HIGHLIGHTS

This report presents results from the 2000 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual survey of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

- ◆ A total of 13,428 facilities responded to the survey and reported a one-day census of 1,000,896 clients receiving substance abuse treatment on October 1, 2000.
- ♦ In 2000, private non-profit facilities made up the bulk of the system (60 percent), followed by private for-profit (26 percent) and State/ local government (11 percent) [Table 2.1].
- Over half (54 percent) of all facilities had managed care contracts in 2000, as compared to 42 percent in 1996 [Table 2.3].

- Outpatient rehabilitation was the most widely available type of care, with non-intensive outpatient rehabilitation offered by 78 percent of all facilities and intensive outpatient rehabilitation offered by 46 percent of all facilities. Residential rehabilitation was offered by 26 percent of all facilities, followed by partial hospitalization programs (16 percent) and outpatient detoxification (13 percent). Residential detoxification and hospital inpatient detoxification were each offered by 8 percent of all facilities [Table 3.2b].
- Half of all facilities offered special programs for the dually diagnosed with both mental and substance abuse disorders. More than one-third of facilities had programs for adolescents (37 percent) or offered DUI/DWI programs (36 percent) [Table 3.5b].
- Nearly half (48 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Twenty-nine percent of clients were treated for drug abuse only, while 23 percent were treated for alcohol abuse [Table 4.3].
- ♦ The overall 2000 N-SSATS response rate was 94 percent [Table 5.1].

CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2000 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), conducted between October 2000 and April 2001, with a reference date of October 1, 2000. It is the 24th in a series of national surveys designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcohol and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities² in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment.

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. The objectives of N-SSATS are to collect multipurpose data that can be used to—

 assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-supported and other treatment facilities and in forecasting treatment resource requirements;

- update SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities;
- analyze general treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States;
- generate the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs, a compendium of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

Survey History

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978. In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were

added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version was used (the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory). In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993. In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of nonrespondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned, and an abbreviated telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full mail survey was reinstated with telephone follow-up; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS).

N-SSATS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

N-SSATS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), a continuously-updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities. The other components of DASIS are N-SSATS and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of persons admitted to substance abuse treatment. A unique ID number assigned to each facility by I-SATS is used in the collection of facility-level data (N-SSATS) and client-level data (TEDS) so that the three data sets can be linked. Together, they provide nationaland State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-SATS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-SATS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facility to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (about 11,400 in 2000) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. The majority of these facilities are required by the State agency to provide TEDS client-level data. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of I-SATS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not required by the State agency to provide TEDS client-level data. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service, I-SATS records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by State substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (about 2,100 in 2000) represents the SAMHSA effort in recent years to make I-SATS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that State substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not license or certify. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases (see *Expansion of survey coverage*). State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Survey Coverage

The use of I-SATS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-SATS in recent years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Figure 1 is a time line detailing the major changes in survey scope and administration that may have affected the numbers of reporting facilities and clients. Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA introduced expanded efforts to obtain information from nonresponding facilities. This resulted in a 25 percent increase in the number of facilities and a 16 percent increase in the number of clients between 1991 and 1992. Beginning in 1995, changes in data collection methods enabled more complete identification of duplicate reporting by networks of facilities, causing a slight reduction in the total number of facilities.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided (detailed below) yielded a net of increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. The number of facilities reporting continued to increase in 1999, but at a slower pace, a net increase of 1,800 facilities. The increase between 1998 and 1999 was in large part because of the improved survey response rate (95 percent in 1999 vs. 90 percent in 1998).

In 2000, the number of facilities reporting dropped by 12 percent, to the 1998 level. There were several contributing factors. Although the survey response rate was 94 percent, the efforts of earlier years meant that there were fewer previously unknown facility sites to be identified. In addition, some 600 non-State agency-approved solo practitioners were identified and excluded from the 2000 survey universe. Fewer new facilities and a smaller universe combined with the customary turnover in facilities (in each of the years 1998, 1999, and 2000, 19 percent of the facilities that had reported the previous year did not report again) yielded a net loss between 1999 and 2000 of about 1,800 facilities.


Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that State substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. It also requests that facilities be included in I-SATS, N-SSATS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. Because of the different State administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-SATS ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

Expansion of survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-SATS are administratively monitored by State substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-SATS is affected by differences in State

systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on I-SATS. Some 15 source lists were considered, and facilities not on I-SATS were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on I-SATS. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before the 1998 and 1999 UFDS. Potential new facilities were identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, which were the three source lists from 1995 to 1996 that had yielded the most new facilities. Additional facilities are also identified during the survey itself by survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the State substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Data collection

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed facility survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities, and has conducted follow-up tele-

phone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee.

Nonresponse

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from nonresponding facilities. A representative sample of nonrespondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all nonresponding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. In 2000, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in a nonresponse rate of only 6 percent. For 94 percent of facilities in the sample, it was possible either to complete the survey or to determine that the facilities had closed or were otherwise ineligible.

Exclusions

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 UFDS survey and subsequent suveys because SAMHSA introduced a separate survey of correctional facilities.³ In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded (these facilities were reinstated in 1998 if they provided treatment). In 1999 and 2000, facilities treating incarcerated persons only were identified and excluded.

Changes in Survey Content

Table 1.1 Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize nonresponse and to include areas of emerging interest such as the role of managed care.

Data Collection Procedures for the 2000 N-SSATS

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 2000 N-SSATS ran from October 2000 through April 2001, with a reference date of October 1, 2000. Follow-up calls to nonresponding facilities and for correction of missing and erroneous data continued through June 2001.

Survey coverage

The 2000 survey was sent to all active facilities that were on I-SATS as of about six weeks before the survey reference date (October 1, 2000). These facilities were contacted by mail. Facilities added by State substance abuse agencies or discovered

during the survey prior to the second mailing were also included in the survey.

Content

The 2000 N-SSATS survey instrument was a 9-page document with 32 numbered questions (see Appendix A). Topics included:

- ♦ Facility identification information
- ♦ Ownership
- Primary focus (substance abuse, mental health, both substance abuse and mental health, general health, other)
- ♦ Hotline operation
- Services offered (assessment services, substance abuse therapy and counseling, testing, transitional services, other services)
- Special programs provided (adolescents, dually diagnosed, HIV/AIDS, gays/lesbians,

seniors/older adults, pregnant/postpartum women, other women's groups, groups of men only, DUI/DWI, criminal justice clients)

- Methadone/LAAM dispensing
- ♦ Languages in which treatment is provided
- ♦ Types of treatment provided

Data collection

Prior to the survey, faxes or letters were sent to all facilities to alert them to expect the survey. A secondary benefit of the letters was to update records with new address information returned from the post office. Data collection packets, including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter, State-specific letters of endorsement and other enclosures, were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Four to five weeks after the initial mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately eight

weeks after the initial mailing, nonresponding facilities were sent a second mailing. About four to five weeks after the second mailing, nonrespondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within two to three weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by telephone.

Forms accounting and response rate

Summary response rate information is presented in Table 1.2. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 17,341 facilities believed to offer substance abuse treatment services. Of these facilities, 15.7 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed, were not providing substance abuse treatment on October 1, 2000, or treated incarcerated clients only. Of the remaining 14,622 facilities, 94 percent completed the survey. Seventy-six percent of respondents completed the mail survey, 23 percent completed the survey via telephone, and 1 percent completed the survey using an experimental web-based questionnaire on the Internet. Either no response of any kind or a refusal was received from 6 percent of facilities presumed to be eligible for the survey.

There were a total of 13,749 respondents to the 2000 N-SSATS. The breakdown of these responses with respect to reporting of facility data and client counts is presented in Table 1.3 and are distributed as follows:

- There were 11,808 facilities that reported both facility data and client counts for their own organization.
- An additional 590 facilities reported on characteristics of their own facility and provided client counts for their own organization as well as other facilities. These 590 facilities reported client counts for a total of 1,841 facilities.
- There were 906 facilities that reported on the characteristics of their facility, with client counts reported by another facility within their organization.
- An additional 321 facilities did not provide data on facility characteristics and another facility provided their client counts.
- For 124 facilities, only data on facility characteristics were reported.

Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed for inconsistencies and missing data. Calls were made to facilities to obtain missing data and to clarify questionable responses. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. These incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks not readily implemented by manual review. As a final check, the data were returned to the State substance abuse agencies for their review. State corrections received through January 2002 were incorporated into the database.

If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were deleted and imputed.

Item nonresponse

Careful editing and extensive follow-up have greatly reduced item nonresponse (see Appendix Table 1). There are instances of nonresponse in most data items, however, and some variables have an explicit *Unknown* response option. Missing data for client count variables (e.g., the number of clients in hospital inpatient, non-hospital residential, and outpatient treatment) were imputed.

For the remaining unimputed variables, facilities with missing values for a given variable are excluded from the tabulations using that variable. As a result, the number of treatment facilities on which tables are based may vary somewhat from table to table. The number of facilities actually reporting data is generally included on each table.

Methodology of Imputation of Missing Client Counts

Of the 13,428 eligible facilities that completed the survey, 1,030 facilities responded that their client counts were reported by another facility. Therefore, 12,398 facilities should have provided client figures. Of these facilities, 280 were missing client values of any modality (i.e., hospital inpatient, outpatient, or residential).

When available, 1998 client values were used to impute the missing client counts on the 2000 N-SSATS. Of the 280 facilities with missing client data, a total of 120 facilities had 1998 client figures.

For 154 of the remaining 160 facilities, the average client value stratified by State and type of ownership was used to impute the missing client counts. Client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient rehabilitation, residential detoxification, etc.), as opposed to imputing total hospital inpatient, residential, and outpatient clients. Facilities were given imputed values for a given service if it reported that it provided such services but provided no client counts of any type. For example, a facility that reported that it provided hospital inpatient services and outpatient services was given client values for the hospital inpatient and outpatient variables. If that same facility reported that it did not provide residential services, then it was not given residential client values. The count of clients under age 18 were imputed using the percentage of clients under age 18 of each modality stratified by State and ownership. Methadone/LAAM figures were imputed using

a percentage method similar to that used to impute number of clients under age 18.

Six facilities were unique in that each facility was the only facility in a state to posses a certain ownership value. These facilities were imputed using average values stratified by State only; ownership was not used.

Further Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2000 N-SSATS. Some of these are outlined above. Other general issues are discussed here; considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There is no adjustment for facility nonresponse.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- N-SSATS collects data about facilities, not individual clients. Data on clients represent an aggregate of clients in treatment for each reporting facility.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into four analytic sections. Chapter 2 presents broad trends

in facility characteristics for 1996 to 2000. Chapter 3 describes key characteristics of facilities and the services they provide. Chapter 4 describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on the reference date. Finally, Chapter 5 presents State-level detail of many of the tables presented in Chapters 3 and 4.

This report will focus on the 13,428 facilities that completed the survey. Because some of these facilities reported client counts for affiliated facilities that did not respond to the survey, the client counts in Chapters 4 and 5 actually include client data for 13,649 facilities.

Terminology

The majority of tables in the report are organized according to facility ownership and the primary focus of the facility and present data on the characteristics of facilities and clients in treatment at these

facilities. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

Ownership indicates the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal).

Primary focus indicates the type of services the facility primarily focuses on: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, general health care, both substance abuse and mental health services, and other.

Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients enrolled on the reference date who received a substance abuse treatment service during the prior month.

CHAPTER 2


TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 1996 to 2000. It should be kept in mind, however, that the list frame, methods, and survey instrument have changed during this period. These changes are detailed in Chapter 1.

Number of Facilities and Methadone Facilities

Table 2.1 and Figure 2. While there is a definite overall increase in the number of reporting facilities from 1996, this is most likely due to improved survey methodology rather than an increase in the actual number of facilities. Approximately 9 percent of facilities in 2000 reported that they dispensed methodone or levo-alpha acetyl methodol (LAAM).

UFDS - N-SSATS 1996-2000




Facility Ownership

Table 2.1 and Figure 3. Facilities are described in terms of ownership, that is, the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Despite year to year fluctuations in the number of facilities reporting, the overall structure of the treatment system (as reflected in the N-SSATS ownership data) changed very little over the time period.

