HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 1998 Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey, an annual survey of facilities providing substance abuse treatment conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). UFDS is designed to measure the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the United States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

Changes in Survey Coverage

- Almost 35 percent of the 13,455 treatment facilities that responded to the 1998 UFDS did not participate in the 1997 survey. Most of these facilities were added as the result of an intensive effort to identify new treatment facilities. These 4,663 facilities accounted for 281,160 (27 percent) of the clients reported to be in treatment on October 1, 1998 (Table 2.1).
- The number of new facilities in the 1998 survey is offset by the 2,068 facilities that responded in 1997 but not in 1998. This yields a net increase in 1998 of 2,595 facilities responding to the survey.
- The 4,663 facilities that were new to the survey in 1998 were smaller on average than those facilities responding in both 1997 and 1998. The new facilities in 1998 reported a median of 30 clients in treatment on October 1, compared with about 40 clients in treatment on October 1 for facilities responding in both years.

Trends in Client and Facility Characteristics

• Client age patterns (Table 2.4) changed over 1991-1998. The proportion of clients under age 18 increased from 6 percent in 1991 to nearly 10 percent in 1998. The proportion of clients over age 35 increased from 41 percent to 46 percent. These increases were balanced by a decline in the proportion of clients aged 25-34, from 35 percent to 27 percent.

Facility Characteristics and Services

- Nearly half of all facilities provided programs for the dually diagnosed (Table 3.3).
- Thirty-eight percent of facilities offered programs for adolescents (Table 3.3).
- Less than 20 percent of facilities offered programs for persons with HIV/AIDS, or programs for pregnant and postpartum women (Table 3.3).
- Less than 2 percent of facilities were owned or operated by a managed care firm. Almost half had one or more managed care contracts (Table 2.3).

Client Characteristics

- Nearly 90 percent of clients received care as outpatients (Table 2.4).
- Treatment for about 150,000 clients (14 percent) included opioid substitutes (Table 2.4).

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE UNIFORM FACILITY DATA SET (UFDS) SURVEY

Introduction

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 1998 Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey, conducted between October 1998 and March 1999, with a reference date of October 1, 1998. It was the 22nd in a series of national surveys designed to measure the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the United States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), plans and directs the UFDS survey.

UFDS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational setting, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, capacity, and annual revenue sources and amounts. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978. In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a co-sponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version was used (the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory). In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated, and it was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989-1993. In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set survey beginning in 1995.

UFDS is designed to collect information from each facility in the United States that provides substance abuse treatment, and from State-identified facilities providing other substance abuse services.² UFDS includes private and publicly-funded facilities. All facilities report identifying information and ownership. Treatment facilities also report data on the type of services provided, numbers of clients, client demographics (i.e., age, sex, and race/ethnicity groups), other client characteristics, number of beds, and sources and amounts of revenue.

² In this report, entities responding to UFDS are referred to as "facilities." This designation is consistent with the title of the survey, although, as discussed later in the report, a "facility" may be a program-level, clinic-level, or multi-site respondent.

UFDS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the United States substance abuse treatment delivery system. The UFDS objectives are:

- to assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-supported and other treatment facilities, and in forecasting treatment resource requirements;
- to update SAMHSA's National Master Facility Inventory (NMFI) of all known drug abuse and alcoholism treatment facilities and State-identified facilities providing other substance abuse services (described further below);
- to analyze general treatment services trends and to conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States;
- to generate the National Directory of Drug Abuse and Alcoholism Treatment Programs, a compendium of State-tracked facilities providing substance abuse treatment; and
- to update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of substance abuse treatment facilities available on the Internet at:

UFDS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

UFDS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the National Master Facility Inventory (NMFI), a continuously-updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities and some State-identified prevention and

education facilities. The other components of DASIS are the UFDS survey and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of persons admitted to substance abuse treatment. A unique ID number assigned to the NMFI facility is used in the collection of facility-level data (UFDS) and client-level data (TEDS) so that the three data sets can be linked. Together, they provide national- and State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

The NMFI is the list frame for UFDS. Facilities in the NMFI fall into four general categories. These are distinguished by the services provided, the components of DASIS of which they are part, and the relationship of the facility to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities administratively tracked by States and reporting to TEDS

The largest group of facilities (about 9,500 in 1998) includes facilities that are licensed or certified by the State substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment (or are administratively tracked for other reasons), and are required by the States to provide TEDS client-level data. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of the NMFI by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA.

Treatment facilities administratively tracked by States but not reporting to TEDS

This group (about 3,600 facilities in 1998) includes treatment facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse agency (or are administratively tracked for other reasons), but that are not required by the States to provide TEDS client-

level data. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies (the Bureau of Prisons, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service). NMFI records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not administratively tracked by States

This group of facilities (about 3,000 in 1998) represents the ongoing SAMHSA effort to make the NMFI as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that States, for a variety of reasons, do not track. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them were identified through screening of alternative source databases such as the commercial American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's biennial Inventory of Mental Health Organizations. Additional facilities are also identified during the UFDS by survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks. States are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State-tracked list if appropriate.

Non-treatment facilities administratively tracked by States

These facilities (about 2,900 in 1998) provide prevention, education, intake, assessment, referral, or administrative services. The listing of this group of facilities is provided by State DASIS representatives.

