- **Thomas Young**, a social worker for the city, was adamant about the importance of communication between fathers and children and shared how he facilitates that interaction with families.
- Carl Dunn the oldest dad in the room described how he needed to rethink the approach he taken as a father in order to improve his relationships with his family.
- **Herman Odom** helped us understand how to help fathers returning from incarceration and a little of his own personal story as a father.
- **Isaac King**, who grew up without his father, shared how that absence drives him as mentor and the nonprofit he founded to support mentoring in the DC Area.
- **Ephraim Scott** described how despite overcoming many challenges he makes spending time with his children a priority every day.
- **Louis Limes** shared how he is working through his local Head Start program, Bright Beginnings. He shared how grateful he was for this recognition as an engaged and involved father.
- **Rob Keeling** highlighted that with all the differences among the fathers around the table and in the Washington DC Area in race, religion and/or sexual orientation, they all shared a passion to be the best fathers and mentors possible to children.
- Major Freddie Robinson participated by recorded video direct from Afghanistan where he is serving our country through the D.C. National Guard. He shared how important it was to have family support while he has been deployed.
