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Chairman's Statement

The descriptions of the 5,247 grants listed in this Annual Report 1983 represent the rich variety of artistic creativity taking place throughout the country. They are testimony to the central importance of the arts in American life and to the fundamental fact that the arts are not only alive, but in many cases, flourishing.

Let me reaffirm certain basic principles:

- Support of the arts is "primarily a matter for private and local initiative." This felicitous phrase from the declaration of purpose in our enabling statute underscores Congressional recognition that arts support has historically been and should remain largely a matter of private, local concern. Our unique American system has drawn thousands of our citizens into the role of patron. No single voice or set of tastes dominates. The vitality and pluralism of the arts in America would be undermined if this broad nature of support tilted too far in one direction or was left in the hands of too few decision makers.
- There is, nonetheless, an appropriate role for the Federal Government. We should, through the Endowment, continue our role of enhancing and strengthening excellence in, access to, and appreciation of the arts. In performing our mission, we will continue our efforts to encourage new and increased non-federal support—public and private.
- The Endowment's decision making is based primarily on the principle of peer panel review and advice from the National Council on the Arts. This system has served the public interest, creating both the fact and the appearance of due process. We affirm again the importance of this review system.

Let me also affirm this administration's commitment to the work of the Endowment. President Reagan remarked last May: "... We support the work of the National Endowment for the Arts to stimulate excellence and make art more available to more of our people ... The Endowment also encourages private support. We owe a great deal of thanks to the members of the National Council on the Arts ..." More recently, Vice President Bush said in an address to the Business Council on the Arts

that the National Endowment has "been a strong catalyst in providing matching grants, advocacy, and information."

Based on the advice of the National Council on the Arts, we have recently adopted a Mission Statement (see Appendix) that defines our role as a partner in support of the arts in this country. The Mission Statement summarizes the purpose of the Endowment in two simple phrases:

- To foster the excellence, diversity, and vitality of the arts in the United States; and
- To help broaden the availability and appreciation of such excellence, diversity, and vitality. The first of these goals is simpler to achieve: to identify the best of our nation's artists and arts organizations and provide them with some level of support and federal recognition based on peer review. This is done directly through our single- and multiple-discipline programs in order to assist the creation, production, presentation/exhibition, and preservation of art of the highest level and of national or regional significance.

The second goal, availability and appreciation, requires a strategy that over time will reach all Americans. What is at stake here is nothing less than the completeness of the American spirit. Understanding and appreciation of art in our society is an essential part of understanding what it is to be an American. In both of these efforts, we will need to work closely with our public partners: the state and local arts agencies.

Let me now turn to some of the specific efforts we are undertaking to achieve our mission.

Recognition

We believe the Endowment must continue to exercise leadership in recognizing excellence wherever we find it, particularly in those areas where recognition is not so easily attained. I speak specifically of the experimental, seldom performed or exhibited, ethnic, and longer-term.

In May 1983, the President and Mrs. Reagan recognized six artists and six patrons of the arts at the White House. During a luncheon organized by the President's Committee on the Arts and Humanities,

the President asked me to explore with the Congress the possibility of creating a national medal in the arts. We have been working with the Congress to establish such a medal, which would be presented by Presidents to outstanding artists and patrons for their contributions to artistic excellence. The National Council on the Arts, the Endowment's principal advisory body would recommend the artists and patrons to be honored.

Programs

In the disciplines, we have been looking for longerterm opportunities that can help the various fields to move forward. We have completed nine meetings with experts in dance, design, media, music, operamusical theater, state and local arts support, theater, touring and presenting, and visual arts. Based on these meetings and advice from both our panels and the National Council on the Arts, I would note the following:

- Our Design Arts Program has been revised to concentrate more on advocacy, particularly with regard to the economic benefits that accrue from good design and cultural facilities, development of design competitions, and adaptive reuse of abandoned public buildings (e.g., schools, railway stations, etc.).
- We have increased emphasis on the Challenge and Advancement Programs to assist capital formation to permit arts institutions to achieve a greater capacity to take risks and produce their general repertoire with excellence. These programs are coordinated by our Deputy for Private Partnership.
- We are continuing to provide funding to assist the independent production of feature films and programming in the arts by public television. With the American Film Institute, we have started a new and comprehensive initiative to deal with the problem of film preservation. We are exploring a similar effort in the area of video preservation.
- We have begun an effort to supplement our national fellowship programs (in Visual Arts and Media Arts) with regional fellowships to provide recognition and support of artists in all parts of the country.
- To assist connections between artists and commercially controlled distribution and exhibition systems, we have instituted a program to publish short stories in ten daily newspapers. We hope to supplement this with the best of the nonprofit list this year. We are also exploring relationships between the commercial and nonprofit world in the areas of music, theater, media, and visual arts.
- We have recently adopted, on the advice of the National Council on the Arts, a new touring and presenting policy statement, recognizing the market place in which touring and presenting take

place and the different interests of the different parties (see Appendix).

