Known as the “Great Compromiser,” Henry Clay of Kentucky served in both the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate. He was Speaker of the House, secretary of state, and a perennial Whig presidential candidate. During an illustrious political career that spanned almost half a century, Clay crafted three major legislative compromises in an attempt to resolve the sectional struggle threatening the Union.

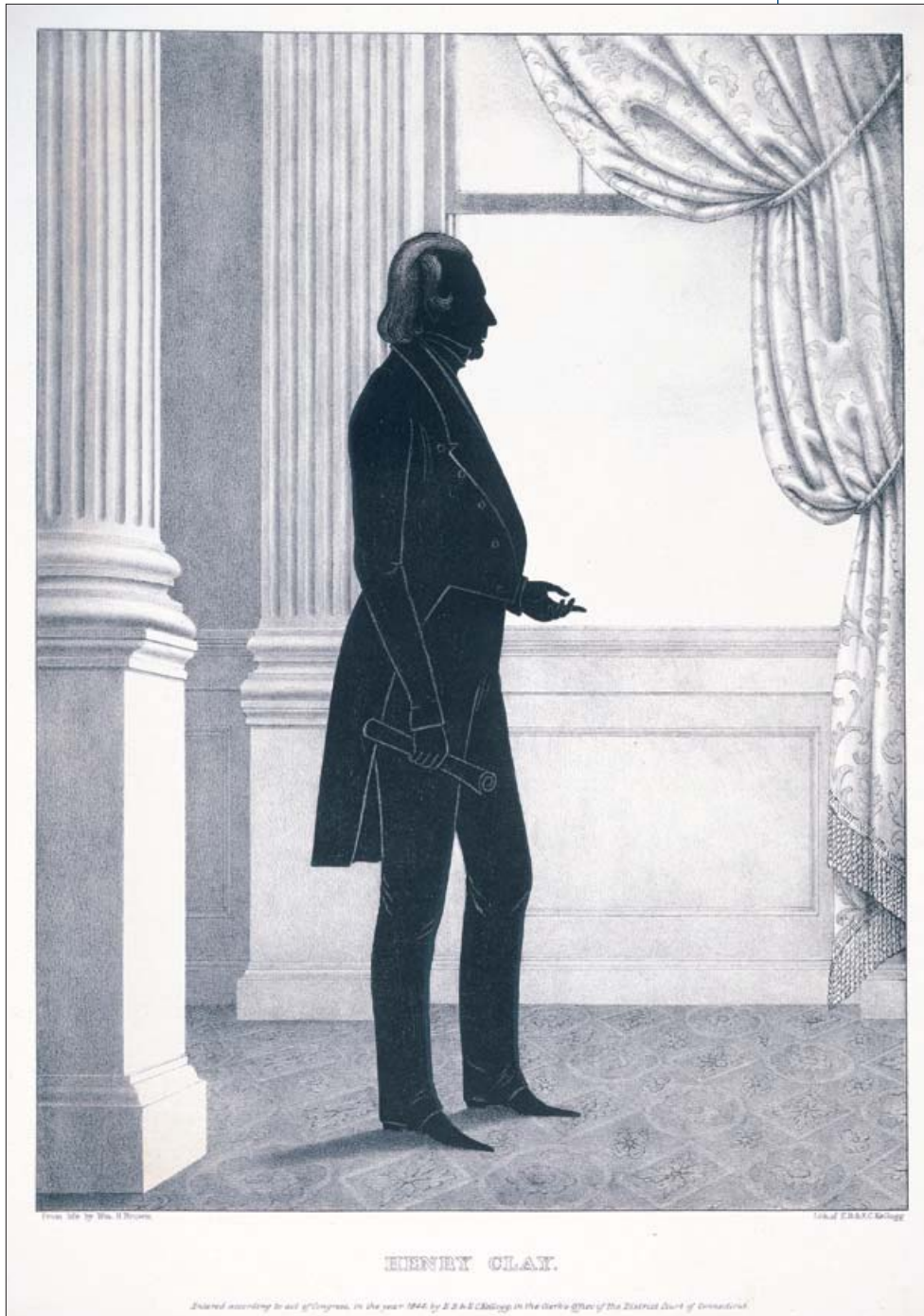
Despite the attribution to “T. Nagle” noted at the bottom of the engraving, this portrait is clearly based on a painting from life by artist John Neagle. That painting was commissioned in 1842 by the Philadelphia Whigs in anticipation of the 1844 presidential campaign. Neagle initially painted a bust portrait, then completed a full-length figure (a second version of the latter is in the U.S. Capitol). Clay complimented Neagle: “I think you have happily delineated the character, as well as the physical appearance, of your subject.”<sup>1</sup> William Warner’s engraving differs from the original painting by placing Clay in an oval porthole. This is no doubt a reference to Rembrandt Peale’s famous portrait of George Washington (see 38.00982.001, p. 159) and an attempt to associate the two great statesmen. 🌀

