


Local Area Personal Income: Rocky Mountain Region, 2010

• The Rocky Mountain region accounted for 3 percent of the nation's personal income in 2010. Rocky Mountain's per capita personal income, \$37,807, was 95 percent of the national average, \$39,937.



In the Rocky Mountain region in 2010:

- Personal income grew in 203 of 216 counties. The largest growth occurred in Cheyenne County, Colorado (26.6 percent), while the largest contraction occurred in Camas County, Idaho (-6.6 percent).
- Net earnings comprised 67 percent of personal income, while property income contributed 18 percent and transfer receipts made up 15 percent.
- Per capita personal income increased in 197 of 216 counties. Teton County, Wyoming had the highest per capita personal income at \$94,672, while Crowley County, Colorado had the lowest per capita personal income at \$16,299.