- In Dance, we are beginning (in partnership with the Rockefeller Foundation and Exxon) a new project to provide dance company residencies for new choreographers. This is particularly needed in the field of ballet.
- In Theater, we are undertaking a new initiative to strengthen the use of ongoing ensembles. The artistic benefits of a repertory company system, like the Royal Shakespeare Company, are recognized. While this effort will not be appropriate for all theaters, it will enable some theaters to expand the potential of theater artists (actors, actresses, directors, set designers, etc.) to work together over time on different artistic productions.

Partnership

We have strengthened, and will continue to strengthen, our public and private partnership efforts. Some of these are reflected in my description of program initiatives:

The Local Arts Agencies Initiative: At the Endowment's last reauthorization. Congress emphasized the need for the Endowment to address in some concrete way the local nature of the arts. This issue had already been the subject of extensive discussion with our partners, the state and local agencies, and the National Council on the Arts. We have made a beginning by establishing the Test Program of Support for Local Arts Agencies (approved in November 1982). The Test Program is designed to test the ability of the Endowment to leverage sustainable increases in local government support for the arts, improve the processes for administering these monies at the local level, and improve planning (both among state and local public agencies and among arts institutions and their private supporters).

In June, this program received 43 applications involving 212 local arts agencies from 27 states. The Local Test Program Advisory Panel met in September and recommended for funding six State-Local Partnership Grant applications and five Direct Grants to local arts agencies. These 11 Fiscal 1984 grants were recommended at the November 1983 meeting of the National Council on the Arts.

Efforts in Arts Education: The need for improved arts education (kindergarten through twelfth grade) has emerged as a priority in virtually every artistic discipline area. It has also become a priority for state and local arts agencies and the National Council on the Arts. Building on the Artists in Education experience, we will seek to engage educators and schools, as well as artists and arts institutions, in an attempt to make the arts more a part of the lives and experiences of all Americans.

Let me now describe some of the efforts we are

either undertaking or exploring:

- Members of the arts community and arts educators attended Education Secretary Terrel Bell's National Forum on Excellence in Education in Indianapolis in December 1983. With the consent of the Department of Education, we have urged state arts agencies and artists in education coordinators to make sure that the chief state school officers in each of their states are aware of the importance of arts education, as recognized indirectly by the National Commission on Excellence in Education and directly by the College Board's Academic Preparation for College: What Students Need to Know and Be Able to Do.
- We have undertaken a study to identify and assess arts education programs in New England and New York, and to examine the public and private support systems that sustain these programs.
- We are exploring ways to use the unique capacities of television in the area of arts education. A research and development phase and two test programs for a television series exploring the arts is being considered in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities, the J. Paul Getty Trust, and the Children's Television Workshop.
- We are looking at possible ways to assist the education efforts of our arts institutions. Arts organizations all over the country, particularly museums and performing arts groups, have extensive outreach and educational activities.

The quality of teaching is of tremendous importance in determining educational success or failure. The program of summer seminars for secondary school teachers initiated by the Humanities Endowment was remarkably successful and we are considering a similar approach in the arts for both arts teachers and regular classroom teachers.

• Finally, we are exploring a variety of possible approaches to bring increased and improved arts education to local school districts. We plan four regional meetings to explore these possibilities.

Public Sector Support: We are continuing our efforts to develop closer and more effective cooperation among the public sector supporters of the arts at the national, state, and local levels. We regularly consult with other federal arts supporters-such as the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Institute for Museum Services, the Smithsonian Institution, the United State Information Agency-to coordinate our respective programs and avoid duplication of funding. Our Office of State Programs, which administers the Endowment funds set aside for state arts agencies, has helped the state and regional arts agencies support thousands of arts projects each year. These projects represent state and regional responses to local needs and demonstrate our conviction that the states and regions should determine their own program choices and priorities

for the block funding provided by the Endowment.