This lithograph is part of a series produced in 1845 by E. B. and E. C. Kellogg entitled *Portrait Gallery of Distinguished American Citizens*. The folio consisted of 26 images of notable statesmen (20 of which are in the Senate collection). The Kellogg brothers were considered rivals of Currier and Ives, producing popular, low-priced prints for direct sale to the public. The silhouette accurately depicts the 430-pound, rotund figure of Senator Dixon Hall Lewis (1802–1848) of Alabama. A strong states' rights proponent, Lewis opposed the national bank and protective tariffs and allied with John Calhoun on nullification. His excessive weight required special accommodation for his safety and comfort. He sat in a custom built chair in the Senate Chamber and, during hot summer months, Senate pages fanned Lewis for hours to keep him cool. Senate Assistant Doorkeeper Isaac Bassett wrote: "Mr. Lewis was the terror of hackmen. . . . On one occasion in town getting into a hack he broke through its floor and fell into the ground beneath it. The accident placed him in considerable peril. Had the horses been wild or scared, he might have been killed or greatly infirmed."<sup>1</sup> 🌀

**HON. JAMES A. PEARCE.**  
 UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM MARYLAND.  
 The accompanying portrait was drawn expressly for us by Hunter from a very fine photograph by J. E. M. Chan, Washington, D. C. James Alfred Pearce is of an old Maryland family, settled in that State in 1679. He was educated at Princeton College, having earned the institution at fourteen years of age, and graduated in 1812 at the age of sixteen years, with the first honors of his class. He subsequently studied law, in Baltimore, at Professor Hoffman's law school, a branch of the University of Maryland, and was admitted to practice at the bar in the State of 1816. In 1820, he visited the South, and after passing some months upon a plantation in Louisiana, returned to his native State in the autumn of 1821, and engaged in the practice of law at Chestertown, in Kent county. In 1825, however, he was elected to the legislature of Maryland, and in 1830 to Congress. In 1837, he was again elected to Congress, also in 1841, and in 1843 to the Senate of the United States, of which body he has continued to be a member to the present time. In 1850, Mr. Pearce was nominated by President Fillmore, and confirmed by the Senate, as secretary of the Interior, but, preferring to continue in the Senate, he declined the nomination. In 1852, Mr. Pearce is a moderate Whig, but he gave Mr. Buchanan a liberal support in 1850. The whole course of his public life, however, has been to a large extent disinterested, patriotic, and singularly free from sectional and partisan prejudices. There are few men in our country whom we so truly regard with every variety of feeling, and whether the subject presented to him be political or historical, physical or purely scientific, he is equally prepared to discuss it with the same views, and to express them with the most simple and exclusive moderation. Mr. Pearce has always evinced a deep interest in the promotion of our most important. In the powerful speech which he delivered in his debate, in reply to Mr. Sumner, nearly two years ago, he established beyond all doubt his position as one of our country's most distinguished orators, and he has frequently since that time excelled in his fascinating style. It is not our purpose here, and would be the limit of such a sketch as this sketch, to recount the many able and eloquent senatorial efforts of Mr. Pearce; they are upon our Congressional records, and a part of our common history. We have always thought, however, that one of his most brilliant and brilliant speeches was that made in the Senate on July 27th, 1851, shortly after the death of President Taylor, and in his debate. When the celebrated "non-protection resolutions" of Mr. Clay had been introduced, it was Mr. Pearce who thrust, impetuously and successfully, through the Senate, the bill for the re-establishment of the northern and western boundaries of Texas, which effectually settled that vexatious question, and put to rest the controversy which at that period so intensely agitated our national history. In debate Mr. Pearce is ready and fluent. His opinions are always unambiguously expressed. His style is clear and elegant, argumentative and concise, and admirably characterized by great simplicity and clarity. He invariably captures the whole subject of controversy, says nothing unnecessary, and leaves nothing necessary unsaid. Like many orators of choice, as well as modern times, Mr. Pearce has a facility for rapid improvisation, and forming. He has

