National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS): 2002

Data on Substance Abuse Treatment Facilities

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HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 2002 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual survey of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

- ◆ The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2002 was 96 percent [Table 1.1].
- ◆ A total of 13,720 facilities responded to the survey and reported a one-day census of 1,136,287 clients receiving substance abuse treatment on March 29, 2002 [Tables 2.1 and 4.1].
- ◆ There were 91,851 clients under age 18 in treatment on March 29, 2002, making up 8 percent of the total population in treatment on that date [Table 4.6].
- ◆ In 2002, private non-profit facilities made up the bulk of the system (61 percent), followed by private for-profit (25 percent) and State or local government (11 percent) [Table 2.1].

- Over half (51 percent) of all facilities had managed care contracts in 2002, as compared to 42 percent in 1996 [Table 2.3].
- ♦ Outpatient treatment was the most widely available type of care, with regular outpatient care offered by 74 percent of all facilities and intensive outpatient care offered by 44 percent of all facilities. Day treatment/partial hospitalization services were offered by 15 percent of all facilities, outpatient detoxification by 12 percent, and outpatient methadone/LAAM maintenance by 7 percent. Residential rehabilitation was offered by 26 percent of all facilities, and hospital inpatient rehabilitation by 4 percent. Residential detoxification and hospital inpatient detoxification were offered by 8 percent and 7 percent of all facilities, respectively [Table 3.2b].
- Nearly half of all facilities (49 percent) offered special programs for the dually diagnosed (clients with mental and substance abuse disorders). More than one-third of facilities had programs for adolescents (37 percent) [Table 3.9b].
- ♦ Nearly half (48 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Thirty-one percent of clients were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 21 percent were in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone [Table 4.3].

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2002 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), conducted between March and October 2002, with a reference date of March 29, 2002. It is the 25th in a series of national surveys designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities² in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment. (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix C.)

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. The objectives of N-SSATS are to collect multipurpose data that can be used to—

- assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-supported and other treatment facilities and in forecasting treatment resource requirements;
- update SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities;
- analyze general treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States;
- generate the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs, a compendium of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

The jurisdictions include the territories of American Samoa and Guam, the Federated States of Micronesia, the Republic of Palau, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands of the United States.

² In this report, entities responding to N-SSATS are referred to as "facilities." As discussed later in the report, a "facility" may be a program-level, clinic-level, or multisite respondent.

Data Collection Procedures for the 2002 N-SSATS

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 2002 N-SSATS ran from March 2002 through October 2002, with a reference date of March 29, 2002.

Survey coverage

The 2002 survey was sent to all 18,204 active facilities that were on SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS; see Appendix C) as of about 6 weeks before the survey reference date. These facilities were contacted by mail. Facilities added by State substance abuse agencies or discovered during the survey prior to the second mailing were also included in the survey.

Content

The 2002 N-SSATS survey instrument was a 9-page document with 37 numbered questions (see Appendix A). Topics included:

- ♦ Facility identification information
- ♦ Ownership
- Primary focus (substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, general health care, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, other)
- ♦ Hotline operation
- Services offered (assessment services, substance abuse therapy and counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, other services)
- Special programs or groups provided (dually-diagnosed clients (mental and substance abuse disorders), adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS, gays and lesbians, seniors/older adults, pregnant/postpartum women, women only, men only, criminal justice clients, DUI/DWI offenders, other)

- Operation of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment. SAMHSA
- ♦ Services for the hearing impaired
- Services in languages other than English
- ♦ Types of treatment provided
 - ♦ Hospital inpatient (detoxification, rehabilitation)
 - Non-hospital residential (detoxification, rehabilitation)
 - Outpatient (regular, intensive, day treatment/partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/LAAM maintenance)
- Number of beds designated for non-hospital residential and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment
- ♦ Payment options
- ♦ Managed care participation
- ♦ Number of clients treated
- Facility licensure, approval, certification, or accreditation

Data collection

Six weeks before the survey, letters were mailed to all facilities to alert them to expect the survey. An additional benefit of the letters was to update records with new address information returned from the post office. Data collection packets, including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter, State-specific letters of endorsement, information on completing the survey on the Internet, and a sheet of Frequently Asked Questions were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Support in responding to questions for those facilities completing the questionnaire over the Internet was also available. Four to five weeks after the initial mailing, thank you/ reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approxi-

mately 8 weeks after the initial mailing, non-responding facilities were sent a second mailing. About four to five weeks after the second mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within two to three weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by telephone. The overall response rate was 96 percent.

Forms accounting and response rate

Summary response rate information is presented in Table 1.1. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 18,204 facilities believed to offer substance abuse treatment services. Of these facilities, 15 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or were not providing substance abuse treatment on March 29, 2002. Of the remaining 15,459 facilities, 96 percent completed the survey.

