Correspondence, autobiography, reports, memoranda, speeches, articles, financial and family records, clippings, printed matter, photographs, and memorabilia pertaining mainly to Woolley's political career in the Democratic Party and as a public official.

Provenance

The papers of Robert Wickliffe Woolley, journalist, politician, and public official, were given to the Library of Congress by Woolley in 1951. Additional papers were given by his daughter, Marguerite Trenholm Woolley, in 1959, and by Mrs. Clarence List in 1977. Several items of correspondence owned by Woolley were reproduced by the Library for the collection in 1952.

Processing History

The collection was processed in 1959 and expanded in 1977. The finding aid was revised in 2008.

A note concerning the Woolley Papers appeared in the Library's *Information Bulletin* 10, no. 10 (Sept. 3, 1951): 2; and in vol. 18, no. 32 (Aug. 10, 1959): 491. The material was also described in the Library of Congress *Quarterly Journal of Current Acquisitions* 9, no. 3 (May 1952): 143-144; and vol. 17, no. 3 (May 1960): 189. In 1960 the Library published *Robert W. Woolley: A Register of His Papers in the Library of Congress*.

Scope and Content Note

The papers of Robert Wickliffe Woolley (1871-1958) consist of correspondence, reports, memoranda, manuscripts of speeches and articles, the draft of an unpublished autobiography, photographs, clippings and other printed matter, financial records, and memorabilia. The material extends from 1842 to 1956, with the bulk of the papers from the period 1912-1921. The collection is organized into six series: [General Correspondence](#); [Letterpress Books](#); [Subject File](#); [Speech, Article, and Book File](#); [Miscellany](#); and [Printed Matter](#).

Nearly a third of the papers concerns the Democratic national political campaigns of 1912, 1916, and 1920, when Woolley was engaged in organizing party publicity. Another third of the material relates to his work with the Interstate Commerce Commission from 1917 to 1921. The greatest

emphasis of this portion is on the regulation of railroads during and after World War I, inquiries relating to the United States Senate Committee on Interstate Commerce, and fuel economy. The remainder of the papers is comprised of family, political, and financial correspondence, memorabilia, and printed matter. Although Woolley was a member of twelve emergency boards of the National Mediation Board, between 1945 and 1947, only a few items in the papers concern these matters. Material is also scant on the Stanley Committee for which Woolley was chief investigator into the affairs of the U.S. Steel Corporation.

“Politics Is Hell,” an unpublished autobiography, chronicles Woolley's acquaintance with the political leaders and issues during his career.

Prominent correspondents include Alben William Barkley, Louis Dembitz Brandeis, Desha Breckinridge, James M. Cox, Josephus Daniels, Edward Mandell House, William Gibbs McAdoo, George Foster Peabody, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Daniel C. Roper, Joseph P. Tumulty, Harry S. Truman, and Woodrow Wilson.

BOX 1-25	<u>General Correspondence, circa 1910-1956</u> Letters sent and received. Arranged alphabetically by name of person or topic.
BOX 26	<u>Letterpress Books, 1915-1916</u> Copies of private letters sent by Woolley while director of the U.S. Mint. Arranged chronologically within volumes.
BOX 27-40	<u>Subject File, 1908-1945</u> Correspondence, memoranda, reports, charts, maps, tabulations, and pamphlets in folders. Arranged alphabetically by subject. There is little arrangement within folders.
BOX 41-45	<u>Speech, Article, and Book File, 1907-1950</u> Handwritten, typewritten, and near-print copies of speeches, articles, statements, and press releases; also unpublished manuscript of autobiography, "Politics Is Hell." Arranged by type of material and therein chronologically.
BOX 46-49	<u>Miscellany, 1842-1955</u> Early family records, invitations, financial papers, memorabilia, photographs, and memoranda. Organized by type of material.
BOX 50-54	<u>Printed Matter, circa 1912-1950</u> Newspaper clippings, autographed books and pamphlets. Organized by type of material.

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
