


Locations

DES has offices located throughout Arizona's 15 counties. Depending upon your personal preference regarding climate, activities, education, etc., you have numerous choices. Who We Are

The Division of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) is a division of the Arizona Department of Economic Security. Child Protective Services is a key program within DCYF whose goal is to ensure the safety, well-being and permanency of children, youth and families. DCYF serves children and their families across the whole state.

The DCYF also provides services within the Promoting Safe and Stable Families program; family support, preservation, and reunification services; family foster care and kinship care services; programs to promote the safety, permanence and well-being of children in foster care and adoptive families; adoption promotion and support services, and health care services for children in out-ofhome care. DCYF collaborates with other state agencies such as the Department of Health Services' Division of Behavioral Health Services and the Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections. In addition, the DCYF works with the courts, other government agencies such as the Arizona Department of Education, and community and faithbased organizations to meet the needs of children and their families.

CPS Specialists are assigned to positions in CPS Investigations, In-Home Services Case Management, and Out-of-Home Care Case Management. In addition, some regions of DCYF have specialized units such as Adoptions to serve children free for adoption, Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) to serve American Indian children, and Independent Living to

serve youth in foster care. Opportunities exist for individuals to develop their leadership skills to better serve Arizona's children.