from their commencement, when a lively interest in the Botanical Garden and observance of the government, and continued largely to the introduction and cultivation of new and beautiful plants, and to their dissemination over the country. His passion also is cultivated agriculture, which is usually applied to in the sections of agriculture for our national capital. And this, with his extended literary attainments, and familiar acquaintance with books in every department, rendered peculiarly appropriate, long ago, his appointment as chairman of the literary committee of the Senate, an office which he still maintains to hold. In conclusion, we sum up the character of James Alfred Pearce in the following manner: He is, in the highest sense, an accomplished gentleman, an orator to our national councils, one whose presence in the Senate gives strength to our institutions, and is a guarantee of prosperity to our Union. We add a few passages from a brief address, delivered recently by Mr. Pearce, before the Bureau of Washington City, D. C., at the celebration of the centennial anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns, on which occasion he presided as honorary chairman. "That one hundred years ago, while the clay walls of a cottage which his own father's hands had constructed, Robert Burns was born."

"Fair whose smile set on his loveliness here."

No "house of lords" was his. Few and feeble were the glories of prosperity which through a life of toil and severe struggles with poverty shrouded his peasant hall. His soul, very little to ambition, far less to guile, and tending to the avoidance of fortune. Yet, while struggling in the daily routine of labor, which may well be supposed to have been somewhat repulsive to one of his sympathies, he felt the sting of genius. His own fervid and impassioned imagination leapt and soared to him a land of song, and before he had passed the period of early manhood, he was the author of a body of poetry sufficient to itself for a national celebrity. This was not the result of a systematic pursuit of poetry as an art—a careful study of the finest models of poetic art and beauty. The poetry of Burns flowed out from the fountain of his own imagination. It was the natural overflow of a mind full of strong feeling, and of bold, original thought. He was not merely the author of beautiful literary gems, such as rising from the altar of poetic invention, but rather the painter of nature and truth—dramatizing in his mind all that appeared in his surroundings and striking particularly in that lively life, along whose rippling veins his own emotions and passions whirled. But, however he strung his harp, whether in lively lay or amid his higher notes, he was

"The reason plain of our long days here."

His poetry speaks to the hearts of men, and filled them with his own passions, which revealed to them in full beauty and tenderness, what there had only dimly seen or vaguely felt before. All this, as well as his sympathy with the people, and his self-sacrificing devotion which his verses breathe, their feelings to the poor of human grief and suffering, and his unswerving sentiment not only reflected in his noble words, but ever realized in his independent life, that

make him the favorite of the Scotch people. " \* \* \* His descriptions of natural scenery were seldom too delicate, but almost invariably fresh, vigorous, and truthful; so that in glowing poetic scenes from nature's climes, he has been fully recognized in the language here, from almost no claim, including himself below."

