• New Funding Opportunity for Mobility Management

The National Center for Senior Transportation (NCST) expects to award eight grants with a maximum award of \$50,000 each for mobility management projects that demonstrate innovative and effective solutions to enhance transportation options for older adults through person-centered mobility management. The focus of all the grants is on older adults, although projects may also target adults with disabilities. A focus on culturally and ethnically diverse older adults is strongly encouraged.

The national health reform legislation's most basic objective may be covering the uninsured. The Congressional Budget Office predicts that 60 percent of the uninsured will gain coverage once the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), the largest health coverage expansion since the 1960s and perhaps the largest in history, is fully phased in.

Some recent federal health reforms, such as insurance subsidies for laid-off workers, fell far short of their enrollment goals. Others, such as low-income subsidies for Medicare prescription drug coverage, exceeded expectations. Will the ACA reach its target population? How can the federal government help uninsured Americans sign up for health coverage? What stands in the way?

Top experts will analyze past successes and failures, key features of the ACA and the policy choices facing federal officials as they decide how to implement the new law.

26 Organizations Awarded Hospital Engagement Networks Funding Affordable Care Act funding will help health providers identify and spread local ideas, improve care, reduce preventable healthcare acquired conditions

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) recently announced \$218 million will go to 26 states, regional, national, or hospital system organizations to become Hospital Engagement Networks. With the award, these organizations will have new resources and support to make health care safer and less costly by targeting and reducing the millions of preventable injuries and complications from healthcare acquired conditions. They will help identify solutions already working to reduce healthcare acquired conditions, and work to spread them to other hospitals and health care providers.

"At some point in our lives many of us are going to need hospital care and we need to be confident that no matter where we live, we're going to get the best care in the world," said HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius. "The Partnership for Patients is helping the nation's finest health systems share their knowledge and resources to make sure every hospital knows how to provide all of its patients with the highest quality care." New Reports

• Money Follows the Person: A 2011 Survey of Transitions, Services and Costs

A total of 44 states, including the District of Columbia, have received federal grant money to transition Medicaid beneficiaries out of institutions and back to their homes or the community through the Money Follows the Person (MFP) demonstration. Enacted into law in 2006 as part of the Deficit Reduction Act (DRA) and extended under the Affordable Care Act (ACA), MFP offers states the opportunity to receive enhanced federal matching funds for twelve months for each Medicaid beneficiary that transitions back to a community setting. Over the past year, thirteen states have applied and received funding to begin a MFP demonstration joining the 30 states currently operating MFP demonstration programs. In August 2011, the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured (KCMU) surveyed states about the current status of their MFP demonstrations inquiring about trends in enrollment, services and per capita spending. The 2011 annual survey highlights findings based on responses from all 44 MFP states.

• Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services Programs: Data Update

More than two decades after the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act, developing home and community-based services (HCBS) alternatives to institutional care has remained a priority for many state Medicaid programs. While the majority of Medicaid long-term care dollars still go toward institutional care, the national percentage of Medicaid spending on HCBS has more than doubled from 19 percent in 1995 to 43 percent in 2009. Building on previous policy initiatives to rebalance long-term services and supports, the 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) provided new opportunities to further state efforts to expand community-based care for seniors and people with disabilities under Medicaid. However, many states continue to wrestle with the ongoing impacts of a struggling economy, creating uncertainties for continued progress. This report, based on annual data tracking conducted by the Kaiser Commission on Medicaid and the Uninsured

and researchers at the University of California, San Francisco over the past ten years, presents a summary of the main trends to emerge from the latest (2008) expenditures and participant data for the three main Medicaid HCBS programs: (1) optional 1915(c) HCBS waivers, (2) the mandatory home health benefit, and (3) the optional state plan personal care services benefit. It also presents 2010 findings on the policies used in these three programs, including eligibility criteria, provider, service and waiting list data, as well as provider reimbursement rates for the home health benefit and the personal care services benefit.
