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Redesign of Medicare. Gov to Improve Online Experience for Beneficiaries

A redesign of the medicare.gov website is now complete, making content more accessible and easier for beneficiaries, their families and caregivers to understand. Today's redesign, announced by Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Acting Administrator Marilyn Tavenner, supports CMS's commitment to provide better customer service.

The new design responds to mobile devices, like tablets and smartphones. Users can get information such as coverage and cost details, anytime, anywhere, and in the most convenient format. Medicare beneficiaries, counselors, and caregivers can check if a letter they received in the mail is an official communication from Medicare by viewing descriptions of Medicare mailings. The popular "Medicare & You" handbook now has its own landing page for an easy access complement to the annual print mailing.

The new site will allow most users to find the content they're looking for directly from the home page. These features include:

- A search for whether a specific test, item, or service is covered under original Medicare;
- The ability to get customized information based on a beneficiary's specific situation;

• Quick links to replace a lost Medicare card, find a Medicare Advantage or prescription drug plan, and get help with health care costs.

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HHS Partners with Pharmacies to Educate Medicare Beneficiaries about New Health Benefits

This week, Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced partnerships with several pharmacies to help customers learn about new Medicare benefits available to them under the Affordable Care Act – the health care law. These partnerships – with CVS Caremark, Walgreens, Thrifty White, Walmart, and Sam's Club – will provide Medicare beneficiaries a range of educational materials on newly available preventive services, as well as savings on prescription drug spending in the "donut hole" coverage gap.

Some examples of how pharmacy partners are working to increase awareness of preventive services available under Medicare include the following:

- CVS Caremark is distributing material about new preventive services covered at no cost to beneficiaries at its more than 7,300 CVS/pharmacy stores and 600 MinuteClinic locations, through brochures, register receipt messages and online.
- Thrifty White Pharmacy is providing information on preventive services through its 85 locations throughout the Midwest.
- Walgreens is distributing information in nearly 8,000 pharmacies and over 350 Take Care Clinic locations, as well as using in-store announcements and providing this information as part of its Walgreens Way to Well Health Tour with AARP.
- HHS is working with Walmart and Sam's Club to provide healthcare information to their shoppers online.

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People with Medicare Save More Than \$4.1 Billion on Prescription Drugs

18 million with Medicare also receive free preventive services in the first seven months of 2012

Nearly 5.4 million seniors and people with disabilities have saved more than \$4.1 billion on prescription drugs as a result of the Affordable Care Act, Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced yesterday. Seniors in the Medicare prescription drug coverage gap known as the "donut hole" have saved an average of \$768. During the first seven months of 2012, the new health care law has helped nearly 18 million people with original Medicare get at least one preventive service at no cost to them.

The health care law includes benefits to make Medicare prescription drug coverage more affordable. In 2010, anyone with Medicare who hit the prescription drug donut hole received a \$250 rebate. In 2011, people with Medicare who hit the donut hole began receiving a 50 percent discount on covered brand-name drugs and a discount on generic drugs. These discounts and Medicare coverage gradually increase until 2020 when the donut hole is fully closed.

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New CDC Recommendations on Hepatitis C for "Baby Boomers"

Last week the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) published "Recommendations for the Identification of Chronic Hepatitis C Virus Infection Among Persons Born During 1945–1965," new recommendations that call for all Americans born from 1945 through 1965 or "baby boomers" to get a one-time blood test for the hepatitis C virus (HCV).

In the United States, hepatitis C is the leading cause of liver transplants and primary liver cancer, which is the fastest-rising cause of cancer-related deaths. People born from 1945 through 1965 currently account for more than 75% of adults infected with hepatitis C in the U.S. and are five times more likely to be infected than other adults. Each year, more than 15,000 Americans, most of them baby boomers, die from hepatitis C-related illness, such as cirrhosis and liver cancer. Unfortunately, over the last decade, deaths have been increasing steadily. Without expanded access to HCV testing, care, and treatment, mortality among those living with HCV infection will continue to rise into the next decade.

New treatments are now available that can cure up to 75% of infections, and even more promising treatments are expected in the future. Linking individuals to appropriate care and treatment would prevent the costly consequences of liver cancer and other chronic liver diseases and ultimately save more than 120,000 lives. 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NASUAD to Offer Continuing Education Credits at the HCBS Conference and for Online Trainings

The National Association of State Units on Aging and Disability (NASUAD) is committed to strengthening the aging and disability networks capacity through continuing educational opportunities. Towards that effort, it is pleased to announce that social work continuing education units (CEUs) will be available at the HCBS Conference (September 11-13, 2012).

Licensed Social Workers may obtain up to 13 CEUs by attending sessions that have been approved by the National Association of Social Workers (NASW). The flat fee for CEUs for the entire conference is \$85. Conference attendees will have the opportunity to register for CEU credit on-site, and will be required to sign an attendance sheet and complete an evaluation after each conference session. State licensure boards have final authority on the acceptance of individual courses so attendees should check with their state social work board if they are unsure whether the HCBS conference sessions will be accepted.

CEUs for social workers are also available for several of NASUAD's online courses at NASUAD IQ. To access the online trainings go to www.nasuadIQ.org. This will bring you to the full list of classes, ordered chronologically by when they were added. Scroll down to find the Courses that offer CEUs, indicated in red. You must log in to take the courses.

If you have already taken and passed the above courses, you must retake the quizzes. In order to obtain Social Work CEUs, then follow the instructions at the end of the quiz to complete the course evaluation and pay for the CEUs. NASUAD is charging \$25 per CEU. Each of the courses is worth two CEUs, so they are \$50/course.

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GoDirect Check Insert Update for August

This month, all federal benefit check recipients received an insert with their monthly check that emphasized the need to make the switch to electronic payments by March 1, 2013.

All Social Security check recipients received an insert featuring customer service representatives from Treasury's Electronic Payment Solution Center with a message about representatives being available to help.

Those who get Supplemental Security Income, Veterans Compensation and Pension or other federal benefit payments received a straightforward message about the law requiring them to make the switch to an electronic payment.

Step-by-step instructions on how to make the switch to direct deposit or the Direct Express® Debit MasterCard® card are included on the back of the insert. When you talk with the people you serve, ask them if they received one of these inserts and urge them to switch to electronic payments ahead of the deadline.