NMFI-Imposed Constraints on UFDS

The use of the NMFI as the list frame for UFDS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of

response and the scope of facilities included. The NMFI is largely a compilation of facilities in State administrative systems, and each State has a different system and different criteria for eligibility.

Unit of response

SAMHSA requests that facilities be included in the NMFI, UFDS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. SAMHSA further requests States to use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. However, because of the different State administrative systems, there is no consistent use of this definition. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State, and are given separate NMFI ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report client and services data in the UFDS survey, but revenue data are available only at a higher administrative level.

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized and UFDS forms were sent directly to the facilities.

The UFDS is designed to collect data for each physical location where treatment services are provided. A small percentage of facilities elected to report data at a higher administrative level than the State-determined NMFI facility level.

Thus UFDS data on the numbers of facilities must be interpreted with caution. Assessment of

changes over time may be more valid, assuming that individual States retain consistent definitions.

Scope of facilities included

The great majority of facilities in the NMFI are treatment facilities administratively tracked by States. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in the NMFI is affected by differences in State systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agencies track correctional facilities (State prisons and local jails) while others do not.

In an effort to address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on the NMFI. Some 15 source lists were considered, and facilities not on the NMFI were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on the NMFI. These facilities were sent the UFDS survey beginning in 1995, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.

A similar effort, on a smaller scale, was conducted prior to the 1998 UFDS. For that effort, potential new facilities were identified using data from the American Business Index (ABI), the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, which were the three source lists from 1995-1996 that had yielded the

most new facilities. This search resulted in the addition of 1,290 facilities to the 1998 UFDS. In addition, potential new facilities had been identified during the 1997 UFDS, during screening calls to facilities to confirm eligibility, and from other sources.

Some facilities operated by Federal agencies (the Bureau of Prisons, the VA, the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service) are tracked, but not regulated, by the States. NMFI records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these Federal agencies. Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons were excluded from the 1998 UFDS because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.¹

Procedures for the 1998 UFDS

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 1998 UFDS ran from October 1998 through March 1999, with a reference date of October 1, 1998. Follow-up calls to facilities for correction of missing and erroneous data continued through June 1999.

Survey coverage

The UFDS survey was sent to all active facilities that were on the NMFI as of about six weeks before the survey reference date (October 1, 1998).

Content

The 1998 UFDS survey instrument was a 10-page document with 39 numbered questions

(see Appendix A). Respondents provided information on treatment services and on clients receiving care on October 1, 1998. Topics included:

- Facility identification information
- Substance abuse services (treatment, detoxification, prevention, administrative, other)
- Ownership
- Hotline operation
- Organizational setting
- Managed care participation
- Specific services provided (assessment, therapy, testing, health services, programs for special groups, etc.)
- General types of treatment provided (outpatient, hospital, residential)
- Organizational relationships (parent or affiliate(s); financial parent or affiliate(s))
- 12-month unduplicated client count
- 12-month admissions
- Outpatient treatment clients as of the survey reference date, including:
 - Client counts by type of care (detoxification, intensive, and other outpatient)
 - Number receiving methadone/LAAM
 - Client counts by demographics (age group, sex, race/ethnicity)
- Hospital inpatient clients as of the survey reference date, including:
 - Beds designated for substance abuse clients
 - Client counts by type of care (detoxification, rehabilitation)
 - Number receiving methadone/LAAM
 - Client counts by demographics (age group, sex, race/ethnicity)
- Residential clients as of the survey reference date, including:
 - Beds designated for substance abuse clients
 - Client counts by type of care (detoxification, rehabilitation)
 - Number receiving methadone/LAAM

- Client counts by demographics (age group, sex, race/ethnicity)
- Proportions treated for alcohol only, drug only, and both substances
- Proportions of clients in selected population sub-groups (injection drug users, persons with active TB, HIV-positive clients, clients in treatment previously, managed care clients, correctional clients, pregnant women, mothers with dependent children)
- Annual revenue sources and amounts

Data collection

Prior to the survey, faxes or letters were sent to all facilities to update address information, and to alert facilities to expect the survey. Data collection instruments (with State letters of endorsement or other enclosures) were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Four weeks after the initial mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Five to six weeks after the initial mailing, nonresponding facilities were sent a second mailing. About five weeks after the second mailing, nonrespondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within two to three weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete a slightly abbreviated version of the survey by telephone.

Forms accounting and response rate

Summary response rate information is presented in Table 1.1. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 21,825 facilities believed to offer substance abuse services (treatment and non-treatment). Of these facilities, 12 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey, either because they had closed or because they were not providing substance abuse services on October 1,

1998. Of the remaining 19,174 facilities, the responses are distributed as follows:

- Fifty-four percent of facilities completed the full mail survey and 24 percent completed the abbreviated telephone survey.
- Seven percent of facilities completed the first sections of the questionnaire on facility characteristics (ownership, setting, services, etc.) but did not provide separate client counts—another administratively linked facility reported client counts for both facilities combined. These facilities and their client counts are included in all tables in this report.
- Two percent of facilities did not return a questionnaire for themselves, but other facilities reported that they had included the client counts for the non-reporting facilities with their client counts. In this report, the facilities that did not report for themselves are not included in the counts of facilities, but their client count data are included.
- Three percent of facilities reported that they provided treatment, but no client count data were reported for them. These responses are not included in this report.
- No response of any kind was received from 10 percent of facilities presumed to be eligible for the survey (the effective sample).

Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed for inconsistencies and missing data. Calls were made to facilities to obtain missing data and to clarify questionable responses. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. These included the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks not

readily implemented by manual review. As a final check, the data were returned to the State substance abuse agencies for their review. State corrections received through January 2000 were incorporated into the database.

If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were deleted and imputed.

Item non-response

The editing process ensured that item nonresponse was minimal. A few facilities did not provide client demographics; missing data were imputed using averaged responses from facilities in the same State and with similar ownership and client mix characteristics. Sixteen percent of facilities did not provide revenue data. Missing revenue data were imputed according to the procedure detailed in Appendix C.

Profile of Responding Facilities

Table 1.2. Facilities provided a range of substance abuse treatment, detoxification, prevention, related services (e.g., intake, assessment, and referral), and administrative functions. A significant number of treatment facilities were engaged in a range of services and were not restricted solely to the provision of clinical care. Only 8 percent were single-function facilities.

The balance of this report will focus on the 13,455 facilities that provide treatment and/or detoxification services (78 percent of reporting facilities), either alone or in conjunction with other substance abuse services. Because some of these facilities reported client counts for affiliated facilities, the client counts in Chapters 4 and 5 actually include data on 13,880 facilities.

Most of the responding treatment/detox facilities (78 percent) completed the full survey, while 22 percent completed the telephone survey (see Appendix A).

Further Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 1998 UFDS. Some of these are outlined above. Some general issues are discussed here; considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

 UFDS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment and prevention facilities,

- but it is a voluntary survey. There is no adjustment for facility non-response.
- Careful editing, and extensive follow-up have greatly reduced item non-response. There are instances of non-response in most data items, however, and some variables have an explicit *Unknown* response option. In addition, respondents contacted by telephone completed a slightly abbreviated version of the survey (see Appendix A). To avoid the loss of usable information, all responding facilities that reported client counts were retained in the database. Missing data on client demographics and total revenue were imputed. For the remaining variables, when a facility did not report complete information, it was excluded from the tabulations for which data were missing. As a result, the number of treatment facilities on which tables are based varies somewhat from table to table. The number of facilities actually reporting data is generally included on each table.
- UFDS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts do not represent annual totals. Rather, UFDS provides a 'snapshot' of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- UFDS collects data about facilities, not individual clients. Data on clients represent an aggregate of clients in treatment for each reporting facility. Demographic data are collected in different matrices of the survey form and cannot be cross-tabulated. While it is possible to report how many female clients and how many clients under age 18 were in treatment at a facility, the number of female clients under 18 cannot be determined. Similarly, data on client characteristics and sources of revenue are reported in

separate matrices, so that relationships between revenue and client characteristics cannot be analyzed directly.

 Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided, facility setting, and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into four analytic sections. Chapter 2 presents broad trends in facility and client characteristics for 1991-1998 (except 1994, when the UFDS survey was not conducted). Chapter 3 describes key characteristics of facilities and programs as of the survey reference date, October 1, 1998. Chapter 4 describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on the reference date. Finally, Chapter 5 presents State-level detail of many of the tables presented in Chapters 3 and 4.

Terminology

Terms used throughout the report and the tables are defined below.

- Ownership indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal).
- Organizational setting indicates the setting within which services are delivered and, for settings specializing in substance abuse treatment, the general type of care offered. The 1998 UFDS questionnaire permitted facilities to indicate more than one setting. For this report, each facility was assigned to a single organizational setting according to a defined algorithm (see Appendix B for details).
- Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on October 1, 1998, and 2) outpatient clients enrolled in treatment on October 1, 1998 who received a substance abuse treatment service at any time between September 1 and October 1, 1998.

CHAPTER 2

TRENDS IN FACILITY AND CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility and client characteristics for 1991-1998 (the survey was not conducted in 1994). It should be kept in mind, however, that the list frame, methods, and survey instrument have changed during this period.

Variability in the reporting level of facilities (i.e., reporting for each program, for each location, or for combined locations) is a critical factor in comparing the number of facilities over time. Each completed survey form is counted as a single reporting facility. As noted in Chapter 1, however, the level of reporting is sometimes decided by the State licensing/certification practices and sometimes by individual facility administrative policies and practices. Thus some facilities report aggregate data for more than one facility at the administrative or program level, and others report separately for each program at a specific location. Data on numbers of clients are not affected by differences in reporting level.

Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, primarily to minimize non-response and to expand the survey coverage. Figure 1 is a time line detailing the major changes in survey scope and administration that may have affected the numbers of reporting facilities and clients. Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities.

This is reflected in the increased number of facilities seen in Tables 2.1-2.3. Beginning in 1995, changes in data collection methods enabled more complete identification of duplicate reporting by networks of facilities, causing a reduction in the total number of facilities. This was partially offset by SAMHSA's efforts to expand the reporting base prior to the 1997 UFDS. (Although facilities in the expanded reporting base were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, they were excluded from published reports until 1997). In 1997 only, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded.


