household Chemicals

- **O O O 7.** We use biodegradable, non-toxic cleaning products and least-toxic disinfecting and sanitizing products. When other products are required, they are used only for their intended purpose and in strict accordance with all label instructions. We store cleaning products where children cannot access them.
- **O O O 8.** We use chlorine bleach only when and where it is required or recommended by state and local authorities. We use it prudently and never use more than necessary.
- **O O O 9.** We do not use aerosol sprays of any kind.

Lead

- OOO 11. To avoid possible lead exposure from water lines, we use only cold water for drinking, cooking and making baby formula. We run the water for 10-30 seconds or until it feels noticeably colder. REQUIRED
- OOO 12. Our facility was built after 1978 (after lead paint was banned) OR the facility was built before 1978, but we keep the building free of flaking or peeling paint and regularly wash all areas around doors and windows. We use lead safe practices when removing lead-based paint or when renovating our facility, and we have visited www.epa.gov/lead to learn more.
- OOO 13. To avoid possible lead exposure, we do not use imported, old or handmade pottery to cook, store or serve food or drinks.
- OOO 14. To reduce possible exposure to lead-contaminated dirt, we supply a rough mat at the entrance of our facility and encourage the wiping of shoes before entering - or - we are a shoe-free facility.
- OOO 15. We check our toys for lead by searching www.healthytoys.org or by purchasing lead testing kits at a local home improvement store.

Mercury

O O 16. We do not use any mercury-containing thermometers or thermostats. Instead we use digital options.

For proper disposal of mercury-containing thermometers, fluorescent light bulbs, and batteries, please visit www.earth911.org/search to find a nearby hazardous waste recycling facility.

Furniture and Carpets

- OO 18. To avoid possible exposure to flame retardants, we ensure furniture is in good condition without foam or inside stuffing exposed. Stuffed animals, matting, pillows and other foam items are also intact.
- OOO 19. Furniture is made of solid wood, with few, if any items made of particleboard. Visit CHEC's HealtheHouse website – www.checnet.org/healthehouse – and type in "furniture".
- **OOO 20.** We do not have professionally installed wall-to-wall carpeting where children are present.

Art Supplies

Look for ACMI non-toxic seals: AP, AP New, AP + PC, CL, CP, HL/CR, HL/NT at www.acminet.org.

Plastics and Plastic Toys

- OOO 23. We avoid toys made out of soft plastic vinyl (such as vinyl dolls, beach balls, and "rubber ducky" chew toys). Instead, we buy only those labeled "PVC-free".
- OOO 24. When using a microwave, we never heat children's food in plastic containers, plastic wrap or plastic bags.
- $\bigcirc \bigcirc \bigcirc 25$. We never use baby bottles or sippy cups made of hard clear plastic (bottles labeled #7). Instead, we use bottles made of opaque plastic or glass. Visit Oregon Environmental Council's website - www.oeconline.org - and type in "safe plastics guide".

Treated Playground Equipment

O O O 26. We do not have playground equipment made of treated wood – or – if we do, we seal it with paint or a polyurethane coating twice a year. Visit CHEC's HealtheHouse website www.checnet.org/healthehouse - and type in "treated wood".

Radon

O O O 27. We have appropriately checked our facility for radon by using a radon testing kit available from a local home improvement store and have visited www.epa.gov/radon for local resources.

Recycling and Garbage Storage

- **O O O 28.** We recycle all paper, cardboard, glass, aluminum and plastic bottles.
- 🔾 🔿 🖸 **29.** We keep our garbage covered at all times to avoid attracting pests and to minimize odors.
