He is currently the Medical Director of the Center for Program Integrity (CPI) at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). CPI's mission is to reduce and eliminate waste, abuse, and fraud in Medicare and Medicaid. Prior to joining CMS, Dr. Agrawal worked for McKinsey and Company, where he served primarily provider and payer clients in the public and private sectors. His work focused on improving hospital quality, clinical resource utilization, physician alignment, and performance management. Dr. Agrawal completed his clinical training and education at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania and Cornell University Medical College. He also has a Masters degree from Cambridge University, where his published dissertation focused on U.S. welfare reform during the Clinton administration. Dr. Agrawal continues to work clinically in Washington DC.

As CPI Medical Director Dr. Agrawal has worked extensively with physicians who have had medical identities stolen and assisted in the design of new processes to assist victims of identity theft. Dr. Agrawal has published on this topic in a recent JAMA article [JAMA, 307(5): 459-460].

Julie Taitsman is the Chief Medical Officer for the Office of Inspector General for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. She has developed expertise in the health care system and oversight of the Medicare and
