Washington, D.C. December 1972 It gives me great pleasure to transmit to the Congress the Annual Report of the National Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts for fiscal year 1972.

This Nation's cultural heritage is a source of enormous pride. It is also a source of communication, of ideas, of joy and beauty. And increasingly -- and perhaps most important -- it is a source of creative self-expression for countless millions of Americans.

As this Annual Report shows, the National Endowment for the Arts has an outstanding record of accomplishment in advancing the artistic development of the Nation. Its funds during the year under review, \$29,750,000, were nearly double those of the previous year. Through its programs, the Endowment provides essential support for our famous cultural institutions — our opera, theatre, dance companies, our orchestras, our museums. The Endowment encourages our finest artists, providing new opportunities to gifted young creators and performers to expand their talent and to develop their careers. And the Endowment makes available to all of our people the very best our artists can do.

Under the guidance of the National Council on the Arts, the Endowment has effectively used its monies not only to support a wide range of cultural activities, but also to stimulate increased private support for the arts. I view this as essential, for if the arts are to flourish, the broad authority for cultural development must remain with the people of the Nation -- not with government.

As our Bicentennial approaches, the cultural activities of America will take on even greater importance. Our art expresses the ideals, the history, the life of the Nation. The cultural heritages of all nations whose citizens came to this country are part of the American heritage. The richness and diversity that characterize the whole of art in the United States reflect both our history and the promise of our future.

I invite every Member of Congress to share my pleasure at the many fine achievements of the National Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. And I urge the Congress to continue to make available to the Endowment the resources it needs to fulfill its hopeful task of bringing a more vital life to our Nation.

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FOREWORD

The months between July 1971 and June 1972 were among the most challenging in the history of the National Endowment for the Arts. Because of the backing of the President and the strong bipartisan support in Congress, the agency's funds nearly doubled over the previous year to a total of \$29,750,000 for fiscal 1972. The result was a fast-paced, creative, energetic time of expansion, innovation, and evaluation in which the Endowment continued to direct the use of its funds toward three major goals outlined by the National Council on the Arts:

Availability of the Arts -- to encourage the widest possible distribution of the nation's great cultural wealth.

<u>Cultural Resources Development</u> -- to strengthen our major cultural institutions so they can better serve the public.

Advancement of our Cultural Legacy -- to further the creative work of the nation's finest artists and to preserve our significant cultural heritage.

To these ends, existing programs have been expanded substantially—many reaching truly meaningful levels for the first time—and new programs have been launched to meet pressing needs that could not be dealt with at previous Endowment funding levels. Three program areas—Public Media, Architecture, and Museums—were enlarged in both funding and scope of activities. One completely new program, Expansion Arts, was developed to assist and encourage art at the community level. Long a concern of the National Council on the Arts, these community—based activities range from the rich folk heritage of Appalachia to the vibrant, creative arts of the inner city; from our diverse Indian legacy to the vital culture of Spanish—speaking Americans.

The Endowment's role has been and will continue to be that of a catalyst, encouraging many sources of support as well as new ideas and concepts for all the arts.

This agency's past record of generating \$3 to \$4 from outside sources for every federal dollar expended continues as an excellent indicator of growing public interest in the nation's cultural well-being.

Nevertheless, even with the generous increase in funding for the Arts Endowment this year, many problems remain to be solved and valid needs are not being adequately met. Art of the highest quality is still not available to millions of Americans, and financial problems continue to plague both artists and arts institutions. The performing arts, for example, face the dilemma of rising production costs while trying at the same time to keep ticket prices within reach of the public.

If we wish to make our cultural heritage available to all our citizens—a goal the National Council on the Arts believes imperative—then federal, state, local and private resources must be marshaled to insure increased access to art of the highest quality for all citizens.

Hence, efforts to insure wider availability of the arts, including more public service activities, are central to the Endowment's programs.