There was significant turnover in facilities responding to the 1997 and 1998 surveys (Table 2.1). Almost 35 percent of the 13,455 treatment facilities that responded to the 1998 UFDS did not participate in the 1997 survey. These 4,663 facilities accounted for 281,160 (27 percent) of the clients reported to be in treatment on October 1, 1998. This number is offset by the 2,068 facilities that responded to the 1997, but not the 1998, UFDS, yielding a net increase in 1998 of 2,595 facilities responding to the survey. The 4,663 facilities that were new to the survey in 1998 were smaller on average than those facilities responding in both years, with a median of 30 clients in treatment on October 1, compared with about 40 clients in treatment on October 1 for facilities responding in both years (38 clients in 1997 and 42 clients in 1998).

There were two primary reasons for the large increase in new facilities in 1998:

 SAMHSA continued to expand the survey coverage by identifying substance abuse

treatment facilities not on the NMFI. The result was an addition of nearly 2,000 facilities to the NMFI prior to the 1998 UFDS survey. It is important to note that these additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the UFDS survey.

 The response rate for the 1998 survey was about 5 percentage points higher than the rate in 1997. This is important because no adjustment for non-response is made in the survey data.

The number of clients reported to be in treatment on the reference date also increased substantially from 929,086 in 1997 to 1,038,378 in 1998. The majority of this increase can be attributed to the greater number of facilities participating in the 1998 UFDS. In fact, for the 8,792 facilities that participated in both the 1997 and 1998 UFDS surveys, the reported client counts increased only about 6,000 between 1997 and 1998.

Facility Characteristics

Table 2.2. The overall structure of the treatment system as reflected in the UFDS data remained relatively constant over the period 1991-1998. In 1998, private non-profit facilities made up the bulk of the system (56 percent), followed by private for-profit (28 percent) and State/local government (13 percent).

Most treatment was provided in specialty substance abuse treatment facilities (54 percent). Mental health facilities made up 23 percent of the system, and physical health settings made up 12 percent.

Six percent of facilities dispensed opioid substitutes (methadone or LAAM), down from a high of 9 percent in 1996. The median number of clients in treatment per facility has remained in the range of 35-40.

Managed Care

Table 2.3. Information on managed care has been collected since 1995. Facilities were asked whether they were owned or operated by a managed care firm, and whether they had managed care contracts. In 1998, only 1-2 percent of facilities were owned or operated by managed care firms, regardless of ownership or organizational setting. (The one exception was Federally-owned facilities, where the percent operated by managed care firms increased to almost 5 percent in 1998.)

About 45 percent of facilities had managed care contracts in 1998, with privately-owned facilities more likely to have contracts than government-owned facilities. The percentage with managed care contracts in 1998 ranged from a high of 57 percent in mental health settings to a low of 20 percent in criminal justice settings.


Client Characteristics

Table 2.4. The distribution of UFDS clients by sex is different from that of the U.S. population. In the U.S., about half the population is male, while in UFDS, males represented 69 percent of all clients on October 1, 1998.

The age distribution of UFDS clients is also different from that of the U.S. population. Eighty-nine percent of the UFDS population was aged 18-44 on October 1, 1998, compared

to 40 percent of the U.S. population. Client age patterns (Figure 2) changed over 1991-1998, with increases in the proportions of both younger and older clients. The proportion of clients under age 18 increased from 6 percent in 1991 to nearly 10 percent in 1998. The proportion of clients over age 35 increased from 41 percent to 46 percent. These increases were balanced by a decline in the proportion of clients aged 25-34, from 35 percent to 27 percent.

UFDS 1991-1998 compared to U.S. population 1998





The racial/ethnic composition of UFDS clients was somewhat different from that of the U.S. population. Whites were the majority in both groups, but represented 58 percent of UFDS clients on October 1, 1998, compared to 73 percent of the U.S. population. Blacks represented 24 percent of UFDS clients on the reference date, and 12 percent of the U.S. population.

The racial/ethnic composition of clients in treatment showed no consistent trends (Figure 3). The proportion of clients who were white ranged from 57-61 percent during that time, with the highest proportions reported in 1991 and 1995. The proportion of clients who were black or African-American ranged from 21-25 percent, with the highest proportion reported in 1997.

Type of care remained relatively consistent over the period 1991-1998 (Figure 4), though the proportion receiving hospital inpatient care showed a slight decline. On October 1, 1998, most clients (88 percent) were receiving outpatient treatment, 10 percent were receiving residential treatment, and fewer than 2 percent were receiving hospital inpatient treatment. Hospital care, while only a small proportion of the total, decreased by almost half from a high

of 2.6 percent in 1992 to only 1.4 percent in 1998.

Clients may receive opioid substitutes (methadone or LAAM) in conjunction with any other type of care. About 14 percent of clients were reported to be receiving opioid substitutes on October 1, 1998. This proportion has increased slightly since 1991.

CHAPTER 3

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key characteristics of facilities and programs on October 1, 1998. Facilities are described in terms of ownership, organizational setting, and number of clients in treatment. Ownership indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Organizational setting indicates the setting within which services are delivered and, for settings specializing in substance abuse treatment, the general type of care offered.¹ Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients enrolled on the reference date who received a substance abuse treatment service during the prior month.

Facility Ownership and Organizational Setting

Table 3.1a. Overall, 56 percent of facilities treating substance abuse were private non-profit. About 28 percent were private for-profit, and the balance were operated by various levels of government. For most organizational settings, private non-profits made up well over half of all facilities. Exceptions were solo/group practices, where only 7 percent were private non-profit, and psychiatric and specialized hospitals and criminal justice facilities, where

private non-profits made up slightly less than half of the facilities.