In 2000, private non-profit facilities made up the bulk of the system (60 percent). Since 1996, this proportion has remained relatively constant, ranging from 56 percent to 61 percent. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 26 percent of facilities that responded. Recent fluctuations in the percent of private-for-profit facilities are probably due to efforts to expand the survey coverage, followed by the decision to exclude non-State agency-approved solo practitioners. Eleven percent of facilities were owned by State or local government, while the Federal government owned 2 percent, and Tribal governments owned 1 percent of reporting facilities.

UFDS - N-SSATS 1996-2000




Programs for Special Groups

Table 2.2 and Figure 4. Facilities may offer treatment programs designed to address the specific needs of certain groups. These groups include the dually diagnosed (persons with a mental illness and co-occurring substance abuse), adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS, and pregnant or postpartum women. Data on these groups were not collected in 1996. Adolescent programs were offered at 37 percent of facilities, which was similar to previous

years. The proportion of facilities offering special programs for each of the four specified groups remained relatively stable from 1997 to 2000. Over that period, 45 to 50 percent offered special programs for dually diagnosed, 34 to 39 percent offered special programs for adolescents, 19 to 24 percent offered special programs for persons with HIV/AIDS, and 19 to 22 percent offered special programs for pregnant or postpartum women.

Managed Care

Table 2.3 and Figure 5. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector (e.g., HMOs) where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed." Approximately 54 percent of facilities had managed care contracts in 2000, compared to 42 percent in 1996. The percentage of facilities with managed care contracts increased slightly from 1996 to 2000 for all ownership categories except two. State government-owned facilities demonstrated a relatively large increase in the percent reporting managed care contracts, from about one-eighth in 1996 to about

one-third in 2000. Private for-profit facilities showed little change, with just over half of the facilities (53 to 56 percent) reporting managed care contracts in four of the five years. In general, privately-owned facilities were more likely to have managed care contracts than government-owned facilities.

Table 2.4. The proportion of managed care facilities increased in most States from 1996 to 2000. However, there was little or no change in Arizona, Hawaii, and Massachusetts. Missouri, Oklahoma, and Vermont were the only States to demonstrate a decrease during the time period.

UFDS - N-SSATS 1996-2000



CHAPTER 3

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2000. Facilities are described in terms of ownership, that is, the type of entity owning or responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit, private non-profit, or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). They are also described in terms of the facility's primary focus: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, general health care, both substance abuse and mental health services, and other.

Primary Focus

Table 3.1. Overall, 61 percent of facilities reported that treating substance abuse problems was their primary focus of activity. Nine percent of all facilities reported mental health services as their main focus, while three percent focused on general health care. One-quarter of all facilities focused on a balance of substance abuse and mental health services. The VA had the largest proportion (46 percent) of facilities that reported a general health focus, and the smallest proportion (29 percent) with a primary focus of substance abuse treatment.

Type of Care Offered

Tables 3.2a and 3.2b. Outpatient rehabilitation was the most widely available type of care, with non-intensive and intensive rehabilitation offered by 78 percent and 46 percent of all facilities, respectively. Residential rehabilitation was offered by 26 percent of all facilities, while hospital inpatient rehabilitation was offered by 5 percent of facilities. Sixteen percent of all facilities provided partial hospitalization programs. Outpatient detoxification was available at 13 percent of facilities, while residential detoxification and hospital inpatient detoxification were each provided by 8 percent of all facilities.

As a group, Federally owned facilities were most likely to offer all types of outpatient care including non-intensive and intensive rehabilitation, detoxification, and partial hospitalization (94 percent, 58 percent, 42 percent, and 28 percent, respectively). Residential rehabilitation was more likely to be offered by private non-profit facilities (33 percent).

Facilities that focused primarily on substance abuse treatment were least likely to provide hospital inpatient care (both rehabilitation and detoxification) and most likely to provide residential care (both rehabilitation and detoxification). Facilities with general health care as a primary focus, which comprise less than 3 percent of all treatment facilities in the survey, were most likely to provide hospital inpatient care (both rehabilitation and detoxification), and the less common forms of outpatient care (intensive outpatient, outpatient detoxification, and partial hospitalization).