Exclusions

Of the 14,756 survey respondents, 654 facilities provided information to I-SATS but were deemed out of the scope of this report and were excluded from the analyses presented here (see Appendix C).

- 354 excluded facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients only.
- 206 excluded facilities were solo practitioners. I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included. The excluded solo practitioners had not been identified for inclusion by the State substance abuse agency.
- 94 excluded facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment. These facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the *Directory* and on the Treatment Facility Locator, but were excluded from the analyses in this report.

An additional 382 facilities did not provide data on facility characteristics, although another facility provided their client counts. These were excluded from the facility counts in this report.

Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

Table 1.2. There were a total of 13,720 eligible respondents to the 2002 N-SSATS. The breakdown of these respondents with respect to their reporting of facility data and client counts is summarized below.

There were 11,969 facilities that reported both facility data and client counts for their own organization.

An additional 678 facilities reported on characteristics of their own facility and provided client counts for their own facility as well as other facilities. These

678 facilities reported client counts for a total of 2,732 facilities.

There were 1,039 facilities that reported facility characteristics only. Their client counts were reported by another facility.

There were 34 facilities that reported facility characteristics and client counts for their facility, but the number of other facilities for which they reported for was unknown.

Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed for inconsistencies and missing data. Calls were made to facilities to obtain missing data and to clarify questionable responses. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. These incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks not readily implemented by manual review.

If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were deleted and imputed.

Item non-response

Careful editing and extensive follow-up have minimized item non-response (Appendix B). There are instances of non-response in most data items, however, and some variables have an explicit *Unknown* response option. Missing data for client count variables (e.g., the number of clients in hospital inpatient, non-hospital residential, and outpatient treatment) were imputed.

For the remaining unimputed variables, facilities with missing values for a given variable were excluded from the tabulations using that variable. As a result, the number of treatment facilities on which tables are based may vary somewhat from table to table. The number of facilities actually reporting data is generally included on each table.

Methodology of Imputation of Missing Client Counts

A total of 232 facilities were missing client count values for one or more types of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient rehabilitation, residential detoxification, etc.). A facility was given imputed values for a type of service

if it reported that it provided the service but had not provided client counts for that service type. For example, if a facility reported that it provided hospital inpatient services and outpatient services, but not residential services, client values were imputed for the hospital inpatient and outpatient variables only. Missing values for the number of clients under age 18 and the number of hospital and/or residential beds were not imputed.

When available, client values from the 2000 N-SSATS were used to impute the missing client counts on the 2002 N-SSATS. In all other cases, the average client value stratified by State and type of ownership was used to impute the missing client counts. If a facility were unique in its ownership category and State, values were imputed using average values for the State only. Client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient rehabilitation, residential detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger totals (total hospital inpatient, residential, and outpatient clients, and total clients).

Further Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2002 N-SSATS. Some of these are outlined above. Other general issues are listed below. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There is no adjustment for the approximately 4 percent facility non-response.
- ♦ N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.

• Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into four analytic sections. Chapter 2 presents broad trends in facility characteristics for 1996 to 2002. Chapter 3 describes key characteristics of facilities and the programs and services they provide. Chapter 4 describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on March 29, 2002. Finally, Chapter 5 presents State-level detail for most of the tables presented in Chapters 3 and 4.

Terminology

The majority of tables in the report are organized according to facility ownership/operation and the primary focus of the facility, and present data on the characteristics of facilities and clients in treatment at these facilities. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

Ownership/operation indicates the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal).

Primary focus indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, general health care, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, and other.

Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients who received treatment during the prior 30 days and were still enrolled on the reference date.

CHAPTER 2

TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 1996 to 2002. It should be kept in mind, however, that the list frame, methods, and survey instrument have changed during this period. These changes are detailed in Appendix C.

Number of Facilities


Table 2.1 and Figure 1. The increase in the number of reporting facilities from 10,641 in 1996 to 13,720 in 2002 is due primarily to improved survey methodology rather than to an actual increase in the number of facilities. The principal improve-

ments were an increase in the response rate from 86 percent in 1996 to 96 percent in 2002, and an extensive effort to improve the coverage of the facility universe (described in Appendix C).

Facilities Dispensing Methadone

Table 2.1 and Figure 1. In 2002, a total of 1,080 facilities (8 percent of all facilities) reported that they dispensed methadone or levo-alpha acetyl methadol (LAAM) as part of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), SAMHSA. Prior to May 18,

UFDS - N-SSATS 1996-2002




2001, such programs required approval by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In previous years, the UFDS and N-SSATS surveys counted all facilities reporting that they dispensed methadone or LAAM. In the 2002 N-SSATS, facilities reporting that they had OTPs were verified against a list supplied by CSAT.

