## HHS Officials to Celebrate African American History Month with DC Seniors

HHS Assistant Secretary for Aging Kathy Greenlee will be joined by Caya Lewis, Chief of Staff, Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) at a special program to celebrate African American History Month on Wednesday, February 16 in Washington, DC. The program, "Your History Your Health" is jointly sponsored by the Administration on Aging (AoA), CMS, the DC Office on Aging, and the National Caucus and Center on Black Aged (NCBA), and it will be held at the Hattie Holmes Senior Wellness Center.

The event will focus on improving health and promoting independence among African American elders. Participants will be able to take advantage of a number of health and wellness screenings to be offered by the Virginia Hospital Center. Health insurance counselors from the DC Office on Aging will also be available for one-on-one discussions.

## **2011 Poverty Guidelines**

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services recently released the 2011 Poverty Guidelines, which affect financial eligibility for federal and state programs such as the Medicare Part D Extra Help/Low-Income Subsidy, Medicare Savings Programs, Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, and more. For an individual in the 48 contiguous states and DC in 2011, the poverty level is \$10,890 (\$13,600 in Alaska, \$12,540 in Hawaii); for couples, it is \$14,710 (\$18,380 in Alaska, \$16,930 in Hawaii). ## **OWH Steps Up Heart Attack Awareness Efforts**

Recently the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office on Women's Health (OWH) and its partners introduced a new national initiative to increase awareness and recognition of the seven most common heart attack symptoms among women and to encourage the use of the 9-1-1 emergency response system when these symptoms occur.

The *Make the Call, Don't Miss A Beat* campaign aims to educate, engage and empower women and their families to recognize the seven symptoms of a heart attack that most commonly present themselves in women. This initiative includes a comprehensive public service advertising campaign including: TV, radio, print, and outdoor materials; a campaign website; a strong social and news media effort; and partner- and community-based outreach.

Although heart disease is the number one killer of women and awareness of this fact continues to grow from year to year, increased education remains a challenge. Only half of the women who participated in a recent American Heart Association (AHA) survey recognized chest pain and pain in the arm, neck and shoulders as typical symptoms of a heart attack. Even fewer women could identify other common heart attack symptoms, including shortness of breath (29-percent), chest tightness (17-percent), nausea (15-percent), and fatigue (7-percent).

## FDA Approves Viibryd to Treat Major Depressive Disorder

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Viibryd tablets (vilazodone hydrochloride) to treat major depressive disorder in adults.

Major depressive disorder, also called major depression, is characterized by symptoms that interfere with a person's ability to work, sleep, study, eat, and enjoy once-pleasurable activities. Episodes of major depression often recur throughout a person's lifetime, although some may experience only a single occurrence.