The past year has been tremendously stimulating and the National Council on the Arts recognizes that the importance of increased funding goes far beyond the dollar amounts. With the expansion of existing programs and initiation of new ones, many of the artistic disciplines are becoming partners for the first time with the federal effort to improve the quality of life for all Americans.

A new interaction among the disciplines is also developing and in this process we have seen the Endowment serving as a vital catalyst. Within the agency, all of the arts are represented under one roof; there are nearly 200 highly-respected experts in all the arts continually in contact with the staff and each other as panelists and consultants; and there are increasing discussions of the opportunities of each art form in relation to the others.

Some of the results of this interaction:

- --The Public Media Program is delving into the major area of creative media programming for the live arts.
- --There is cooperative joint programming in two or more art forms.
- --The Architecture Program is opening new vistas for multi-art involvement in our physical surroundings.

-- Through Endowment programs, artists and educators are combining their talents in classroom work which involves students in creative new patterns.

These are but a few examples of the interaction, but they are evidence that our cultural heritage is not composed of fragmented, isolated units, operating independently, but that it is a living, interdependent force of activities and ideas. The potential for communication and interaction in this cultural pattern is only just beginning to be explored.

In addition to expanding its programs of financial assistance for the arts nationally in fiscal 1972, the Endowment turned its attention to a new front: the quality of design within the Federal Government itself. At the request of the President, and in close cooperation with other federal agencies, the Endowment is currently involved in a major effort to upgrade design throughout the government.

The impetus for this effort began in 1971 when the President directed all federal agencies and departments to survey their operations as to how the arts could benefit their programs, and how their programs might assist artists. Based on the responses to this survey, the President in 1972 issued the first set of recommendations for improvement of federal design, and placed key responsibility on the Endowment. Action on these recommendations includes the following plans:

- --The Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, of which the Arts Endowment's Chairman is a member, will sponsor annual design assemblies for federal administrators and artists.
- --The National Endowment for the Arts will set up a task force to revise the <u>Guiding Principles of Federal</u>

 <u>Architecture</u> with the purpose of improving the quality of federal building design across the country.
- --The National Endowment for the Arts is also coordinating efforts to upgrade graphics in all federal agencies.
- --Concurrent with these activities, the Civil Service Commission is reviewing procedures for rating and employing artists for federal service.

Together, these actions within the Federal Government represent another significant step forward in making art an integral force in the improvement of the quality of life for all Americans.

THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS

The National Endowment for the Arts, an independent agency of the Federal Government, carries out programs of grants-in-aid to arts agencies of the States and U.S. jurisdictions, to nonprofit, tax-exempt organizations, and to individuals of exceptional talent.

The Endowment is headed by a Chairman, nominated by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Miss Nancy Hanks was sworn in as Chairman on October 6, 1969 for a four-year term.

Grants by the Endowment to the State and jurisdictional arts councils under the Federal-State Partnership Program are made in accordance with the terms set forth in The National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities Act of 1965, as amended, and are administered by the individual arts agencies. The Endowment's other programs are developed by the Chairman and the staff, with the advice of the National Council on the Arts. As a general rule, applications for grants, which fall within the the established programs of the Endowment, are referred to panels of experts chosen from all regions of the United States. The recommendations of the panels are brought before the National Council for review, and to the Chairman for final determination.

THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION ON THE ARTS AND THE HUMANITIES

The National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities was established as an independent agency of the Executive Branch of the Federal Government by the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities Act of 1965. The Act, Public Law 89-209, was last amended by Public Law 91-346 in 1970.

The National Foundation is composed of the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Humanities. The two Endowments, advised by their respective Councils, formulate their own programs, but share an administrative staff.

The Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, established within the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities by the Act of 1965, is composed of the Chairmen of the two Endowments, the United States Commissioner of Education, the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, the Director of the National Science Foundation, the Librarian of Congress, the Director of the National Gallery of Art, the Chairman of the Commission of Fine Arts, the Archivist of the United States, a member designated by the Secretary of State, and a member designated by the Secretary of the Interior. The Federal Council promotes coordination between the two Endowment's programs and those of other Federal agencies which support the arts and humanities, and plans and coordinates participation of its members' agencies in major and historical national events.