Facility Ownership

Table 2.1 and Figure 2. Facilities are described in terms of ownership, i.e., the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Despite year-to-year fluctuations in the number of facilities reporting, the overall structure of the treatment system (as reflected in the N-SSATS ownership data) changed very little over the time period.

On March 29, 2002, private non-profit facilities made up the bulk of the system (61 percent). Since 1996, this proportion has remained relatively constant. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 25 percent of responding facilities. Fluctuations in the proportion of private-for-profit facilities are probably because of SAMHSA's efforts to expand survey coverage to these facilities, followed by the decision to exclude solo practitioners that were not State agency-approved. Eleven percent of facilities were owned by State or local governments on March 29, 2002, while the Federal government owned 2 percent and tribal governments owned 1 percent of reporting facilities.

Programs or Groups for Special Populations


Table 2.2 and Figure 3. Facilities may offer treatment programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of certain populations. These groups include dually-diagnosed clients (persons with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders), adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS, pregnant/postpartum women, women only, men only, gays and lesbians, and seniors/older adults. Data on programs or groups for dually-diagnosed clients, adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS and pregnant/postpartum women were collected beginning in 1997. Information on the provision of programs or groups for women only was added in 1999, and information on programs or groups for gays and lesbians, men only, and seniors/older adults

was added in 2000. The proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the special populations has remained relatively stable. From 1997-2002, just under half of all facilities offered programs or groups for dually-diagnosed clients, between 34 and 39 percent offered programs or groups for adolescents, between 19 and 24 percent offered programs or groups for persons with HIV/AIDS, and between 19 and 22 percent offered programs or groups for pregnant/postpartum women. On March 29, 2002, programs or groups for women only were available in 38 percent of all facilities; for men only, in 30 percent; for seniors/older adults in 14 percent, and for gays and lesbians in 13 percent.

Managed Care

Table 2.3 and Figure 4. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector (e.g., HMOs) where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed." Approximately 51 percent of facilities had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations in 2002, compared to 42 percent in 1996. The percentage of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts increased between 1996 and 1999 for all ownership categories. Between 1999 and 2002, however, the proportion generally stabilized or declined slightly. Private non-profit and private for-profit facilities had the highest proportion of facilities with managed care agreements or contracts, at 55 percent and 53 percent on March 29, 2002,

respectively. Among local and State governmentowned facilities, 41 percent and 35 percent, respectively, had managed care agreements or contracts. Facilities owned by Federal or tribal governments were least likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations, at 19 percent and 22 percent, respectively.

Table 2.4. In most States, the proportion of facilities having agreements or contracts with managed care organizations increased between 1996 and 2002. There was wide variation among States in the proportions of facilities with such agreements or contracts.

UFDS - N-SSATS 1996-2002



CHAPTER 3

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2002. Facilities are described in terms of ownership/operation, that is, the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). They are also described in terms of the facility's primary focus: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, general health care, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, and other.

Primary Focus

Table 3.1. Overall, 60 percent of facilities reported that treating substance abuse problems was their primary focus of activity. Eight percent of all facilities reported the provision of mental health services as their main focus, while 3 percent focused on general health care. Slightly more than one-quarter of all facilities considered a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services to be their primary focus.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) had the largest proportion of facilities (42 percent) that reported a general health care focus, and the smallest proportion (29 percent) primarily focused on substance abuse treatment. State government facilities had the highest proportion of facilities reporting a mental health focus (12 percent). Tribal and local government facilities reported the highest proportion of facilities with a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (33 percent each) as their primary focus.

Type of Care Offered

Tables 3.2a and 3.2b. Outpatient rehabilitation was the most widely available type of care, with regular and intensive outpatient care offered by 74 percent and 44 percent of all facilities, respectively. Residential rehabilitation was offered by 26 percent of all facilities, while hospital inpatient rehabilitation was offered by 4 percent of facilities. Fifteen percent of all facilities provided day treatment/partial hospitalization programs. Outpatient detoxification was offered at 12 percent of facilities, while residential detoxification and hospital inpatient detoxification were provided by 8 percent and 7 percent, respectively, of all facilities.

As a group, Federally-owned facilities were more likely to offer all types of outpatient care, including regular and intensive, day treatment/partial hospitalization, and detoxification (95 percent, 57 percent, 26 percent, and 40 percent, respectively). Outpatient methadone maintenance was offered by 24 percent of VA facilities and by 13 percent of private for-profit facilities. Residential rehabilitation was most likely to be offered by VA and private non-profit facilities (41 percent and 34 percent, respectively).

Facilities that focused primarily on substance abuse treatment were least likely to provide hospital inpatient care (either rehabilitation or detoxification) and most likely to provide residential care (both rehabilitation and detoxification). Facilities with general health care as a primary focus were most likely to provide hospital inpatient care (both rehabilitation and detoxification, at 14 percent and 47 percent, respectively), as well as outpatient detoxification (29 percent) and day/treatment partial hospitalization (28 percent).