In the moral lyrics, he has given us an ode unaccompanied in any age, or indeed, it has ever been equalled. Burns' address to his army after the blood like the sound of a trumpet. In a few but magnificent verses he appeals to the pride of former warriors, the hope of glorious victory, the devotion of faithful patriotism, the honor of generous loyalty, the sacredness of freedom, even of the reward and the traitor's shame, and denounces of oppressor's lusts—all that regard the honor and the rights of free men upon the field of desperate conflict, magnified into a few verses, every word of which excited the human spirit with the high and bold sentiment. "To be or thine" \* \* \* "Hearth, which so early called his song forever, came but in that to prevent his meeting that potent force which he created more than wealth or honors and grandeur, love, peace and generous that unconquerable, have given to his mortal remains a being immortality, and to his name a consecrated place in the British heart. Even here, his literary and good, by the speaking words of our Allan, and in the grand potent words of our countryman, Wordsworth, he more than a century past, Scotland has been possible of intellectual development in all departments. His law contributed to the state, of which she dates but a small part, a large proportion of the men distinguished as metaphysicians, political economists, historians, biographers, critics, orators, and poets. Among them all, no one has occupied a higher place in the admiration and affection of his countrymen than Burns." Because Pearce's polished speeches are characterized by great economy, firmness and vigor of the kind ascribed by Webster Adams. He speaks "light and sweetly, fluently and aptly, always to the point, and always with effect."

This portrait of Daniel Webster is expertly rendered, yet somehow fails to capture the power and intensity of the Massachusetts senator. Webster's impassioned oratory was legendary, and it was intensified by his unforgettable physical presence. Dark in complexion, with penetrating eyes—often likened to glowing coals—he had an electrifying effect on anyone who saw him. One 19th-century journalist wrote, “The God-like Daniel. . . had broad shoulders, a deep chest, and a large frame. . . . The head, the face, the whole presence of Webster, was kingly, majestic, godlike.”<sup>1</sup>

This Webster image is part of a lithographic series of famous individuals produced by Elijah C. Middleton, of the renowned 19th-century Cincinnati lithographic firm Middleton, Strobridge and Company. The portraits were printed on embossed canvas-like paper and varnished in order to simulate an oil painting. This process was enormously popular until the early 1880s; Middleton's oil-portrait prints of Henry Clay (38.00223.001, p. 192), Stephen A. Douglas (38.00224.001, p. 198), and Andrew Jackson (38.00222.001, p. 208) are also in the Senate collection. 🌀