Methadone/LAAM Dispensed

Tables 3.2a and 3.2b. Methadone/LAAM was dispensed by 9 percent of all facilities. Facilities most likely to dispense methadone/LAAM were private for-profit facilities (14 percent) and Federal government facilities (12 percent), particularly the facilities operated by the VA (22 percent). State government-owned facilities were also more likely than average to dispense methadone/LAAM (12 percent).

Facilities with a general health care or substance abuse focus were more likely to dispense methadone/LAAM (19 percent and 11 percent, respectively) than facilities with a focus on both substance abuse and mental health or on mental health only (5 percent each).

Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 3.3. As recently as 1980, the Federal government surveyed facilities treating alcohol and drug abuse separately. By 2000, however, the vast majority of facilities (95 percent) treated both alcohol and drug abuse. The Department of Defense had the highest proportion of facilities that treated alcohol abuse only (36 percent). The proportion of facilities that treated only drug abuse ranged among ownership categories from zero to 6 percent. Regardless of the primary focus of the facility, well over 90 percent of facilities treated both alcohol and drug abuse.

Type of Payment Accepted

Table 3.4. Cash/self-payment and private insurance were the most widely accepted forms of payment for substance abuse treatment (accepted overall by 90 percent and 71 percent of facilities, respectively). Medicaid was accepted by just over half of all facilities (54 percent). Federal military insurance and Medicare were accepted by roughly one-third of all facilities (34 percent and 37 percent, respectively).

The type of payment accepted varied considerably by ownership. Local and State government-owned facilities, private non-profit facilities, and Indian Health Service facilities were the most likely to accept Medicaid and Medicare payments for substance abuse treatment.

Facilities with a focus on substance abuse treatment were least likely to accept the full range of insurance types; fewer than one quarter accepted Medicare or Federal military insurance, fewer than one half accepted Medicaid, and just under two-thirds accepted private insurance. About two-thirds of these facilities, however, offered a sliding fee scale, roughly the same proportion as facilities with a focus on mental health (also 66 percent) or on substance abuse/mental health combined (72 percent).

Sliding Fee Scale Offered

Table 3.4. A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment was offered by approximately two-thirds (67 percent) of all facilities. The sliding fee scale was most likely to be offered in State and local government-owned facilities (72 percent and 83 percent, respectively) as well as private non-profit (72 percent) facilities. It was least likely to be offered in Federally owned facilities (18 percent). General health care focused facilities were less likely than other facilities to offer a sliding fee scale (38 percent).

Programs for Special Groups

Tables 3.5a and 3.5b. Facilities may offer treatment programs designed to address the specific needs of certain groups. These groups include dually diagnosed (persons with a mental illness and co-occurring substance abuse), adolescents, persons with HIV/AIDS, gays and lesbians, older adults, and pregnant or postpartum women. Special programs may also be designed for groups of men or women (other than pregnant or postpartum women), or persons in the criminal justice system. Many facilities offer treatment for persons arrested while driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI) or driving while intoxicated (DWI).

Overall, half of all facilities provided programs for the dually diagnosed. These services were most likely to be provided by:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (72 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (65 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a substance abuse and mental health focus (70 percent)
- ♦ Facilities with a mental health focus (66 percent)

Facilities least likely to have programs for the dually diagnosed were:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (40 percent)
- ◆ Tribal government-owned facilities (42 percent)

◆ Facilities with a substance abuse focus (39 percent)

Thirty-seven percent of facilities offered programs for adolescents. These programs were found most often in:

- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (73 percent)
- ◆ Tribal government-owned facilities (65 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a substance abuse and mental health focus (50 percent)

Adolescent programs were least likely to be in:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (no adolescent programs)
- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (4 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a general health care focus (22 percent)

About one-fifth (22 percent) of facilities offered programs for persons with HIV/AIDS. These programs were most likely to be in:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (32 percent)
- ♦ State government-owned facilities (25 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (25 percent)

HIV/AIDS programs were least likely to be offered by:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (8 percent)
- ♦ Tribal government-owned facilities (17 percent)
- ♦ Facilities with a mental health focus (12 percent)

Overall, special groups for gays and lesbians were available at 15 percent of facilities, which were most likely to be:

- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (23 percent)
- ◆ Private for-profit facilities (19 percent)
- ◆ Tribal government-owned facilities (17 percent)
- ◆ Facilities that focused on both substance abuse and mental health (17 percent)