Client Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 3.3. Nearly all facilities (92 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse on March 29, 2002. About three-quarters had clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone and for abuse of drugs alone (76 percent and 74 percent, respectively). These proportions were relatively constant across ownership categories and by the primary focus of the facility.

Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs)

Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) are certified by the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, SAMHSA, to use the opioids methadone or LAAM in the treatment of narcotic addiction. Prior to May 18, 2001, such programs required approval by the Food and Drug Administration.

Table 3.4. OTPs were available at 8 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities on March 29, 2002 (Table 2.1). Private for-profit facilities operated 42 percent of all OTPs, although they operated 25 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities (Table 2.1). More than half (57 percent) of all OTPs provided both maintenance and detoxification. Thirty-three percent provided maintenance only, and 11 percent provided detoxification only. Almost all clients received methadone rather than LAAM.

Facilities with OTPs were likely to be dedicated entirely or almost entirely to treatment with methadone/LAAM. Overall, 83 percent of clients in facilities with OTPs were receiving methadone/LAAM on March 29, 2002. Among ownership categories, this proportion was highest (95 percent) in private for-profit facilities. Among facility focus categories, the proportion was highest among facilities focused on substance abuse treatment services (88 percent).

Facility Size

Table 3.5. The median number of clients in treatment at a facility on March 29, 2002, was 40. Facility size varied by type of care offered. In facilities offering outpatient care, the median number of clients was 45. However, this represented a range by type of outpatient care, including a median of 29 clients in treatment for regular outpatient care and 180 clients for outpatient methadone/LAAM maintenance. In facilities offering residential care, the median number of clients in treatment on March 29, 2002, was 18. In hospital inpatient facilities, the median number of clients was 8.

Government-operated facilities were generally larger than private for-profit or private non-profit facilities. Facilities operated by the Federal government had a median of 58 clients in treatment on March 29, 2002. This was because of the large number of clients in treatment at VA facilities.


The median number of clients also varied according to primary focus of the facility. In facilities with a primary focus on substance abuse treatment, the median number of clients in treatment was 45. In contrast, facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had a median of 20 clients in treatment.

Table 3.6. Facilities with a primary focus on substance abuse treatment tended to be larger than other facilities. Some 63 percent of these facilities had 30 or more clients in treatment on March 29, 2002. In contrast, 61 percent of facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had fewer than 30 clients in treatment on that date.

Facility Capacity and Utilization

Facilities were asked to report non-hospital residential and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of residential or hospital inpatient clients by the number of

residential or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates may be more than 100 percent.

Table 3.7. Some 3,781 facilities reported having 113,807 non-hospital residential beds designated for substance abuse treatment. On March 29, 2002, 90 percent of all residential beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use. Utilization rates varied little, from 86 percent in facilities operated by local governments to 97 percent in Federally-operated facilities. However, there was significant variation among Federally-operated facilities—the utilization rate in VA facilities was 99 percent, but it was 37 percent in Department of Defense-owned facilities, and 74 percent in Indian Health Service facilities.

The utilization rate in facilities focused on the provision of mental health services was well above average, at 237 percent. However, the average number of designated beds in these facilities was 12, compared with 28 to 36 beds in other facilities.

Table 3.8. There were 15,736 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment in 1,069 reporting facilities. On March 29, 2002, 89 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use. Utilization rates in facilities operated by State and Federal governments were well above the average, at 154 percent and 122 percent, respectively. Facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had utilization rates well above average, at 153 percent.

Figure 5 shows the distribution of the facility-level utilization rates separately for residential and

hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with residential beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Fifty-two percent of facilities with residential beds had utilization rates of 90 percent or higher, whereas in facilities with hospital beds, 50 percent had utilization rates of 50 percent or less. About 7 percent of both residential and hospital inpatient facilities had utilization rates over 100 percent.

Programs or Groups for Special Populations

Tables 3.9a and 3.9b. Facilities may offer treatment programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of certain populations. These include dually-diagnosed clients (persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse), adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS, gays and lesbians, and pregnant/postpartum women. Special programs or groups may also be offered for women only, for men only, and for seniors/older adults. Many facilities offer treatment for persons arrested while driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI) or driving while intoxicated (DWI), as well as for other criminal justice clients.

Dually-diagnosed clients

Overall, 49 percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for dually-diagnosed clients. These services were most likely to be provided in government-owned facilities. They were available in 59 percent of Federal- and State-owned facilities, and in 54 percent of local government facilities.

Programs or groups for dually-diagnosed clients were available in 38 percent of facilities whose focus was substance abuse treatment, compared to 60 to 70 percent of facilities whose focus was mental health services, general health care, or a mix of mental health and substance abuse services.

