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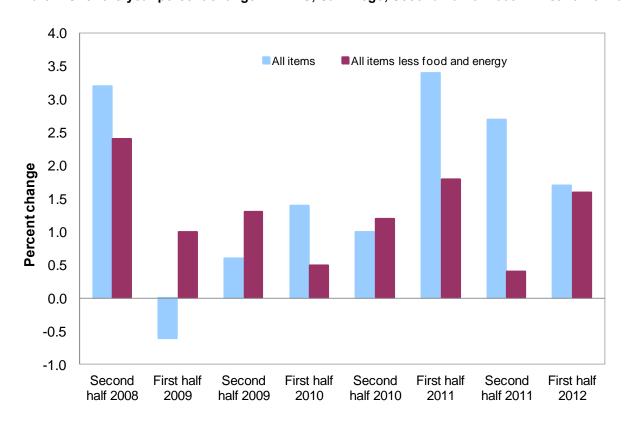
CONSUMER PRICE INDEX, SAN DIEGO – FIRST HALF 2012

AREA PRICES UP 1.3 PERCENT OVER THE PAST SIX MONTHS, UP 1.7 PERCENT FROM A YEAR AGO

Prices in the greater San Diego area, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), advanced 1.3 percent in the first half of 2012, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. (See table A.) Regional Commissioner Richard J. Holden noted that the six-month increase was influenced by higher prices for gasoline and shelter. (Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, six-month-to-six-month changes may reflect seasonal influences.)

Over the past 12 months, the CPI-U rose 1.7 percent. (See chart 1.) Energy prices increased 2.4 percent, mainly due to an increase in the price of gasoline. The index for all items less food and energy increased 1.6 percent over the year.

Food

Food prices increased 0.7 percent in the first half of 2012. (See table 1.) Prices for food at home inched up 0.1 percent for the past six months. Prices for food away from home rose 1.8 percent for the same period.

For the year ending in the first half of 2012, food prices rose 1.6 percent. Prices for food at home moved up 1.5 percent during the past 12 months, and prices for food away from home increased 2.4 percent.

Energy

The energy index rose 2.6 percent since the second half of 2011. This increase was mainly due to higher prices for gasoline (8.3 percent).

Energy prices increased 2.4 percent over the year, strongly influenced by a 7.0 percent rise in gasoline prices. In contrast, natural gas prices fell 19.0 percent and electricity prices were down 6.7 percent over the year.

All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy increased 1.2 percent from the second half of 2011 to the first half of 2012. Among the index components, increases were recorded for apparel (3.8 percent), recreation (2.2 percent), medical care (2.0 percent), education and communication (1.6 percent), and shelter (0.9 percent). By contrast, other goods and services inched down 0.1 percent.

Over the year, the index for all items less food and energy advanced 1.6 percent. Prices increased for apparel (3.9 percent), education and communication (3.8 percent), medical care (2.5 percent), recreation (1.9 percent), and shelter (1.7 percent).

CPI-W

In the first half of 2012, the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers was (CPI-W) 242.759, up 1.5 percent. The CPI-W increased 1.8 percent over the year.

The second half of 2012 Consumer Price Index for San Diego is scheduled to be released mid-February 2013.

Technical Note

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time in a fixed market basket of goods and services. The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) a CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) which covers approximately 88 percent of the total population and (2) a CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) which covers 29 percent of the total population. The CPI-U includes, in addition to wage earners and clerical workers, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPI is based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and the other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Each month, prices are collected in 87 urban areas across the country from about 4,000 housing units and approximately 26,000 retail establishments--department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index.

The index measures price changes from a designated reference date (1982-84) that equals 100.0. An increase of 16.5 percent, for example, is shown as 116.5. This change can also be expressed in dollars as follows: the price of a base period "market basket" of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1982-84 to \$11.65. In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. Because the sample size of a local area is smaller, the local area index is subject to substantially more sampling and other measurement error than the national index. In addition, local indexes are not adjusted for seasonal influences. As a result, local area indexes show greater volatility than the national index, although their long-term trends are quite similar. NOTE: Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices between cities; they only measure the average change in prices for each area since the base period.

The San Diego, CA metropolitan area covered in this release consists of San Diego County in the State of California.