Facilities least likely to offer programs for gays and lesbians were:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (4 percent)
- ♦ VA-owned facilities (11 percent)

Programs for pregnant or postpartum women were offered by 21 percent of facilities. These programs were most likely to be available at:

- ♦ Local government-owned facilities (30 percent)
- ♦ Tribal government-owned facilities (29 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (28 percent)

These programs for pregnant or postpartum women were least likely to be offered by:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (6 percent)
- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (12 percent)
- ♦ Facilities with a mental health focus (12 per cent)

Programs for other women's groups were provided by 38 percent of facilities, most often at:

- ◆ Local government-owned facilities (48 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (48 percent)
- ♦ State government-owned facilities (43 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a substance abuse focus (42 percent)

Facilities least likely to offer these programs were:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (19 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a mental health focus (20 percent)

Programs for men only were provided by 33 percent of all facilities and most often by:

- ◆ Private non-profit facilities (35 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (35 percent)
- ♦ Local government-owned facilities (34 percent)

◆ Facilities with a substance abuse focus (37 percent)

Least likely to offer programs for men only were:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (16 percent)
- ♦ Facilities with a mental health focus (16 percent)

Eighteen percent of all facilities provided programs for seniors or older adults. Facilities most likely to have this type of program included:

- ◆ Tribal government-owned facilities (29 percent)
- ♦ VA-owned facilities (28 percent)
- ♦ Indian Health Service facilities (28 percent)

Facilities least likely to offer special programs for seniors or older adults were:

- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (11 percent)
- ♦ State government-owned facilities (13 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a substance abuse focus (15 percent)

Thirty-eight percent of all facilities offered programs for persons in the criminal justice system. (Facilities treating incarcerated persons only were excluded from this survey; see Chapter 1.) These types of programs were most likely to be provided by:

- ◆ Indian Health Service facilities (43 percent)
- ♦ Local government-owned facilities (41 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with an equal focus on substance abuse and mental health (41 percent)
- Facilities with a substance abuse focus (39 percent)

Least likely to provide programs for persons referred from the criminal justice system were:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (11 percent)
- ◆ Department of Defense-owned facilities (12 percent)

◆ Facilities with a general health care focus (18 percent)

Special programs for those arrested for DUI/DWI were offered by 36 percent of all facilities. Those facilities most likely to provide this type of program included:

- ◆ Private for-profit facilities (49 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a substance abuse and mental health focus (46 percent)

Least likely to offer DUI/DWI programs were:

- ♦ VA-owned facilities (22 percent)
- ◆ Facilities with a general health care focus (23 percent)

Types of Services Offered

Tables 3.6a and 3.6b, Tables 3.7a and 3.7b. Facilities were asked about the types of services they offered. Services were grouped into five broad categories:

- ♦ Assessment services
- ♦ Substance abuse therapy and counseling
- **♦** Testing
- ◆ Transitional services
- ♦ Other services

A majority of facilities offered one or more services in each category. Only 10 facilities reported offering none of the identified services. Overall, substance abuse therapy and counseling was offered by the largest proportion of facilities (99-100 percent across ownership categories; 96-100 percent across primary focus categories). The availability of most specific services varied somewhat by ownership and primary focus. Differences were most apparent in testing and transitional services.

Table 3.6. In general, fewer private for-profit facilities offered a range of testing and transitional services as compared with the range of these

services offered by Federal and State governmentowned facilities.

Table 3.7. Facilities with a focus on general health care generally provided more testing and transitional services than facilities with other types of focus. Overall, a lower proportion of facilities focused on mental health offered other types of services such as HIV/AIDS counseling, outcome follow-up, or transportation assistance.

Clients in Treatment

Table 3.8. The median number of clients in treatment at a facility on October 1, 2000 was 35. Government-owned facilities tended to have more clients per facility than did private facilities. Federal government-owned facilities overall had a higher median client count than other government-owned facilities, due primarily to the median number of clients in treatment at VA facilities (105).

The median number of clients also varied according to primary focus of the facility. Facilities with a focus on substance abuse treatment services or both substance abuse and mental health treatment had the largest number of clients, with a median of 40 and 34, respectively. Facilities with a primary focus on general health care had a median of 26 clients. Mental health focused facilities reported the lowest number of clients, with a median of 18.