THE NATIONAL COUNCIL ON THE ARTS

The National Council on the Arts is composed of the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, who serves as Chairman of the Council, and 26 private citizens, appointed by the President, who are widely recognized for their broad knowledge of the arts, or for their experience or their profound interest in the arts.

The Council advises the Chairman on policies, programs, and procedures, and reviews and makes recommendations on applications for financial assistance made to the National Endowment.

ARCHITECTURE + ENVIRONMENTAL ARTS PROGRAM

The Architecture + Environmental Arts Program seeks to influence the quality of the man-made environment in this country. Facilities which serve the cultural and artistic interests of the community are given particular emphasis.

For the purposes of this program, "environmental arts" includes those arts and professions whose main concern is the shaping of the physical environment.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$785,162 were made.

DANCE PROGRAM

The Dance Program offers support to touring, under the coordinated residency program and the large company touring program; it assists the regional development of resident professional dance companies, provides for fellowships to choreographers, commissioning of visiting professional choreographers, services to the field, and management improvement.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$2,267,741 were made.

EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Education Program seeks to bring new vitality and humanity into the educational system through the arts. The program is implemented by sponsorship of creative artists in the schools (assisted by the Office of Education), exploration of alternative education forms, and pilot aid to constructive programs relative to the curricula and the arts.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$1,750,736 were made.

EXPANSION ARTS PROGRAM

The Expansion Arts Program provides aid to professionally directed, community-based arts organizations involved with urban, suburban, and rural communities. It emphasizes instruction at all levels, production of original works of art, promotion of cross-cultural exchange, creation of innovative art forms and arts-related activities, and neighborhood art services and projects as they involve the arts to help achieve educational and social goals.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$1,137,088 were made.

LITERATURE PROGRAM

The Literature Program assists creative writers and attempts to encourage greater audiences for their work by providing fellowships and indirect grants through the Nation's small literary magazines; by helping service organizations in the field; by funding the placement of professional writers in elementary and secondary school classrooms and in small developing colleges.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$636,050 were made.

MUSEUM PROGRAM

The Museum Program offers support to essential museum activities, including the mounting of special exhibitions, the utilization of existing collections in imaginative ways, the support of visiting specialists as short-term consultants, assistance with emergency conservation work and conservation training, technical consultants, renovation (climate control, security and storage only), the training of museum professionals, and the purchase of work of living American artists.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$4,149,273 were made.

MUSIC PROGRAM

The Music Program offers assistance to professional symphony orchestras and opera companies, aids national organizations engaged in audience development projects, encourages programs in jazz and contemporary music, and supports national organizations which serve the field of music.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$9,745,797 were made.

PUBLIC MEDIA PROGRAM

The Endowment for the Arts initiated a pilot program in Public Media (film, television and radio) this year which is being developed and refined. Current programs include support of: 1) production, research and development designed to improve the quality of arts programming on film, television and radio by professional individuals and organizations; regional film centers for exhibition and information services; 3) curriculum development, workshops and seminars aimed at improving the standards of film study in schools and colleges; and 4) film preservation, coordinated by The American Film Institute and carried out through the archival work of the several national collections of film. In addition, support was continued to The American Film Institute for its on-going programs in filmmaker training, education, independent filmmaker grants, research, publication, and information services.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$1,979,877 were made.

SPECIAL PROJECTS PROGRAM

The Special Projects Program is designed to fulfill specific needs within the Endowment's total programming: to accommodate a limited number of special projects which do not fit other Endowment program guidelines, to provide a means of reviewing projects which involve two or more art forms or program areas, to make special grants to State Arts Councils, and to assist regional programming. The Special Projects Program is administered by the same staff which handles State and Community Operations.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$656,228 were made.