Table 3.1b. Organizationally, facilities specializing in substance abuse treatment made up 44 percent of all facilities. More than half of these facilities offered outpatient treatment only, about one-third offered residential treatment only, and the remainder offered both outpatient and residential treatment. Community mental health centers (CMHCs) and other non-hospital mental health facilities made up the next largest group of facilities, at 15 percent of all facilities. These were followed by solo/group practitioners (10 percent) and general hospitals (8 percent).

Clients in Treatment

Table 3.2. The median number of clients in treatment at a facility on October 1, 1998, was 38. Government-owned facilities tended to have more clients per facility than did private facilities. Among private facilities, non-profit facilities had more clients per facility than did forprofits.

The median number of clients in treatment also varied by organizational setting. Specialty substance abuse treatment facilities providing only outpatient services had the largest number of clients, with a median of 63. Facilities providing both outpatient and residential services had a median of 59 clients, followed by criminal justice settings, with 50 clients per facility. Residential specialty substance abuse treatment facilities and solo/group practices had the lowest median numbers of clients, 19 and 15, respectively.

¹ The 1998 UFDS questionnaire permitted some facilities to indicate more than one setting. For this report, each facility was assigned to a single organizational setting. See Appendix B for details.

Programs for Special Groups

Table 3.3. Some facilities offered special programs for high-risk or special-risk groups. These groups included the dually-diagnosed (persons with both mental and substance abuse problems), adolescents, persons with HIV or AIDS, pregnant/postpartum women, and other women's groups.

Overall, nearly half (48 percent) of all facilities provided programs for the dually diagnosed. These services were most likely to be provided by:

- VA-owned facilities (73 percent)
- CMHCs (69 percent)
- Psychiatric/specialized hospitals (66 percent)
- General hospitals (60 percent)

Facilities least likely to have programs for the dually diagnosed were:

- Department of Defense-owned facilities (34 percent)
- Community or religious organizations (35 percent)
- Specialty residential facilities (35 percent)
- Specialty outpatient facilities (38 percent)
- Criminal justice facilities (38 percent)

About 38 percent of facilities offered programs for adolescents. Programs for adolescents were most likely to be offered by:

- Indian Health Service or tribal governmentowned facilities (66 percent, combined)
- CMHCs (53 percent)
- Psychiatric/specialized hospitals (46 percent)

Adolescent programs were least likely to be available in:

- VA-owned facilities (no adolescent programs)
- Dept. of Defense-owned facilities (6 percent)
- Residential specialty substance abuse treatment facilities (17 percent)
- General hospitals (25 percent)
- Criminal justice facilities (29 percent)

Almost one-fifth (19 percent) of facilities offered programs for persons with HIV/AIDS. These programs were most likely to be available in:

- Community health centers (34 percent)
- VA-owned facilities (33 percent)

Programs for persons with HIV/AIDS were least likely to be offered by:

- Department of Defense-owned facilities (6 percent)
- Indian Health Service or tribal governmentowned facilities (7 percent, combined)
- Solo/group practices (13 percent)
- Private for-profit facilities (14 percent)

Programs for pregnant or postpartum women were offered by fewer than 20 percent of facilities. These were most likely to be offered at:

- Local government-owned facilities (32 percent)
- Community health centers (29 percent)
- Mixed outpatient/residential specialty substance abuse facilities (29 percent)

Programs for pregnant or postpartum women were least likely to be offered by:

- VA-owned facilities (5 percent)
- Solo/group practices (8 percent)
- Private for-profit facilities (10 percent)

Services Offered

Facilities responding to the mail questionnaire were asked to complete a detailed checklist of services available. Specific services were broadly categorized as:

- assessment services
- therapy
- testing
- health services
- continuing care
- transitional services
- community outreach
- other services

A majority of facilities offered one or more services in each category. Almost all facilities offered individual therapy (92-95 percent across ownership categories, and 87-97 percent across organizational setting categories). However, the availability of most specific services varied by ownership and organizational setting. Differences were most apparent in testing, health, and transitional services.

Table 3.4. In general, fewer private for-profit facilities offered a range of testing and health services, whereas State and Federal government-owned facilities were more likely to offer a range of these services.

Table 3.5. Solo/group practitioners were least likely to offer services in all categories except assessment and therapy. Among specialty substance abuse treatment facilities, outpatient facilities generally had fewer testing, health, and transitional services available than residential or mixed outpatient/residential facilities.

Beds Designated for Substance Abuse Treatment

Tables 3.6 and 3.7. Facilities were asked to report residential and hospital inpatient beds


designated for substance abuse treatment. The reader is cautioned in comparing these data with the 1997 UFDS data because of a change in the survey question. In 1997, facilities were asked about beds "available" for substance abuse treatment, whereas in 1998 they were asked about beds "designated" for treatment. This change may have resulted in different reporting for some facilities.

Some 3,112 facilities reported having 128,598 beds designated for residential treatment. More than 80 percent of these facilities were privately owned, and accounted for 74 percent of the beds. On October 1, 1998, 84 percent of the designated residential beds were in use by substance abuse treatment clients. The utilization rate varied by ownership from a low of 54 percent in defense department facilities to 90 percent in state and local government facilities. Community health centers reported clients in excess of designated capacity.