The health of public support for the arts at the state level is indicated be the continued steady growth in annual state appropriations to state arts agencies. State appropriations for FY 84 have increased by 9.5% to a new high of \$135,423,900. The appropriations of 44 state arts agencies now exceed the annual basic grants they receive from the Endowment. Also worth noting is increasing commitment to the arts by states other than New York. Whereas in Fiscal 1977, New York accounted for 52% of all state arts appropriations, in Fiscal 1984, it accounts for 26%—exactly half of the earlier percentage. Since the establishment of State Programs in 1966, state arts agencies have received appropriations totalling over \$1 billion.

Private Sector Support: In the private partnership area, we also have reason for optimism. The President has established a Committee on the Arts and the Humanities to encourage additional private support. At the Arts Endowment, we have established an Office for Private Partnership to coordinate the many efforts that our agency has always made to stimulate additional private funding for the arts.

The record of our Challenge Program is well known. \$110 million in federal funds have generated over \$800 million in new and increased private funding with many of the efforts still underway. We expect the private side of the Challenge Program to exceed \$1 billion as the Challenge Grants we announced a few months ago are matched. We have also doubled the size of our Advancement Program and broadened it so as to strengthen smaller institutions in all fields.

We are also working on a variety of specific projects to link the private sector in areas of national importance where private funding has been less evident. Examples include our partnership with the Rockefeller Foundation, A T & T, Warner Communications, and the New York State Council on the Humanities to assist the Brooklyn Academy of Music's Next Wave Touring and Production Fund. Last summer, we encouraged Continental Telecom to assist the second annual National Heritage Fellowship Awards. I have already mentioned the partnership with the Rockefeller Foundation and Exxon on choreography residencies. We are looking for partners to replace A T & T regarding the Bell Orchestra Tour and to secure additional funding for public television programming in the arts. (I should note that it was the Getty Foundation which approached us for using television in arts education.)

Of great encouragement is the fact that 1981 and 1982 witnessed real increases in giving to cultural institutions for the first time since 1976; this was so, notwithstanding the 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act. Private funding, as recorded by the American Association of Fundraising Council, went from \$2.96

billion in 1980 to \$3.35 billion in 1981 to \$3.67 billion in 1982 (excluding the capital portion of the Getty bequest). The most recent figures from the Business Committee on the Arts show that in 1982, corporations contributed \$506 million to the arts—an increase of 32% over 1981, notwithstanding a 45% increase in corporate earnings. These figures, while not precise, show a continuing and growing commitment on the part of the private sector to our nation's culture.

* * * * * *

In conclusion, there remains a steady bipartisan support for the work of the Endowment. There is an ever growing recognition of the catalytic nature of the Endowment's support and of its ability to exercise leadership in support of the arts. More importantly, the private local sources of support for the arts remain healthy and continue to grow. With inflation and interest rates now down, our prospects for the future are looking good. Our art and artists, like all our citizens, depend on it.

The Agency and Its Functions

The National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities

In 1965 Congress created the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities as an independent agency of the executive branch of federal government. The Foundation consists of the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities. The Foundation is a legislative umbrella concept; it has no administrative or programming identity separate from its components.

National Council on the Arts

Formed in 1964, the National Council on the Arts preceded by one year the establishment of the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities.

The Council is composed of the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, who serves as Chairman of the Council, and 26 presidentially appointed citizens who are recognized for their knowledge of the arts, or for their expertise or profound interest in the arts. The Council is mandated by law to advise the Chairman on policies, programs, and procedures. It also must review and make recommendations on applications for grants.

Council members serve six-year terms, staggered so that roughly one-third of all the Council rotates every two years.

National Endowment for the Arts

The National Endowment for the Arts, an independent agency of the federal government, was created in 1965 to encourage and support American art and artists. Its major goals are to foster artistic excellence by helping to develop the nation's finest creative talent, to preserve our cultural heritage in all its diversity, to make the arts available to wider, more informed audiences, and to promote the overall financial stability of American arts organizations.

The Endowment serves as a catalyst to increase opportunities for artists and to spur involvement in the arts by private citizens, public and private organizations, and the states and communities. The agency does not direct or interfere with the creative activities of individual artists or arts organizations. Rather, it acts as a partner with the arts-support

community, using federal resources to develop and promote a broadly conceived national policy of support for the arts.