Beds Designated for Substance Abuse Treatment

Facilities were asked to report residential and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment.

Table 3.9. Some 3,044 facilities reported having 104,164 non-hospital residential beds designated for substance abuse treatment. More than 85 percent of these facilities were privately owned and accounted for 90 percent of the beds. On October 1,2000, approximately 85 percent of all designated residential beds were in use by substance abuse treatment clients.

The utilization rate varied by ownership category from a low of 55 percent for Department of Defense-owned facilities to a high of 100 percent for State government-owned facilities. The majority of remaining ownership categories had utilization rates between 80 percent and 85 percent.

Utilization rates varied slightly depending on the primary focus of the facility. Facilities with a general health care focus had a utilization rate of 68 percent. Utilization rates for the remaining primary focus categories ranged from 79 percent to 89 percent.

Table 3.10. There were 13,230 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment among 614 reporting facilities. Nearly 80 percent of these facilities were privately owned and accounted for approximately 77 percent of the beds. On Ocotber 1, 2000, 69 percent of the designated hospital inpatient beds were in use by substance abuse treatment clients.

Utilization rates varied by ownership category with the lowest rate of 62 percent among private forprofit facilities. The Indian Health Service facilities reported clients in excess of designated capacity. Rates for the remaining ownership categories ranged from 67 percent to 93 percent.

Utilization rates among primary focus groups were less varied. Facilities with a substance abuse focus had a rate of 68 percent, while facilities with a substance abuse and mental health focus had a rate of 69 percent. Mental health and general health focused facilities had similar utilization rates (73 percent and 75 percent, respectively).

Figure 6 shows the distribution of the facility-level utilization rates separately for residential and hospital inpatient beds. Approximately 68 percent of the facilities with residential beds were at or near capacity on the reference date. In contrast, 44 percent of the facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range.

October 1, 2000



CHAPTER 4

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes key characteristics of L clients in substance abuse treatment on October 1, 2000. Clients in treatment are defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential clients receiving treatment (and not discharged) on the reference date, and 2) outpatient clients who received treatment during the prior month and are still enrolled on the reference date. The major breakdowns used in this chapter are the two facility descriptors, ownership and primary focus. Ownership indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government (Federal, State, local, or tribal). Primary focus indicates the type of services the facility primarily focuses on: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; general health care; both substance abuse and mental health services: or other.

Clients by Facility Ownership and Primary Focus

Table 4.1. Two-thirds of all clients in treatment on October 1, 2000 were in a facility focused on substance abuse treatment. An additional 23 percent were in a facility focused on treatment of both substance abuse and mental health. Approximately 6 percent of clients were in mental health facilities, while an additional 3 percent were in facilities with a general health care focus.

Fifty-five percent of all clients in treatment on October 1, 2000 were in private non-profit facilities. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 24 percent of substance abuse clients. The remaining 20 percent of clients were in government-owned facilities; more than half of these clients were in local government-owned facilities.

Clients by Type of Care

Tables 4.2a, 4.2b, and 4.2c. The 2000 N-SSATS requested data on clients in treatment on October 1, 2000 who received:

- outpatient treatment services (non-intensive outpatient care, intensive outpatient care, out patient detoxification, and day treatment/par tial hospitalization program);
- residential treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification);
- ♦ hospital inpatient treatment (rehabilitation and detoxification).

The large majority of clients (89 percent) were enrolled in some type of outpatient care: non-intensive outpatient care (74 percent); intensive outpatient care (12 percent); partial hospitalization (2 percent); or outpatient detoxification (1 percent). Nine percent of clients were in residential rehabilitation. The remaining three categories (residential detoxification, hospital inpatient rehabilitation, and hospital inpatient detoxification) together accounted for 2 percent of clients.

Across the four main types of primary focus, 87 percent to 94 percent of substance abuse clients were receiving some type of outpatient care (non-intensive, intensive, detoxification, or partial hospitalization). Facilities with a primary focus of substance abuse treatment had the largest proportion of clients in residential care (12 percent in either residential rehabilitation or detoxification).