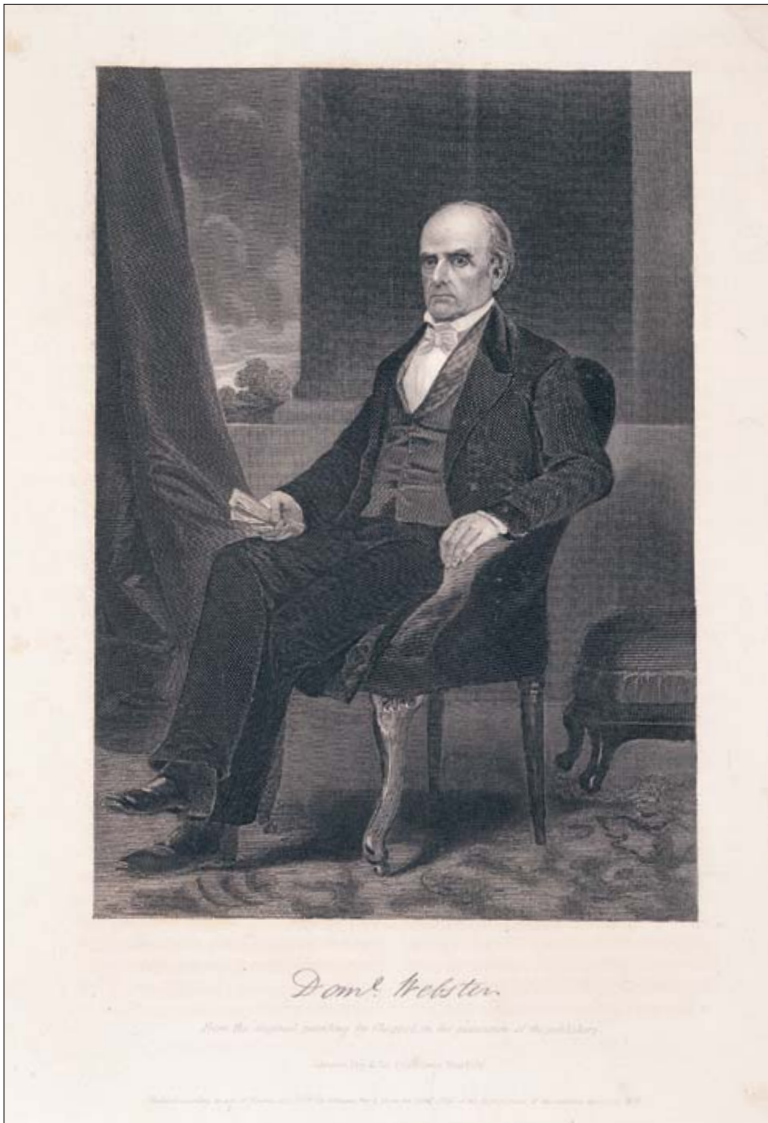

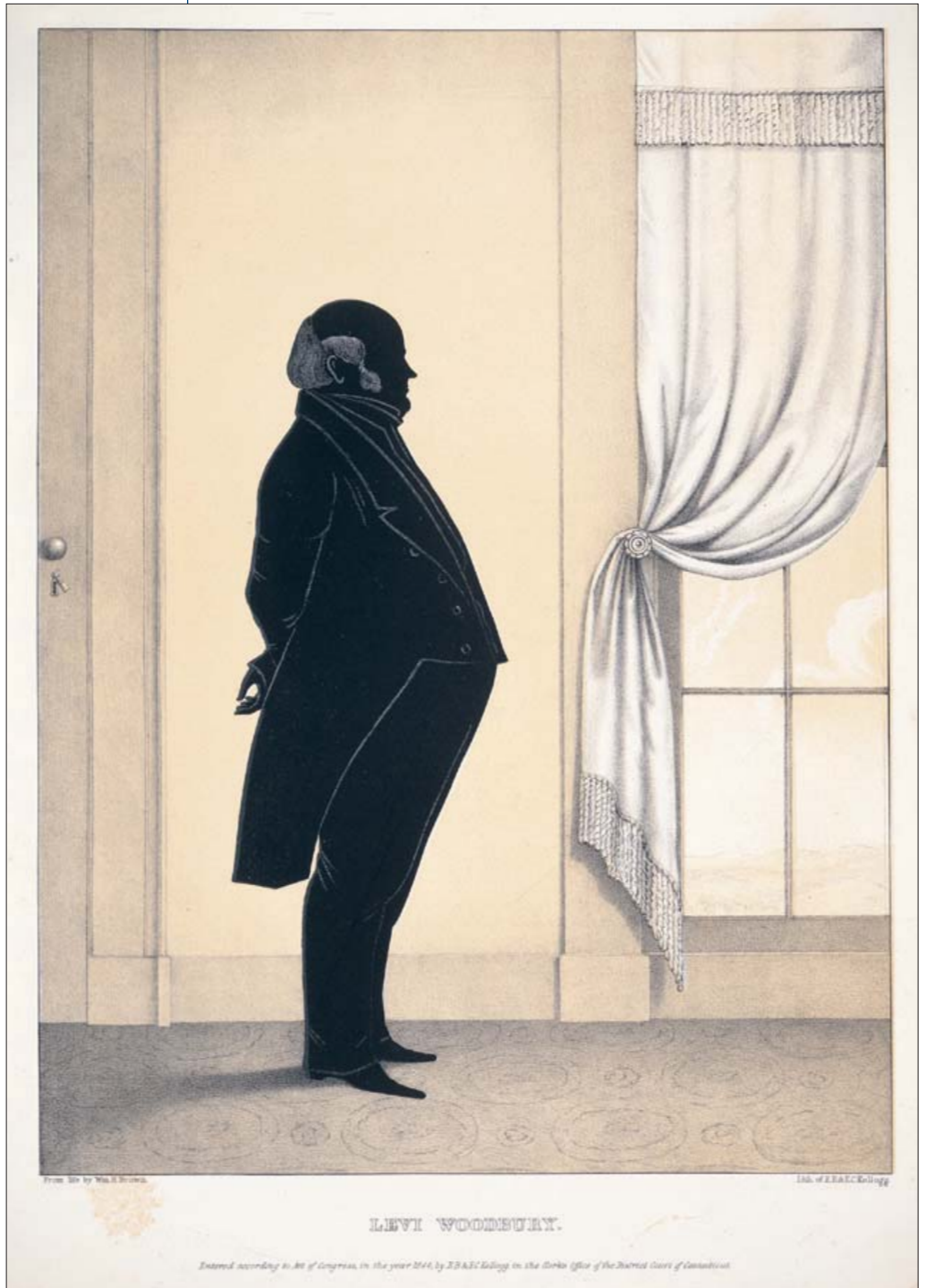