Adolescents

Thirty-seven percent of facilities offered programs or groups for adolescents. These programs were found most often in facilities operated by tribal governments (64 percent) or local governments (42 percent). They were least likely to be found in Federal government facilities (8 percent). Among Federal government facilities, however, this ranged from 1 percent of VA and Department of Defense facilities to 75 percent of Indian Health Service facilities.

Programs or groups for adolescents were available in 50 percent of facilities whose focus was a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment. They were least likely to be offered in facilities with a general health care focus (22 percent).

Persons with HIV/AIDS

One-fifth (20 percent) of facilities offered programs or groups for persons with HIV/AIDS. There was little variation across ownership/operation categories. Facilities focused on general health care were most likely to offer programs or groups for persons with HIV/AIDS (24 percent), and facilities focused on the provision of mental health services were the least likely (10 percent).

Gays and lesbians

Special programs or groups for gays and lesbians were available at 13 percent of all facilities. They were most likely to be offered in private for-profit facilities (16 percent), and least likely to be offered in Federal government facilities (10 percent). Fifteen percent of facilities whose primary focus was a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services had programs for gays and lesbians, while only 8 percent of facilities focused on mental health services had such programs or groups.

Pregnant/postpartum women

Programs or groups for pregnant/postpartum women were offered by 19 percent of facilities. These programs were most likely to be available in local, tribal, and State government facilities (29 percent, 24 percent, and 22 percent, respectively). They were least likely to be offered by private for-profit facilities (14 percent) and Federal government facilities (9 percent). Among Federal government facilities, however, this ranged from 4 percent of VA facilities to 39 percent of Indian Health Service facilities. Only 8 percent of facilities focused on the provision of mental health services had programs or groups for pregnant/postpartum women.

Women only

Special programs or groups for women only (other than pregnant/postpartum women) were offered in 38 percent of all facilities. Like programs for pregnant/postpartum women, these were most likely to be available in local and State government facilities (47 percent and 43 percent, respectively), and least likely to be offered in Federal government facilities (23 percent) and private for-profit facilities (30 percent). Facilities focused on mental health services (17 percent) or general health care (23 percent) were least likely to have programs or groups for women only.

Men only

Special programs or groups for men only were available in 30 percent of all facilities. Among tribal government facilities, they were available in 38 percent. Programs or groups for men only were least likely to be available in Federal government-owned and private for-profit facilities (17 percent and 26 percent, respectively). About one-third (34 percent) of facilities focused on substance abuse treatment had programs or groups for men only, compared to 18 percent of facilities focused on general health care and 12 percent of facilities focused on mental health services.

Seniors/older adults

Fourteen percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for seniors/older adults. Facilities most likely to have this type of program were tribal government-owned facilities (27 percent), Federal government-owned facilities (22 percent), and private for-profit facilities (17 percent). Among Federal government facilities, the proportion ranged from 8 percent of Department of Defense facilities to 50 percent of Indian Health Service facilities. Twentyone percent of facilities focused on general health care had programs or groups for seniors/older adults, as did 18 percent of facilities whose focus was a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services. In comparison, 12 percent of facilities focused on providing substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for seniors/older adults.

DUI/DWI offenders

Special programs or groups for DUI/DWI offenders were offered by 35 percent of all facilities. Half (50 percent) of private for-profit facilities had such programs, as did 46 percent of tribal government facilities and 39 percent of local government-owned facilities. Facilities operated by the Federal government and private non-profit facilities were least likely to have programs or groups for DUI/DWI offenders (27 percent and 29 percent, respectively). Among Federal government facilities, however, the proportion ranged from 18 percent of Indian Health Service facilities to 40 percent of Department of Defense-owned facilities. Almost half (45 percent) of facilities with a mixed focus on mental health and substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for DUI/ DWI offenders, compared to 20 percent of those focused on general health care and 26 percent of those focused on mental health services.

Other criminal justice clients

Thirty-five percent of all facilities offered programs or groups for criminal justice clients. (Facilities treating incarcerated persons only were excluded from this report; see Chapter 1.) Forty-three percent of local government-owned facilities had such programs, compared with 9 percent of Federally-owned facilities and 28 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments. Among Federal government facilities, however, the proportion ranged from 5 percent of VA facilities to 32 percent of Indian Health Service facilities. Thirty-nine percent of facilities with a mixed focus on mental health and substance abuse treatment services had programs or groups for criminal justice clients, compared to 15 percent of those primarily focused on providing general health care and 19 percent of those focused primarily on mental health services.

Services Offered

Facilities were asked about the types of services they offered. Services were grouped into six broad categories. (See Appendix A, the 2002 N-SSATS Questionnaire, Question 10, for services within each category.)

