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# OCCUPATIONAL EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES IN SAVANNAH, MAY 2011

Workers in the Savannah Metropolitan Statistical Area had an average (mean) hourly wage of \$19.32 in May 2011, about 11 percent below the nationwide average of \$21.74, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Regional Commissioner Janet S. Rankin noted that, after testing for statistical significance, wages in the local area were significantly higher than their respective national averages in 4 of the 22 major occupational groups, including production, and transportation and material moving. Fourteen groups had significantly lower wages than their respective national averages, including sales and related, healthcare practitioners and technical, and construction and extraction.

When compared to the nationwide distribution, local employment was more highly concentrated in 7 of the 22 occupational groups, including transportation and material moving; installation, maintenance, and repair; and sales and related. Conversely, 11 groups had employment shares significantly below their national representation, including production, business and financial operations, and office and administrative support. One occupational group—transportation and material moving—was chosen to illustrate the diversity of data available for any of the 22 major occupational categories. Savannah had 14,950 jobs in transportation and material moving, accounting for 10.2 percent of local area employment, significantly higher than the 6.7-percent share nationally. The average hourly wage for this occupational group locally was \$18.06, measurably above the national wage of \$15.96.

With employment of 6,930, hand laborers and freight, stock, and material movers was the largest occupation within the transportation and material moving group, followed by heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers (1,790) and industrial truck and tractor operators (1,130). Among the higher paying jobs were heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers, and industrial truck and tractor operators, with mean hourly wages of \$18.62 and \$17.53, respectively. At the lower end of the wage scale were hand packers and packagers (\$9.73) and driver/sales workers (\$10.69). Location quotients allow us to explore the occupational make-up of a metropolitan area by comparing the composition of jobs in an area relative to the national average. (See table 1.) For example, a location quotient of 2.0 indicates that an occupation accounts for twice the share of employment in the area than it does nationally. In the Savannah Metropolitan Statistical Area, above average concentrations of employment were found in many of the occupations within the transportation and material moving group. For instance, hand laborers and freight, stock, and material movers were employed at 2.9 times the national rate in Savannah, and industrial truck and tractor operators at 2.0 times the U.S. average. On the other hand, heavy and tractor-trailer truck drivers had a location quotient of 1.0 in Savannah, indicating that this particular occupation's local and national employment shares were similar.

These statistics are from the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey, a federal-state cooperative program between BLS and State Workforce Agencies, in this case, the Georgia Department of Labor. The OES survey provides estimates of employment and hourly and annual wages for wage and salary workers in 22 major occupational groups and nearly 800 detailed occupations for the nation, states, metropolitan statistical areas, metropolitan divisions, and nonmetropolitan areas.

<sup>(1)</sup> A positive percent difference measures how much the mean wage in Savannah is above the national mean wage, while a negative difference reflects a lower wage.

<sup>(2)</sup> Indicates a value of less than 0.05 percent.

OES wage and employment data for the 22 major occupational groups in the Savannah Metropolitan Statistical Area were compared to their respective national averages based on statistical significance testing. Only those occupations with wages or employment shares above or below the national wage or share after testing for significance at the 90-percent confidence level meet the criteria.

NOTE: A value that is statistically different from another does not necessarily mean that the difference has economic or practical significance. Statistical significance is concerned with the ability to make confident statements about a universe based on a sample. It is entirely possible that a large difference between two values is not significantly different statistically, while a small difference is, since both the size and heterogeneity of the sample affect the relative error of the data being tested.

#### **Technical Note**

The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey is a semiannual mail survey measuring occupational employment and wage rates for wage and salary workers in nonfarm establishments in the United States. Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands also are surveyed, but their data are not included in the national estimates. OES estimates are constructed from a sample of about 1.2 million establishments. Forms are mailed to approximately 200,000 establishments in May and November of each year for a 3-year period. The nationwide response rate for the May 2011 survey was 77.3 percent based on establishments and 73.3 percent based on employment. May 2011 estimates are based on responses from six semiannual panels collected over a 3-year period: May 2011, November 2010, May 2010, November 2009, May 2009, and November 2008. The sample in the Savannah Metropolitan Statistical Area included 1,692 establishments with a response rate of 84 percent. The May 2011 OES estimates mark the first set of estimates based in part on data collected using the 2010 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system. Nearly all the occupations in this release are 2010 SOC occupations; however, some are not. The May 2012 OES data will reflect the full set of detailed occupations in the 2010 SOC. <sup>(3)</sup> The location quotient is the ratio of the area concentration of occupational employment to the national average concentration. A location quotient greater than one indicates the occupation has a higher share of employment than average, and a location quotient less than one indicates the occupation is less prevalent in the area than average.

<sup>(4)</sup> Annual wages have been calculated by multiplying the hourly mean wage by a 'year-round, full-time' hours figure of 2,080 hours; for those occupations where there is not an hourly mean wage published, the annual wage has been directly calculated from the reported survey data. (5)Estimate not released.