THEATRE PROGRAM

The Theatre Program is conceived in terms of continuity and development and is directed toward professional groups. Its aim is to assist and stimulate creative activity in the theatre arts and to raise artistic standards through support of the performing institutions which sustain the artists and craftsmen of the theatre.

The program includes aid to professional companies, experimental theatres, new play producing groups, and playwright development activities.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$2,696,000 were made.

VISUAL ARTS PROGRAM

The Visual Arts Program provides assistance for individual painters, sculptors, printmakers and photographers of exceptional talent; for the commissioning and placement of art works in public spaces; for short-term residencies of artists, critics, craftsmen, and photographers in educational and cultural institutions; and for a variety of flexible programs, including workshops, short-term activities, and artists' services.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$940,505 were made.

FEDERAL-STATE PARTNERSHIP

A central purpose of the Federal arts program has been to stimulate support for the arts by the States. To this end, the Congress appropriates money to the Endowment for the specific use of official State arts agencies. These appropriations, known as Federal-State Partnership Funds, are divided equally among the States and the five jurisdictional arts councils (with the exception of Guam and American Samoa which may receive a maximum of \$65,000 each) and are awarded to State councils in the form of a matching grant.

The program is administered by the State and Community Operations staff. Each year every State council is required to submit an application detailing its programming plans for the year which must be approved by the Chairman of the Endowment after review by staff and the National Council on the Arts.

In addition to the Federal-State Partnership grants, State councils apply for and receive substantial funding under other Endowment programs. Two Endowment programs in particular are currently funded almost entirely through grants to State arts councils: the Artists-in-Schools Program and the Coordinated Residency Touring Program in Dance.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, grants of \$5,476,020 were made. In general, each State council received \$101,320 under the Federal-State Partnership.

THE TREASURY FUND

THE TREASURY FUND

At the close of Fiscal Year 1972, the National Endowment for the Arts had received a total of more than \$13 million in private and other non-federal donations during the seven years of its existence. This impressive record of non-federal giving reinforces the validity of the concept of federal-private partnership written into the Endowment's legislation at its inception.

The legislation establishing the Endowment includes a unique provision which enables this federal agency to work in partnership with private and other non-federal sources of funding for the arts. Designed to encourage and stimulate private funding for the arts, the Treasury Fund method of granting encourages non-federal contributors to join the Endowment in the grant-making process.

The Endowment's Treasury Fund consists of funds appropriated by the Congress which are earmarked for use when gifts are made to the Endowment by sources outside the Federal Government. When a donation is received and accepted, it frees an equal amount from the Treasury Fund, and the doubled amount is then made available to the grantee, again on a matching basis.

The Endowment encourages use of the Treasury Fund method as a means of producing larger awards. The Fund is an especially effective way of combining federal and private support, and is an encouragement to any potential donor, particularly of new sources of funds, for the donor will reap \$4 in benefits for his \$1 donation (his \$1 plus the Endowment's \$1, plus the grantee's matching \$2). Almost all Endowment grants fund only half the total budget of a project.

Gifts may be made to the Endowment for unrestricted purposes or for the specific support of a particular arts organization -- such as a symphony orchestra, a museum, a dance, opera, or theatre company. Gifts may also be made to the Endowment for support of a particular program within the Endowment such as fellowships, conferences, and workshops. In the case of restricted gifts, either for a specific organization or purpose, the recommendation of the Council must first be obtained.

During the Fiscal Year 1972, the Endowment for the Arts accepted a total of \$3.5 million in gifts to the Treasury Fund, representing approximately 950 donations ranging in amounts as small as \$1 to more than \$100,000.

The Endowment is gratified by the continued non-federal support for the arts as manifested in the increasing number of gifts made to the Treasury Fund for the benefit of arts activities and organizations in all regions of our country. It is with appreciation and pride that the Endowment acknowledges the generosity of the Fiscal Year 1972 Treasury Fund contributors who are listed on the following pages.