- ♦ Assessment services
- ♦ Substance abuse therapy and counseling
- ♦ Pharmacotherapies
- ♦ Testing
- ♦ Transitional services
- Other services

The majority of facilities offered one or more services in each category. Overall, substance abuse therapy and counseling was offered by the largest proportion of facilities (99 percent). The availability of most specific services varied somewhat by ownership/operation and primary focus. Differences were most apparent in testing and transitional services.

Tables 3.10a and 3.10b. In general, fewer private for-profit facilities than private non-profit or government-owned facilities offered a range of testing and transitional services. Private for-profit facilities were also less likely to provide

services such as child care and transportation assistance than were private non-profit, Federal, State, and local government-owned facilities. Tribal government facilities were the least likely to offer testing services. Private non-profit facilities were least likely to provide pharmacotherapy services.

Tables 3.11a and 3.11b. Facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services were much less likely to provide comprehensive mental health assessment/diagnosis than they were to provide comprehensive substance abuse assessment/diagnosis. Facilities with a focus on general health care were more likely to provide testing than other facilities. Overall, facilities whose primary focus was mental health services were less likely than other facilities to offer testing, transitional, or other services such as HIV/AIDS counseling or child care.

Services for the Hearing Impaired or in Languages Other than English

Table 3.12. Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 25 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by State and local governments were most likely to offer these services (35 percent and 44 percent, respectively), while Federal, tribal, and private for-profit facilities were the least likely to offer these services (12 percent, 13 percent, and 14 percent, respectively).

Substance abuse treatment services in a language other than English (including American Indian/Alaska Native languages) were provided in 40 percent of all facilities. Half of facilities operated by local governments had these services, as did 39 percent of tribal government and Indian Health Service facilities. There was little variation by primary focus of the facility, although facilities focused on mental health services were the least likely to provide treatment in languages other than English (34 percent).

Substance abuse treatment services were available in a wide range of languages, but Spanish was the most common secondary language. Treatment services in Spanish were offered in 37 percent of all facilities. Treatment services in American Indian/ Alaska Native languages were offered in 2 percent of facilities overall, but in 39 percent of facilities operated by the Indian Health Service and 36 percent of tribal government-owned facilities.

Payment Options

Tables 3.13a and 3.13b. Cash/self-payment and private insurance were the most widely accepted forms of payment for substance abuse treatment (accepted by 90 percent and 68 percent of facilities, respectively). Medicaid was accepted by more than half of all facilities (53 percent). Medicare, Federal military insurance, and State-financed health insurance were each accepted by about one-third of all facilities (35 percent, 32 percent, and 32 percent, respectively).

The type of payment accepted varied considerably by ownership/operation. Facilities operated by State and local governments generally had a wide range of payment options. Federal government-owned facilities (predominantly operated by the VA and Department of Defense) were the least likely to accept State-financed health insurance and the most likely to accept Federal military insurance. Private for-profit facilities were less likely to accept public payment sources such as Medicare, Medicaid, or State-financed health insurance than were private non-profit facilities.

Facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment were less likely than other facilities to accept payment options other than cash/self-payment; 21 percent accepted Medicare and Federal military insurance, 26 percent accepted State-financed health insurance, 46 percent accepted Medicaid, and 60 percent accepted private insurance.

A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment was offered by 65 percent of all facilities. The sliding fee scale was most likely to be offered in State and local government-owned facilities (74 percent and 82 percent, respectively). It was least likely to be offered in Federally-owned and tribal government facilities (20 percent and 30 percent, respectively). Facilities with a primary focus on general health care were less likely than other facilities to offer a sliding fee scale (42 percent).

Facility Licensing, Approval, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked whether they were licensed, approved, certified, or accredited by various organizations. These included the State substance abuse agency, State mental health department, State public health department or board of health, hospital licensing authority, or other State/local agency or organization. Also included were accreditation organizations: the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), the Rehabilitation Accreditation Commission (CARF), the National Committee for Quality Assurance (NCQA), and Council on Accreditation for Children and Family Services (COA).

Tables 3.14a and 3.14b. Overall, 95 percent of facilities were licensed, certified, etc., by one or more of the listed agencies and organizations. Most facilities (82 percent) named the State substance abuse agency, 34 percent listed the State mental health department, and 31 percent listed the State public health department/board of health. Thirteen percent reported licensing, certification, etc., by a State or local agency or organization that was not listed. Accreditation by JCAHO was reported by 24 percent of facilities, but accreditation by CARF, the COA, or the NCQA were relatively rare (11 percent, 4 percent, and 2 percent, respectively).

Facility Administrative and Funding Characteristics

Facilities were asked several questions about administrative and funding characteristics. These included whether the facility was part of an organization with multiple facilities or sites; whether the facility had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services; and whether the facility received Federal, State, county, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment.

