## TRADING SUSPENSIONS

U.S. SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION

TRADING SUSPENDED IN SUNAIR ELECTRONICS, INC.

The SEC announced the single ten-day suspension of exchange and over-the-counter trading in the securities of Sunair Electronics, Inc., a Florida corporation located in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, for the period beginning on November 22 and terminating at midnight (EST) on December 1. The Commission suspended trading at the request of the company and because of the lack of adequate information available to the public concerning the possible sale of a 49% interest in the company and a potential tender offer for the remaining shares. Further, information is expected to be available concerning this matter prior to the termination of this trading suspension. (Rel. 34-15349)

### CIVIL PROCEEDINGS

COMPLAINT NAMES LASER ENERGY, INC. AND PRESIDENT

The New York Regional Office announced the filing of a complaint in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of New York on November 6 seeking to enjoin Laser Energy, Inc. and D. Peter Prosdorf, president, chairman of the board of directors and largest stockholder of Laser, from violations and aiding and abetting violations of the antifraud and reporting provisions of the securities laws and also seeking the amendment of Laser's public filings.

The Commission's complaint alleges that from September 1976 to the present, Laser and Prosdorf: (1) publicly disseminated, in reports filed with the Commission, financial statements which were false and misleading in that sales, income, accounts receivables, current assets and total assets were overstated by improperly including two major sales transactions which were contingent on the occurrence of other events which did not occur; (2) failed to disclose that Laser was delinquent in [a] remitting to the appropriate authorities funds withheld from employees' salaries with respect to Federal and New York State income tax and social security tax and [b] filing the appropriate returns regarding such withholdings; (3) failed to disclose that a previously reported \$2 million letter of credit agreement had not been consummated and in fact had been abandoned; and (4) failed to disclose that its independent auditors had resigned.

On the same day as the filing of the complaint, the Commission also submitted final judgments of permanent injunction by consent against Laser and Prosdorf enjoining them from further violations and aiding and abetting violations of the antifraud and reporting provisions of the securities laws and requiring that amendatory and supplementary reports be filed with the Commission. (SEC v. Laser Energy, Inc. and D. Peter Prosdorf, W.D.N.Y., 78 Civil Action No. 718). (LR-8599)

### DISPOSITION OF ACTION AS TO CERTAIN CONTROL METALS DEFENDANTS

The Denver Regional Office and the New York Regional Office announced that on October 12 Whitman Knapp, U.S. District Judge for the Southern District of New York, granted the Commission's motion for voluntary dismissal of its civil injunctive action against Calder Corporation, Ltd. (a District of Columbia corporation), Fountainhead International, Ltd. (a Bahamian corporation), Western General Corporation (a District of Columbia corporation), Martin Ciment of Brooklyn, New York, doing business as Crown Trading Co., Jill D. Ciganek of Hyattsville, Maryland, Harry Ship of Montreal, Canada, and Robert G. Baker of Washington, D.C., without costs and without prejudice.

On September 15 Judge Knapp signed a final judgment of permanent injunction by consent as to Paul Sachs which enjoined that defendant from violations of the registration and antifraud provisions of the securities laws in securities of Control Metals Corporation. (SEC v. Control Metals Corporation, et al., 70 Civil 4368, U.S.D.C., S.D.N.Y.). (LR-8606)

## **CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS**

HOWARD P. CARROLL AND DAVID ROBERT WILSON'S CONVICTIONS AFFIRMED JERRY MCFARLAND'S CONVICTION REVERSED

The Denver Regional Office announced that on October 25 the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit affirmed the convictions of Howard P. Carroll and David Robert Wilson, both of Denver, Colorado, of various counts of securities fraud, mail fraud and of conspiracy to violate such statutes. The court reversed the conviction of Jerry McFarland of conspiracy to violate the securities and mail fraud statutes. McFarland is a resident of Denver, Colorado. The court reversed McFarland's conviction based upon an erroneous jury instruction.

Previously, Carroll, Wilson and McFarland had been convicted on these charges by a jury in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, at Dallas, in the sale of securities of Coal Creek Mining Company, a Colorado company. (U.S. v. Carroll, et al., 77-5319, U.S.C.A., 5th Circuit). (LR-8598)

#### SAMUEL ARCH HARWELL AND PATRICK DENNIS SULLIVAN SENTENCED

The Fort Worth Regional Office and Houston Branch Office announced that Samuel Arch Harwell, Houston, Texas and Patrick Dennis Sullivan, Brea, California were each sentenced to four years in prison by the Honorable Carl O. Bue, U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas, on October 23. Both men in early September had pled guilty to one count of a four count indictment charging them with wire fraud, mail fraud and conspiracy to commit wire fraud. Harwell pled guilty to one count of mail fraud and Sullivan pled guilty to one count of wire fraud. (U.S. v. Harwell, et al., S.D. Tex., Criminal No. 78-H-78-87). (LR-8600)

#### RICHARD L. SHIELDS SENTENCED

The Atlanta Regional Office announced that on October 31 Richard L. Shields of Springfield, Missouri, was sentenced in Federal Court in Atlanta to four years inprisonment. The sentence was imposed pursuant to a plea of guilty entered by Shields to one count of securities fraud of a ten-count indictment charging him with five counts each of securities and mail fraud in the offer and sale of securities of Medical Professional Aids, Inc., a now defunct Alabama corporation. (U.S. v. Richard L. Shields, N.D. Ga., Criminal No. 78-194A). (LR-8601)

### ROBERT TEMP, OTHERS FOUND GUILTY

The Fort Worth Regional Office announced that on November 9 jury verdicts of guilty were returned against Robert Temp and Alaine Carter Temp, San Antonio, Texas, and Richard Daniel Freeman, San Francisco, California, in Federal District Court for the Western District of Texas at San Antonio, Texas, on various charges in a 28-count indictment. Robert and Alaine Temp were convicted on nine counts of mail fraud and eight counts of interstate transportation of property taken by fraud, while Freeman was convicted on eight counts of mail fraud and seven counts of interstate transportation of property taken by fraud. A fourth defendant, Walter Wilson Carter, Jr., San Antonio, had previously pled guilty on September 27 to one count of mail fraud (U.S. v. Walter Wilson Carter, Jr., et al., W.D. Tex., Criminal No. SA-78-CR-015). (LR-8605)

AMERICAN MONEY INSTRUMENTS, INC.

An order has been issued pursuant to Section 8(f) of the Act on an pplication of American Money Instruments, Inc. declaring that it has ceased to be an investment company. (Rel. IC-10488 - Nov. 22)

INTERNATIONAL INVESTORS, INC.

A notice has been issued giving interested persons until December 13 to request a hearing on an application of International Investors, Inc., registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940 as an open-end diversified management investment company, and III Securities Corporation, its principal underwriter, for an order pursuant to Section 6(c) of the Act exempting from the provisions of Section 22(d) of the Act a proposed transaction pursuant to which shares of International Investors, Inc. will

be issued at net asset value without a sales charge in exchange for shares of certain gold mining companies held by Mondial Commercial Limited, a Liechtenstein limited company through a subaccount at the Swiss Credit Bank, the Metric Accounting Unit Storage Agreement subaccount, in which approximately 1,925 persons have beneficial interests.