There were 24,921 beds designated for hospital inpatient treatment, reported by 960 facilities. Nearly 80 percent of these were privately owned, and accounted for 77 percent of the beds. On October 1, 1998, 54 percent of the designated hospital inpatient beds were in use by substance abuse treatment clients. The utilization rate by organizational setting varied from a low of 32 percent for community mental health centers to a high of 100 percent for community or religious treatment facilities. The Indian Health Service facilities reported clients in excess of designated capacity.

Figure 5 shows the distribution of the facility-level utilization rates separately for residential and hospital inpatient beds. Seventy percent of the facilities with residential beds were at or near capacity on the reference date, with utilization rates ranging from 76 to 100 percent. In contrast, only 32 percent of the facilities with

hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range.

Revenue

Table 3.8. About 84 percent of facilities reported revenue information, including those whose revenue was reported by an administratively-linked facility. The revenue for the non-respondents was imputed (see Appendix C). Total revenue, including the imputed amounts, was estimated at approximately \$6.8 billion. The total reported revenue (exclusive of imputation) was approximately \$5.9 billion, of which:

- 33 percent was State government funds (including Federal block grant funds, which are distributed by the State)
- 16 percent was from Medicaid
- 15 percent was from private health insurance
- 11 percent was from direct client payments

These percentages varied considerably by ownership and organizational setting. For example, 51 percent of the revenue of private forprofit facilities came from private health insurance and client payments, compared with 25 percent for private non-profit facilities.

CHAPTER 4

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on October 1, 1998. Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients enrolled on the reference date who received a substance abuse treatment service during the prior month. Also used in these tables are the two facility descriptors, ownership and organizational setting. Ownership indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Organizational setting indicates the setting within which services are delivered and, for settings specializing in substance abuse treatment, the general type of care offered.¹

Clients by Facility Ownership and Organizational Setting

Table 4.1a. Over half (54 percent) of all clients in treatment on October 1, 1998, were in private non-profit facilities. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 24 percent of clients. Facilities owned by Federal, State, or local governments accounted for 21 percent of all clients; about half of these clients were in local government facilities.

Table 4.1b. Specialty substance abuse treatment facilities treated the largest proportion of cli-

ents, 47 percent, the great majority of these being outpatient clients. CMHCs and other mental health facilities treated 15 percent, and general hospitals, 9 percent.

Clients by Type of Care

Tables 4.2a and 4.2b. The 1998 UFDS survey requested data on clients in treatment on October 1, 1998 who received:

- Outpatient treatment services (non-intensive outpatient care, intensive outpatient care, and outpatient detoxification)
- Residential treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification)
- Hospital inpatient treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification)

Most clients (88 percent) were enrolled in one of three types of outpatient care: non-intensive outpatient care (66 percent), intensive outpatient (19 percent), or outpatient detoxification (3 percent). Ten percent of clients were in residential rehabilitation. The three remaining categories (residential detoxification, hospital inpatient rehabilitation, and hospital inpatient detoxification) each accounted for less than 1 percent of all clients.

General and psychiatric/specialized hospitals were the organizational settings with the highest proportions of hospital inpatient clients (6 and 10 percent, respectively). However, most clients in these settings were outpatients, enrolled in outpatient treatment programs within hospital organizations.

¹ The 1998 UFDS questionnaire permitted some facilities to indicate more than one setting. For this report, each facility was assigned to a single organizational setting (see Appendix B for details).

Clients by Substance of Abuse

Table 4.3. On October 1, 1998, half of all clients were in treatment for abuse of both drugs and alcohol. About one-quarter of clients were in treatment for drug abuse alone, and one-quarter for alcohol abuse alone.

Clients in treatment in facilities owned by tribal and State governments exhibited a higher proportion of both alcohol and drug abuse (63 and 58 percent respectively). Facilities operated by the Department of Defense had a high proportion of clients (73 percent) who abused alcohol alone.

Clients in community or religious agencies, residential facilities, mixed outpatient/residential facilities, criminal justice settings, and community health centers were more likely to have both alcohol and drug problems (64, 64, 59, 58, and 58 percent, respectively).

Client Demographics

Table 4.4. More than two-thirds of clients in substance abuse treatment on October 1, 1998 were male. Fifty-eight percent were white, 24 percent were black or African-American, and 14 percent were Hispanic. Most clients (56 percent) were between 25 and 44 years of age.

Only 26 percent of clients in residential and hospital inpatient treatment were female, although females comprised 31 percent of the total treatment population.

Clients Receiving Opioid Substitutes

Table 4.5. Facilities were asked whether they dispensed the opioid substitutes methadone and LAAM and, if so, how many clients received them. Six percent of all facilities (811 facilities) reported dispensing opioid substitutes. Almost half (46 percent) of all facilities dispensing

opioid substitutes were private non-profit. Another 37 percent were private for-profit.

Overall, 149,030 clients in treatment (14 percent of all clients) were reported to be receiving either methadone or LAAM. Methadone predominated; it was given to 98 percent of clients receiving opioid substitutes. Slightly less than half (48 percent) of clients receiving opioid substitutes were treated at private non-profit facilities; 38 percent were treated at private forprofit facilities.

Opioid substitutes were most commonly dispensed in outpatient specialty substance abuse treatment facilities, which treated 71 percent of opioid substitute clients. General hospitals treated 10 percent of the opioid substitute clients.