Clients by Substance Abuse Problem Treated

Table 4.3. On October 1, 2000, nearly half (48 percent) of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Twenty-nine percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, while the remaining 23 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only.

Private for-profit facilities did not follow this general pattern, demonstrating less disparity between the proportion of clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse (39 percent) and drug abuse alone (37 percent). Department of Defense-owned facilities and tribal government-owned facilities had the largest percentages of clients being treated for alcohol abuse alone (72 percent and 43 percent, respectively). Indian Health Service facilities had the largest proportion of substance abuse clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse (69 percent).

Generally, half of clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, regardless of the facility's primary focus. Facilities focused on substance abuse treatment had the lowest proportion of clients being treated for both alcohol and drugs (47 percent) and the highest proportion for drug only (34 percent). Among general health care focused facilities, the proportion of clients in treatment for drugs alone or alcohol alone was similar (24 percent and 26 percent, respectively). Facilities with a mental health focus or substance abuse and mental health focus both had roughly 20 percent of clients in treatment for drug abuse only and approximately 30 percent in treatment for alcohol abuse only.

Clients Receiving Opioid Substitutes

Table 4.4. Facilities were asked whether they dispensed the opioid substitutes methadone and LAAM and, if so, how many clients received them.

Nine percent (1,215 facilities) of all facilities reported dispensing opioid substitutes. Nearly half (46 percent) of all facilities that dispensed opioid substitutes were private non-profit, with an additional 39 percent private for-profit. Three-quarters of facilities providing opioid substitutes had substance abuse as their primary focus. Another 13 percent of facilities had substance abuse and mental health as their primary focus.

Overall, 178,212 clients in treatment (18 percent) were reported to be receiving either methadone or LAAM. Of the two, methadone was given to 97 percent of clients receiving an opioid substitute.

Almost half of clients (45 percent) receiving opioid substitutes were treated at private non-profit facilities and 43 percent were treated at private for-profit facilities. In terms of primary focus, 91 percent of clients were treated in facilities with a substance abuse focus. An additional five percent were treated in facilities focused on both substance abuse and mental health.

Facilities that dispensed opioid substitutes tended to specialize in this form of treatment; 77 percent of their clients received methadone or LAAM. In private facilities that dispensed opioid substitutes, the overwhelming majority of clients received these drugs (93 percent of clients in for-profit facilities and 75 percent of clients in non-profit facilities).

Of all facilities that dispensed opioid substitutes, those with a primary focus on substance abuse treatment had the largest proportion (83 percent) of clients receiving these drugs. The remaining facilities that dispensed opioid substitutes had between one-third and one-half of their clients receiving these drugs, depending on primary focus (33 percent for facilities with a mental health focus and 49 percent for facilities that focused equally on substance abuse and mental health).

CHAPTER 5

STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility data by State or jurisdiction. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

Table 5.1 details the 2000 N-SSATS survey response rate. The number of treatment facilities and clients in each State or jurisdiction is summarized in Table 5.2. Table 5.3 presents the number of clients in treatment by substance abuse problem and the number in treatment per 100,000 population (aged 12 or older) for the 50 States and the District of Columbia. Tables 5.4 to 5.14 provide State-level detail on tables presented in earlier chapters and will not be discussed.

Survey Response

Table 5.1. The overall response rate for the survey was 94 percent. For the 50 States and the District of Columbia, the response rate ranged from 90 percent for Texas to 100 percent for Wyoming. Puerto Rico, the largest of the non-State jurisdictions surveyed, had a response rate of 88 percent.

Facilities and Clients

Table 5.2. Nearly half (47 percent) of all clients in treatment on October 1, 2000 were located in eight States. New York accounted for the largest proportion of all clients at 12 percent, while California had 11 percent of all clients. In descending order, the other six States that accounted for the majority of clients were Florida, Texas, Michigan, Illinois, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population

Table 5.3. For the United States, there were 428 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 12 or older on October 1, 2000. *Figure 7* maps the rates of clients in treatment by State.

The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (208 per 100,000), followed by drug abuse only (123 per 100,000), and alcohol abuse only (96 per 100,000). While these rates can suggest the extent of the underlying substance abuse problem, they also reflect the level of resources available for treatment and should be interpreted with caution.