Chairman of the Endowment

The Chairman of the Arts Endowment is appointed by the President of the United States, with the advice and consent of the Senate, for a term of four years. The Chairman provides overall direction to the work of the Endowment. By law, the Chairman makes final decisions on policies, programs, procedures, and the awarding of all grants and contracts.

Endowment Panels

The panels serve the individual Programs of the Endowment much as the National Council on the Arts serves the Endowment as a whole. Together the Council and panels provide a system of professional peer review to evaluate applications, identify problems, and develop the policies and programs through which the Endowment responds to changing conditions.

More than 600 private citizens serve on these panels, whose membership rotates regularly. Panelists are appointed by the Chairman with the advice of the staff and Council members, as well as organizations and leaders in the field.

Methods of Funding

Grant money authorized by Congress comes to the Endowment in program funds, the Treasury Fund, and Challenge Grant funds. Most direct grants to organizations and individuals come from program funds. Program grants to arts institutions must be matched at least dollar-for-dollar.

The Treasury Fund arrangement allows private donors to pledge gifts to specific Endowment grantees. Each pledge frees an equal amount for the grantee from the Treasury Fund, which is maintained at the Treasury Department. Grantees must then match the combined total of the donor's pledge plus the Treasury Fund disbursement.

Challenge Grants are awarded for projects that contribute to the long-term financial stability of grantee organizations and must be matched on at least a three-to-one basis.

Jazz

Includes eight subcategories: Performers who perform traditional, innovative, or extended forms of jazz are encouraged in their creative development through support of rehearsals, performances, or related expenses. Composers are given support for the creation of new works, the completion of works in progress, or reproduction of their scores. Jazz Study grants enable aspiring jazz performers and composers to study privately with recognized masters of jazz. Program Assistance grants help performing and presenting institutions improve performance quality and audience appreciation of jazz. Colleges and Universities are awarded grants for performance and presentation of jazz. Management Assistance is provided for improving management of jazz presenting or performing organizations. Jazz Special Projects covers specific projects not covered in other categories. Jazz Master Awards are given to distinguished masters who have significantly altered the language of the art form in the Afro-American tradition.

Statement of Mission

Preamble

This nation's governance is based on our people's commitment to freedom of imagination, thought, and expression. Our many aesthetic and cultural traditions are precious to us—for the rich variety of their beauty and as a symbol of the diverse nature of the United States.

Primary support for the arts has always come directly from the people of this nation: artists in localities all across the country who create and sustain the arts, and contributors who support the arts out of conviction and as a matter of civic and regional pride.

It was in this context that the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities Act was enacted in 1965. The Congress found that "the encouragement and support of national progress and scholarship in the humanities and the arts, while primarily a matter of private and local initiative, is also an appropriate matter of concern to the Federal Government..."

The Congress also found that "while no government can call a great artist or scholar into existence, it is necessary and appropriate for the Federal Government to help create and sustain not only a climate encouraging freedom of thought, imagination, and inquiry, but also the material conditions facilitating the release of this creative talent . . ."

Mission

The mission of the National Endowment for the Arts is:

• to foster the excellence, diversity, and vitality of the arts in the United States; and

• to help broaden the availability and appreciation of such excellence, diversity, and vitality.

In implementing its mission, the Endowment must exercise care to preserve and improve the environment in which the arts have flourished. It must not, under any circumstance, impose a single aesthetic standard or attempt to direct artistic content.

Implementation

Who: The Endowment assists individual artists, those who act on behalf of artists or audiences, organizations whose primary intention is artistic or educational, and state and local arts agencies. Demonstrated or potential excellence and capacity to conceive, develop, or present a work of art are primary criteria.

What: Endowment activities:

- Demonstrate national recognition of the importance of artistic excellence;
- Provide opportunities for artists to develop their talents;
- Assist in the creation, production, presentation/exhibition of innovative and diverse work that has potential to affect the art form and directly or indirectly result over time in new art of permanent value:
 - Assure the preservation of our cultural heritage;
- Increase the performance, exhibition, and transmission of art to all people throughout the nation;
- Deepen understanding and appreciation of the arts among all people nationwide;
- Encourage serious and meaningful art programs as part of basic education;
- Stimulate increasing levels of non-federal support of the arts;
- Improve the institutional capacity of the best of our arts organizations to develop, produce, present, and exhibit bold and varied fare; and
- Provide information about the arts, their artistic and financial health, and the state of their audiences.