Table 3.15. About two-thirds (68 percent) of all facilities reported that they were part of an organization with multiple facilities or sites. This proportion was 74 percent for private non-profit facilities, compared to 55 percent of private forprofit facilities. Facilities focused on general health care services were less likely than other facilities to be part of an organization with multiple sites (51 percent).

Just over half of all facilities (51 percent) reported that they had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of

substance abuse treatment services. In general, government-owned facilities were less likely to have such agreements or contracts than were privately-owned facilities (41 percent or less, compared to 53 percent or more). Facilities focus on provision of mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse services were most likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations (58 percent and 60 percent, respectively.)

Two-thirds (67 percent) of all facilities received Federal, State, county, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. Government-owned and private non-profit organizations were more likely to receive these funds than were private for-profit facilities (67 percent or more, compared to 27 percent). Facilities focused on substance abuse treatment or a mix of mental health and substance abuse services were most likely to receive public funds (70 percent and 66 percent, respectively.)

CHAPTER 4

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes key characteristics of L clients in substance abuse treatment on March 29, 2002. Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients who received treatment during the prior 30 days and were still enrolled on the reference date. The major breakdowns used in this chapter are the two facility descriptors, ownership/operation and primary focus. Ownership/operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Primary focus indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; general health care; a mix of both mental health and substance abuse treatment services; or other.

Clients by Facility Ownership/Operation and Primary Focus

Table 4.1. Fifty-six percent of all clients in treatment on March 29, 2002, were in private non-profit facilities. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 26 percent of substance abuse treatment clients. The remaining 18 percent of clients were in government-operated facilities; slightly more than half of these clients were in facilities operated by local governments.

About two-thirds (68 percent) of all clients in treatment on March 29, 2002, were in a facility focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services. An additional 23 percent were in a facility whose focus was a mix of both mental health and substance abuse treatment services. Four percent of clients were in facilities with a primarily focus on

mental health services, and 3 percent were in facilities with a general health care focus.

Clients by Type of Care

Tables 4.2a, 4.2b, and 4.2c. The 2002 N-SSATS requested data on clients in treatment on March 29, 2002, who received:

- outpatient treatment services (regular care, intensive care, day treatment/partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/LAAM maintenance);
- non-hospital residential treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification);
- hospital inpatient treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification).

The majority of clients in treatment on March 29, 2002, (90 percent) were enrolled in some type of outpatient care: regular outpatient care (54 percent); methadone/LAAM maintenance (19 percent); intensive outpatient care (12 percent); day treatment/partial hospitalization (3 percent); or outpatient detoxification (2 percent). Some 8 percent of clients were in residential rehabilitation, and less than 1 percent were in hospital inpatient rehabilitation. Residential detoxification and hospital inpatient detoxification each accounted for less than 1 percent of clients

There was considerable variation by both facility ownership/operation and primary focus in the distribution of clients in treatment across the types of care. In facilities operated by Federal, State, local, or tribal governments, between 60 percent and 75 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care. In private for-profit facilities, 48 percent of clients were

in regular outpatient care and 33 percent were in outpatient methadone/LAAM maintenance. In private non-profit facilities, 54 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care and 12 percent were in residential rehabilitation.

In facilities whose focus was the provision of mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, 73 percent of all clients were in regular outpatient care. In facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment, 47 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care, 26 percent were in outpatient methadone/LAAM maintenance, and 12 percent were in intensive outpatient care. In facilities focused on the provision of general health care services, 48 percent of clients were in regular outpatient care, 17 percent were in outpatient methadone/LAAM maintenance, and 16 percent were in intensive outpatient care.

Clients by Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 4.3. On March 29, 2002, nearly half (48 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Thirty-one percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, while the remaining 21 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.

Private for-profit facilities had the smallest proportion of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse (39 percent), and the highest proportion in treatment for drug abuse alone (39 percent). Clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone were found disproportionately in Federal government-operated facilities (37 percent overall and 66 percent in Department of Defense-operated facilities).

Generally, about half of clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, regardless of the facility's primary focus. Facilities focused on substance abuse treatment had the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of drugs alone (35 percent), compared with less than 25 percent each in facilities whose focus was

mental health services, general health care, or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services. Conversely, facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services had a smaller proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone (18 percent) than did facilities focused on provision of other services (26 percent to 30 percent).

Clients Under Age 18

Table 4.4. Clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 29, 2002, were more likely to be in private non-profit facilities than the total client population (65 percent and 56 percent, respectively; see Table 4.1). Private forprofit facilities accounted for 26 percent of all client admissions, but for 17 percent of clients under age 18.

Nearly 60 percent of clients under age 18 were in facilities focused on the provision of substance abuse treatment services, compared to 68 percent of all clients. Almost one third (31 percent) of clients under age 18 were in facilities whose focus was a mix of mental health and substance abuse services, compared to 23 percent of the total client population.

