OMHHE's Mission

The Office of Minority Health and Health Equity (OMHHE) aims to accelerate CDC's health impact in the U.S. population and to eliminate health disparities for vulnerable populations as defined by race/ethnicity, socio-economic status, geography, gender, age, disability status, risk status related to sex and gender, and among other populations identified to be at-risk for health disparities.

OMHHE's Priority Goals Include the Following

- Reframe eliminating health disparities as achievable.
- Facilitate the implementation of policies across CDC that promote the elimination of health disparities.
- Assure implementation of proven strategies across CDC programs that reduce health disparities in communities of highest risk.
- Advance the science and practice of health equity.
- Collaborate with national and global partners to promote the reduction of health inequalities.

Compelling evidence that race & ethnicity correlate with persistent and often increasing, health disparities among US Populations demands national attention.

The 2008 Age Adjusted

Death Rate from Diabetes is 40.5 per 100,000 persons for Blacks, more than double the rate for Whites (19.9). The rate is almost 75% higher for Al/AN's (34.5), and almost 50% higher for H/L (27.7), than for Whites (19.9).
