Global Entry Trusted Traveler Program

FACT SHEET

Global Entry is CBP's, risk-based approach to facilitate the entry of pre-approved, low-risk air travelers. It is open to U.S. citizens, nationals, lawful permanent residents, and citizens of certain other countries.

Applicants are subject to a rigorous background check and interview with a CBP officer as part of the enrollment process.

Upon approval, program members use automated kiosks to clear passport control, and are provided an expedited exit from the CBP processing area. Global Entry is a traveler's ticket to get out of line.

Global Entry is now available as a permanent program at 30 U.S. and 10 preclearance airports, reducing wait times more than 70 percent with more than 75 percent of travelers

using Global Entry processed in less than five minutes.



Participation in the Global Entry program is voluntary and requires a \$100 non-refundable application fee. Upon approval, membership is valid for five years.

There is no minimum number of trips or minimum age requirement to apply. Persons under the age of 18 who meet the general eligibility criteria must have the consent of a parent or legal guardian.

All participants must be in possession of a machine readable passport (or Permanent Resident Card, if applicable). Global Entry was developed and launched based on CBP's already popular trusted traveler programs, NEXUS, SENTRI, and FAST.

GLOBAL ENTRY CARD

Global Entry cards are Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative compliant documents for land and sea travel. Additionally these cards are valid for use at the NEXUS and SENTRI lanes coming into the United States. However, Global Entry cards are not a valid travel document for entry at a Global Entry kiosk or for entry into Canada via the NEXUS lanes or NEXUS kiosks. Any Global Entry member who wants to use the SENTRI lane on the Southwest border must register and enroll their vehicle.

CBP has partnered with TSA on this Department of Homeland Security initiative, which is designed to help TSA focus resources on higher-risk and unknown passengers while expediting the process for lower-risk and known passengers whenever possible. U.S. citizens who are members of CBP’s Global Entry, NEXUS, and SENTRI Trusted Traveler programs are eligible to participate in TSA’s Program.

Some passengers could qualify for expedited screening through U.S. airport security checkpoints via designated screening lanes. Additional potential benefits may include:

- Keeping shoes on
- Keeping 3-1-1 compliant bag in carry-on
- Leaving laptop in bag
- Leaving on light outerwear/jacket
- Leaving belt on