How: The Endowment, in conjunction with private and public partners, carries out its mission through grants programs and a wide range of leadership and advocacy activities. The Endowment also serves as a national forum to assist in the exchange of ideas and as a catalyst to promote the best developments in the arts and education about them. The Endowment's grants programs include individual, project, and longer-term institutional support.

Endowment decision-making is guided by peer panel review and the National Council on the Arts and by additional advice from the artistic fields and their public and private supporters. The Endowment works closely with its public partners (the state and local arts agencies) to reflect regional, state, and local perspectives and assist cooperation in implementation of government arts support programs. The Endowment's programs are aimed at benefitting all people of this nation, regardless of sex, race, creed, national origin, handicap, age, or habitat.

Touring and Presenting Policy Statement

Introduction

This policy statement is to clarify the purposes of the National Endowment for the Arts in supporting touring and presenting of the performing, visual, and literary arts so that Federal funds may be focused as consistently and effectively as possible.

The Endowment, which began its support for touring and presenting in 1965, provides its support from a national perspective. State arts agencies, regional organizations, local arts agencies, and private sources support touring and presenting according to their own priorities and perspectives. Consultation with artists and arts organizations (producers and presenters), with state and local arts agencies, and with regional arts organizations has been a key factor in developing this policy statement and will continue to be an essential element of planning in this area.

Touring and presenting involve a complex marketplace of artists and art organizations, presenters, and audiences. This marketplace would contract substantially were it not for public and private subsidies.

Each party involved in this marketplace has different priorities, but overlapping interests. Generally,

- The principal priorities of artists and artsproducing organizations include improving their work, lengthening their seasons, augmenting their income, reaching audiences to broaden their experience, and developing their reputations—e.g., receiving critical media attention.
- The principal priorities of arts presenting organizations include providing the arts to their communities, expanding and developing their audiences, breaking even overall in the course of a season, and developing a reputation for the presentation of imaginative and varied seasons.
- The principal priorities of audiences are to have available a range of art experiences they can appreciate and prices they can afford.

Those who subsidize touring and presenting have different perspectives:

• Generally, the largest subsidy comes from private sources: the artists, trustees, and donors of the arts-producing and presenting organizations.

While there are no accurate statistics to measure, the largest portion of this private subsidy appears to come from the organization's home. Local supporters are interested in enhancing the quality of life in their communities and in enjoying the satisfaction of participating in and supporting the arts. Often, home support helps to subsidize touring outside the community, as when the fixed costs of the touring company are not incorporated into the performance fee. At the same time, such subsidy helps to extend the employment of the home community's artists and to enhance the vitality and reputation of its arts organizations. Further, presentation of touring companies often stimulates local artists and increases interest of audiences in their work.

• The National Endowment has an interest in the health of the arts nationally and supports artistic excellence wherever it may occur in the nation. The Endowment also has an interest in developing an audience for artistic excellence throughout the nation. Regional organizations, state arts agencies, and local arts agencies have similar interests in their respective areas. The perception of specific audience preferences, it should be noted, becomes sharper the closer to the audience the public agency is. The possible gap between present estimations of audience preferences and their potential capacity to appreciate a greater range of work is an area of interest to arts agencies at all levels

Touring and presenting of the performing, visual, and literary arts is a mechanism for meeting the interests of artists, arts organizations, presenters, and audiences. There are also other mechanisms: indigenous arts organizations, second homes for arts organizations, longer residencies on tour, and cooperative museum programming. In addition, there is the possibility of media presentation. This is different, but not always second best, and may in some cases be much more economical. The policies of those who provide subsidies need to weigh all relevant factors in deciding whether, and at what level, to provide them.

Policy

The National Endowment for the Arts is committed to touring and presenting:

- To assist artists and arts organizations to create, produce, and present more and better work;
- To make the best of the arts more widely available to the American people;
- To develop understanding and appreciation of a wide variety of art in communities across the country; and
- To enhance appreciation of artists and art forms deserving greater attention: experimental and seldom-performed work, and art forms and traditions whose continuity would be strengthened through touring.