Table 4.5. Adolescents received types of care broadly similar to the total treatment population (see Table 4.2b). Most (88 percent) received outpatient treatment, 11 percent received residential treatment, and 1 percent received hospital inpatient treatment.

Table 4.6. Clients under age 18 made up 8 percent of all clients in treatment on March 29, 2002. This proportion varied according to facility ownership/operation, primary focus, and type of care. For example, 5 percent of clients in private for-profit facilities were under age 18. However, in private for-profit residential facilities, adolescents made up 20 percent of clients.

CHAPTER 5

STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility data by State or jurisdiction. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

Table 5.1 details the 2002 N-SSATS survey response rate. The number of treatment facilities and clients in each State or jurisdiction is summarized in Table 5.2. Tables 5.3 to 5.19 provide State-level detail on tables presented in earlier chapters. Table 5.20 presents, by substance abuse problem, the number of clients by State or jurisdiction age 18 and over per 100,000 population for the 50 States and the District of Columbia. Tables 5.21 to 5.24 present State-level data on clients under age 18.

Survey Response

Table 5.1. The overall response rate for the survey was 96 percent. Only Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands had response rates below 90 percent, and these were 87 percent and 80 percent, respectively.

Facilities and Clients

Table 5.2. More than half of all facilities (51 percent) and more than half of all clients in treatment (55 percent) on March 29, 2002, were located in 10 States. California accounted for the largest proportion of both facilities and clients, at 13 percent and 14 percent, respectively. New York had 9 percent of all facilities and 12 percent of all clients. The other 8 States that accounted for the majority of facilities and clients were Florida, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington.


Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population

Table 5.20. For the United States, there were 471 clients in treatment per 100,000 population age 18 and older on March 29, 2002.

Figure 6 maps the rates of clients in treatment by State.

The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (221 per 100,000), followed by drug abuse only (149 per 100,000), and alcohol abuse only (100 per 100,000). While these rates can suggest the extent of the underlying substance abuse problem, they also reflect the level of resources available for treatment and should be interpreted with caution.

APPENDIX C

N-SSATS BACKGROUND

Survey History

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978. In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version was used (the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory). In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993. In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned, and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full mail survey was reinstated with telephone follow-up; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse

Treatment Services (N-SSATS). In 2002, facilities were given the option of responding to the survey on the Internet.

N-SSATS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

N-SSATS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), a continuously-updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities. The other components of DASIS are N-SSATS and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of persons admitted to substance abuse treatment. A unique ID number assigned to each facility by I-SATS is used in the collection of facility-level data (N-SSATS) and client-level data (TEDS) so that the three data sets can be linked. Together, they provide nationaland State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals

I-SATS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-SATS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (about 12,000 in 2002) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse

agency to provide substance abuse treatment. The majority of these facilities are required by the State agency to provide TEDS client-level data. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of I-SATS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not required by the State agency to provide TEDS client-level data. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service. I-SATS records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by State substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (about 2,000 in 2002) represents the SAMHSA effort in recent years to make I-SATS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that State substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private forprofit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See *Expansion of survey coverage*.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Survey Coverage

The use of I-SATS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-SATS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Figure 7 is a time line detailing the major changes in survey scope and administration that may have affected the numbers of reporting facilities and

clients. Beginning in 1995, changes in data collection methods enabled more complete identification of duplicate reporting by networks of facilities, causing a slight reduction in the total number of facilities.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided (detailed below) yielded a net of increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. The number of facilities reporting continued to increase in 1999, but at a slower pace, a net increase of 1,800 facilities. The increase between 1998 and 1999 was in large part because of the improved survey response rate (95 percent in 1999 vs. 90 percent in 1998).


In 2002, the number of facilities reporting increased slightly. The survey response rate increased by 1 percent over the 2000 response rate, to 96 percent.

Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that State substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. It also requests that facilities be included in I-SATS, N-SSATS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. Because of the different State administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-SATS ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are avail-

able only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-SATS are administratively monitored by State substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-SATS is affected by differences in State systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on I-SATS. Some 15 source lists were considered, and facilities not on I-SATS were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on I-SATS. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's biannual Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, the source lists that had yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Additional facilities are also identified during the survey itself by survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the State substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Data collection

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed facility survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities, and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee.

Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. In 2002, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in a non-response rate of only 4 percent. For 96 percent of facilities in the sample, it was possible either to complete the survey or to determine that the facility had closed or was otherwise ineligible.

Exclusions

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 UFDS survey and subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.¹ During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and

other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on the I-SATS. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public use data files.

I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-SATS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on the I-SATS and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the *Directory* and on the Treatment Facility Locator. These facilities were excluded from analyses and public use data files.

Changes in Survey Content

Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest such as the role of managed care.

Table C.1 shows the major content areas for the UFDS survey and N-SSATS from 1995 to 2002.
