WHAT ARE THE TRENDS IN HEALTH STATUS AND HEALTH CARE USE AMONG OLDER MEN?

On April 21 this year, the National Center for Health Statistics issued a report on risk factors and health status trends among older men in the United States. Did you know that more than 10 percent of men were age 65 or older in 2007? The report includes information on their use of health care and health care expenditures.

Since 1970, there has been a decline in death rates among older men, due in large part to declines in mortality from heart disease and stroke. Although the difference in life expectancy between older men and women has narrowed since 1980, a gap still remains, with life expectancy for men at any age continuing to remain lower than that for women. Older men and women do, however, have similar rates of visits to emergency rooms and doctor's offices, as well as similar rates of hospital admissions.

When it comes to living alone, older men are much less likely to live alone than older women; and they are much more likely to be living with a spouse. Worker Safety on the Farm

The National institute for Occupational Safety and Health has issued a flyer describing the number of work-related injuries that occur on farms and ways in

which to avoid such injuries. Tractor safety, machinery safety, animal safety, fall safety, and hired worker safety are highlighted. Many of the precautions presented pertain to safety off the farm as well. For example:

- "Be aware of the risk of overturn when operating an ATV. Use extra caution on uneven terrain..."
- "Do not overextend your body when working from a ladder or scaffolding... Utilize the 'three-point system' meaning that three of your four limbs are in contact with the ladder or vehicle at all times, either one hand and two feet, or two hands and one foot."
- "Be aware of animal behavioral characteristics;" and "Avoid quick movements and loud noises when working around animals."

Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge

Located in Manteo. North Carolina, the Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge is home to many species of wildlife, including one of the largest remaining concentrations of black bear along the mid-Atlantic Coast. In addition to the 250 species of birds that spend at least a portion of their time

there, you can also find endangered/threatened species on the Refuge, including the American alligator, American bald eagle, red wolf, and the redcockaded woodpecker.

If you enjoy paddling through the water, the Milltail Creek Canoe/Kayak Trails provide access to four trails totaling 15 miles with color-coded markers guiding you through remote waterways where a variety of wildlife and habitat types can be viewed. You might even hear the howl of a red wolf!