Facilities dispensing opioid substitutes tend to specialize in this form of treatment. Overall, 77 percent of clients treated in facilities that dispense opioid substitutes received them. In private non-profit facilities dispensing opioid substitutes, 78 percent of all clients received them. In private for-profit facilities dispensing opioid substitutes, 93 percent of all clients received them.

CHAPTER 5

STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility and client data by State or jurisdiction. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

These tables are presented for reference only. Care should be taken in drawing any conclusions about differences between States. As discussed in Chapter 1, States differ in their systems of licensure/certification and disbursement of public funds. These factors affect the scope of facilities included in UFDS for each State, and it may create artifactual differences among States. Also, no adjustments were made for survey non-response. In smaller States especially, non-participation of even one or two large facilities can affect findings.

Table 5.1 details the 1998 UFDS survey response rate. Table 5.2 summarizes the numbers of treatment facilities and clients by State or jurisdiction. Table 5.3 presents, for the 50 States and the District of Columbia, the number of clients in treatment by substance abuse problem and the number in treatment per 100,000 population (aged 12 and over). Tables 5.4-5.11 provide State-level detail on tables presented in earlier chapters and will not be discussed.

Survey Response

Table 5.1. For the United States, the overall response rate was 90 percent, ranging from 81 percent for Georgia to 100 percent for North Dakota. Puerto Rico, the largest of the non-State jurisdictions surveyed, had a response rate of 89 percent.

Facilities and Clients

Table 5.2. About half of all clients in treatment were located in eight States. California had the largest number of clients, with 12 percent. New York ranked second, with 11 percent of clients. Following in order by number of clients were Michigan, Texas, Illinois, Florida, Massachusetts, and Ohio.

Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population

Table 5.3. For the United States, there were 462 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 12 and over on October 1, 1998. *Figure 6* maps the rates of clients in treatment by State, and indicates that States in the Northeast and West had the highest rates of clients in treatment.

The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (229 per 100,000), followed by drug abuse only (123 per 100,000) and alcohol abuse only (110 per 100,000). While these rates can suggest the extent of the underlying substance abuse problem, they also reflect the level of resources available for treatment and should be interpreted with caution.

Clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 12 and over, by State or jurisdiction: October 1, 1998



APPENDIX A

UFDS 1998 QUESTIONNAIRE

This Appendix contains a complete copy of the 1998 UFDS questionnaire that was sent by mail to all facilities. As noted in Chapter 1, 78 percent of the 13,455 responding treatment facilities completed this version of the questionnaire.

A slightly abbreviated version of the mail questionnaire was administered by telephone to those facilities that, after the repeated followup efforts detailed in Chapter 1, had not completed the survey. The telephone interview was con-

ducted using computer-assisted telephone interviewing (CATI). A printed version of the CATI interview is not included here because it contains embedded instructions and skip patterns that make it difficult to read.

The CATI interview included all items from the mail survey except the detailed checklist of substance abuse services (Question 7). However, the section of this checklist concerning programs for special groups (items 30-34 and 61) was asked of telephone respondents.

APPENDIX B

ORGANIZATIONAL SETTING

consistent goal of UFDS has been to iden-Atify treatment setting, a concept that is subject to a variety of definitions and interpretations. Definitions of treatment setting generally fall into three categories. A treatment setting may be an organizational setting (e.g., a hospital or mental health center). It may indicate a treatment philosophy (e.g., social model or therapeutic community). Finally, it may indicate living arrangements while in treatment (e.g., outpatient, residential, halfway house). These different definitions are driven by the many different needs of data users. For example, treatment setting may be used by payers to set rates, by treatment professionals to determine levels of care, or by planners to determine system needs.

UFDS planners have tried to incorporate data elements that permit analysis of treatment setting from different viewpoints. These data elements have changed as the questionnaire has evolved over time. In general, prior to 1995, organizational setting was collected in a single environment/location/setting question. Treatment philosophy and client living arrangement were collected in client census matrices, which cross-tabulated modality/type of care with environment/facility location. In 1995, the client census matrices were simplified to reduce the reporting burden, and the environment/setting/ location question was expanded to recapture information lost from the matrices.

In the 1998 UFDS survey, treatment setting was collected in a single question (Question 5; see Appendix A). Respondents were asked to select

which setting or settings best described the facility. Options included:

- General hospital
- Psychiatric hospital
- Other specialized hospital
- Outpatient facility specializing in substance abuse treatment
- Halfway house
- Residential (non-hospital) substance abuse treatment facility
- Therapeutic community
- Community mental health center or other mental health facility providing a variety of services
- Community health center
- School
- Community or religious organization/agency providing a variety of social services
- Jail, prison, or juvenile detention center
- Other criminal justice
- Private practice solo
- Private practice group
- Other setting

This multiple listing, in conjunction with the counts of clients in treatment by type of care, was designed to permit flexibility in the definition and analysis of treatment setting.