Endowment support to these ends is provided through two complementary approaches:

- A. Assistance to Artists and Arts-Producing Organizations: Grants through Endowment Programs to artists and arts organizations are intended to enhance their capacity to create and produce art of the highest quality and of national or regional significance. These grants include support for artists' fees, touring and audience development. The structure of funding categories which provide support for touring to artists and arts-producing organizations varies by art field. The differences in Program approaches reflect the different role touring plays in the life of different art forms.
- B. Assistance to Arts-Presenting Organizations: Grants through Endowment Programs to presenting organizations are intended to encourage the advancement of artistic vision of presenters, to provide them with the support and incentive to present high-quality and varied work, reach new audiences, and expand their understanding and appreciation. Presenters receive grants—whether directly or through grants to state arts agencies, regional organizations, or service organizations—for artist fees, technical assistance, or other specified purposes to help them accomplish the above objectives.

The National Endowment for the Arts can provide only a portion of the total costs of touring and presenting and encourages additional support for these activities from its public and private partners on the regional, state, and local levels.

The following general principles govern Endowment support to artists, arts organizations, and presenters for touring and presenting:

1. Endowment support for touring and presenting should be based on both artistic excellence and facilitation of access. All applications for Endowment Program support for touring and presenting of the performing, visual, and literary arts must compete on the basis of excellence of programming as well as effectiveness in assuring access.

- 2. Endowment support for touring and presenting should encourage broad geographic access to artistic excellence. Endowment grant support is based on artistic excellence wherever it may occur in the nation. Aware that arts resources are not equally distributed, the Endowment should seek to identify opportunities for encouraging touring in areas with limited access to arts programming.
- 3. Endowment support should be flexible and open to opportunities in the touring marketplace. In order to respond to the great diversity or touring groups, potential audiences, and special opportunities, the Endowment encourages a variety of approaches to touring and presenting support.
- 4. Changes in Endowment support leading to major shifts in the touring and presenting marketplace should be undertaken only with as full an understanding as possible of the impacts of such actions, and with reasonable assurance that the results will be beneficial for all of the parties. Subsidy to one or another party in the touring and presenting marketplace increases the economic power of the party subsidized. Artists and arts organizations formally negotiate their fees with presenters or with presenter consortia. Presenters less formally negotiate their ticket prices with potential audiences through marketing. Subsidy to artists or arts organizations increases their ability to tour where they want and how, or, as the case may be, not to tour. Subsidy to presenters increases their ability to select those artists or arts organizations they wish to present and which audiences they will serve. Subsidy to regional organizations, state arts agencies, and local arts agencies increases their influence in the touring and presenting marketplace in specific geographic areas. The Endowment's objectives are to assist art, presentation, and broad geographic access to art. To these ends, Endowment Programs provide, as appropriate, various touring and/or presenting incentives.

In this context, the Endowment is today providing greater encouragement to presenters through its Programs. This emphasis reflects the importance of presenters to the economic health of arts organizations and to audiences. Subsidy to presenters is important in helping to improve and increase touring and presenting.

5. Endowment support of touring and presenting should encourage programming that might otherwise not be possible. Both producing companies and presenters should be in a position to take risks — to produce and present artists and art forms deserving of greater attention, new and experimental work, seldom-performed work, and art forms and traditions whose continuity would be strengthened through touring.

6. Endowment support of touring and presenting should encourage efficient use of available artistic and financial resources. The Endowment needs to assist the development of improved information systems on touring and on the basis of such information, encourage, where appropriate, such mechanisms as block-booking and improved coordination of marketing by arts organizations and presenters.

To assist planning the field, the Endowment will move to make greater lead time available between grant notification and season subsidized. In 1984, virtually all presenters will be able to apply in May and June for funds to support the 1985-86 performing season.

7. The Endowment should make its involvement in touring and presenting as consistent as possible, and base this involvement on a full understanding of the touring and presenting marketplace and on evaluation of the achievements of those who participate in that marketplace. The Endowment plans to develop greater familiarity with the mechanics, plans, problems, and opportunities of touring and presenting systems. New guidelines affecting touring and presenting will be reviewed by the Deputy Chairman for Programs to assure that the approaches are common where they can be.

The Endowment will continue to strengthen its efforts to foster communication among the various participants as a means of improving delivery of services and information, and will work, where appropriate, with regional consortia in this respect.

Finally, the Endowment will continue its evaluations of current touring and presenting support to assure maximum effectiveness of federal grant dollars.