The definition of treatment setting used in this report corresponds to that of *organizational setting*. To present facility and client data by organizational setting, it was necessary to assign each facility to a single organizational setting category. The organizational settings categories used in the report are:

- Specialty substance abuse treatment
 - Outpatient
 - Residential (including halfway house, therapeutic community)
 - Outpatient and residential
- Community mental health center/Other mental health facility
- Solo or group practice
- General hospital (including VA hospitals)
- Psychiatric or other specialized hospital
- Criminal justice
- Community or religious agency/organization
- Community health center
- Multiple or unknown settings

About two-thirds of the facilities selected a single setting category. For those facilities selecting multiple responses to the setting question, assignment to a single organizational setting category was completed following an algorithm developed to place each facility into its most logical setting category. For multiple responses, setting categories were determined

first on the basis of whether a larger organizational affiliation was indicated. Thus facilities indicating that they were set in a community mental health center, community health center, solo or group practice, the criminal justice system, or community or religious agency/organization were categorized as such. Facilities not indicating such an affiliation were classified as *Specialty substance abuse treatment facilities*. These were further subdivided according to client living arrangement (outpatient, residential, or mixed outpatient and residential).

Facilities indicating more than one larger affiliation (such as both CMHC and community health center) were classified as *Mixed/Un-known*. This category also included facilities that indicated that they were schools, and those that failed to specify a setting.

Appendix Table 1 provides counts of the multiple responses, and indicates the category to which facilities were assigned for this report.

APPENDIX C

REVENUE IMPUTATION METHODOLOGY

In the 1998 UFDS survey, 16 percent of facilities did not provide revenue data. For these facilities, missing revenue was imputed using the program PROC IMPUTE, a regression-based distributional estimation procedure. An evaluation of imputation procedures used in the 1995 and 1996 UFDS indicated that, in a simulation study, PROC IMPUTE performed better than the random within-class hot-deck procedure.²

PROC IMPUTE assumes that relations among variables are constant for both observed and missing cases. It considers each variable on the file in turn as a target variable whose missing values are to be filled in. The procedure uses information on other variables to minimize the error in imputing each target variable. For each target variable, regression analysis is used to find the best combination of predictors. Once the regression models are constructed and regression values are computed for all cases (both observed and missing cases), PROC IMPUTE partitions the range of regression values into subsets. All cases in a given subset that are missing the target variable are then imputed with weighted averages of two values. These values are drawn from that regression

function value subset and from an adjacent subset. They are weighted with probability proportional to the distribution of reported values for that variable within the two subsets. The weighted average value is rounded to an integer if the integer flag is set for the target variable. The basic assumption of this algorithm is that within these homogeneous subsets, the missing value cases will have the same target value distribution as the cases with reported values on the target variable.

A limitation of PROC IMPUTE is that it is not robust to extreme outliers. Steps were taken to identify and exclude from the process any records with extreme values reported for revenue.

Editing/Manual Imputation of Total Revenue

The total revenue value for each facility (Q30) was compared to the sum of the revenue from each of its various funding sources (Q31). If the reported total revenue was less than this sum, it was changed to equal the sum. If the reported total revenue was greater than the sum of the revenue from the funding sources, the difference was computed and entered as *Revenue source unknown*. Revenue was imputed for facilities where a value was missing either because the respondent did not know or refused to answer.

Of the 13,455 treatment facilities, 9,922 reported a revenue value, 1,316 indicated that their revenue was included in that reported by another facility, and 2,217 facilities had missing revenue values.

Of the 9,922 facilities reporting a revenue value, 852 indicated that the revenue reported included revenue for other facilities (Q33). Responses for these 852 were examined for two types of inconsistencies:

- A facility reported that its revenue included revenue for other facilities, but was missing a revenue amount. For these facilities, final status codes were examined. In all such cases, the facility had a final status code of 10 or 12, indicating that its data were reported by another facility.
- A facility reported that its revenue included revenue for other facilities, and reported a revenue amount. The records of each of the facilities reported for (Q24a) were examined. If any of these facilities had reported revenue, the revenue of that facility was set to a special missing code. This was done to avoid double counting of revenue and to indicate that revenue should not be imputed.

The final editing step was to identify facilities with revenue values that would be considered outliers. These were facilities not reporting for others that reported more than \$6 million in revenue.

Revenue and client information for each of these facilities was compared to its revenue and client information reported in 1996 and 1997. Records that were inconsistent with prior years were checked for data entry errors against the original questionnaire. Errors were corrected if found, and the facility was considered as an outlier if there had been no such error.

Auxiliary Variables

A range of items in the 1998 UFDS was examined to determine the best subset of items to be used as predictor variables in the imputation procedure. Four survey questions were selected

because they had the strongest correlation with the total revenue item and/or the amount of missing revenue data differed across the levels of these items. Responses to the questions were recoded as 20 variables (Appendix Table 2) to meet the structural input data requirements of PROC IMPUTE. Results also identified State as a stratifying variable.

Overview of Imputation Procedure

Missing revenue values for 2,217 facilities were imputed using PROC IMPUTE. Two groups of facilities were excluded as independent variables in the imputation process:

- the 852 facilities that indicated that the revenue reported included revenue for other facilities; and
- the 96 additional facilities that were considered to have outlying revenue values.

A new variable was created in the database that contains the imputed and reported revenue

values for all treatment facilities. An imputation flag variable for this variable was also created.

Profile of Imputation Results

Pre- and post-imputation revenue distributions compared across states confirmed that no distortions occurred. Revenue distributions were also compared across groups of facilities with different types of clients, ownership, numbers of clients, and types of services to ensure that these distributions were not distorted as a result of the imputations. Results confirmed that no distortions occurred.