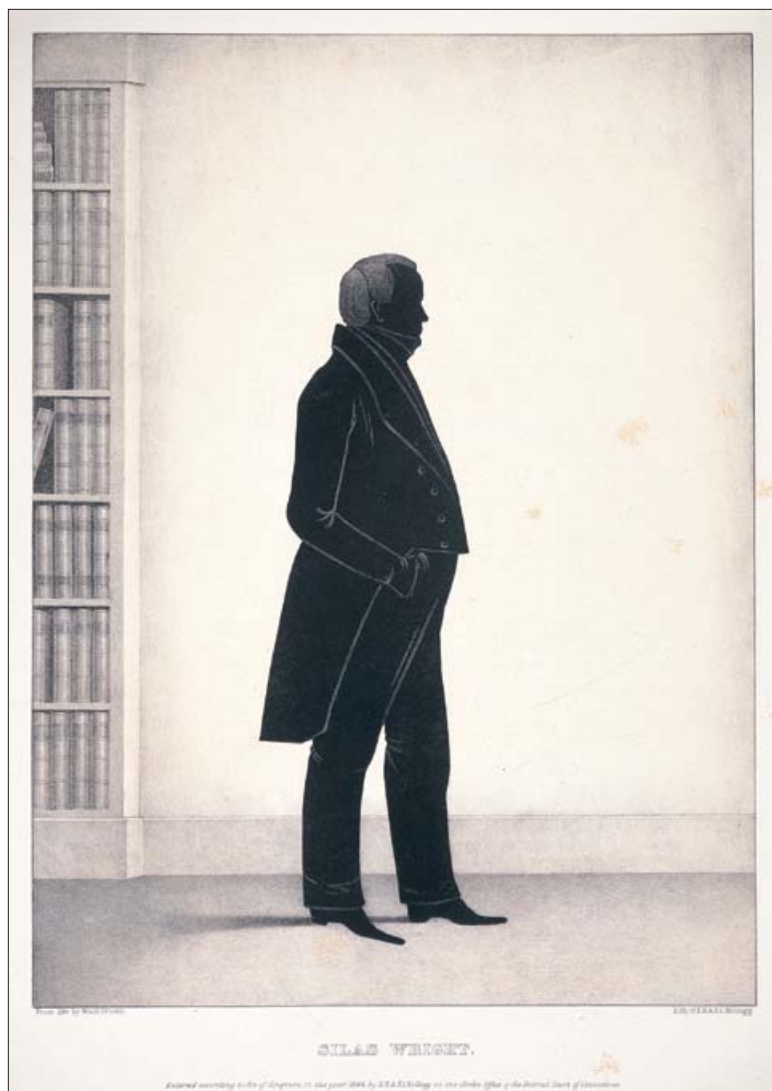

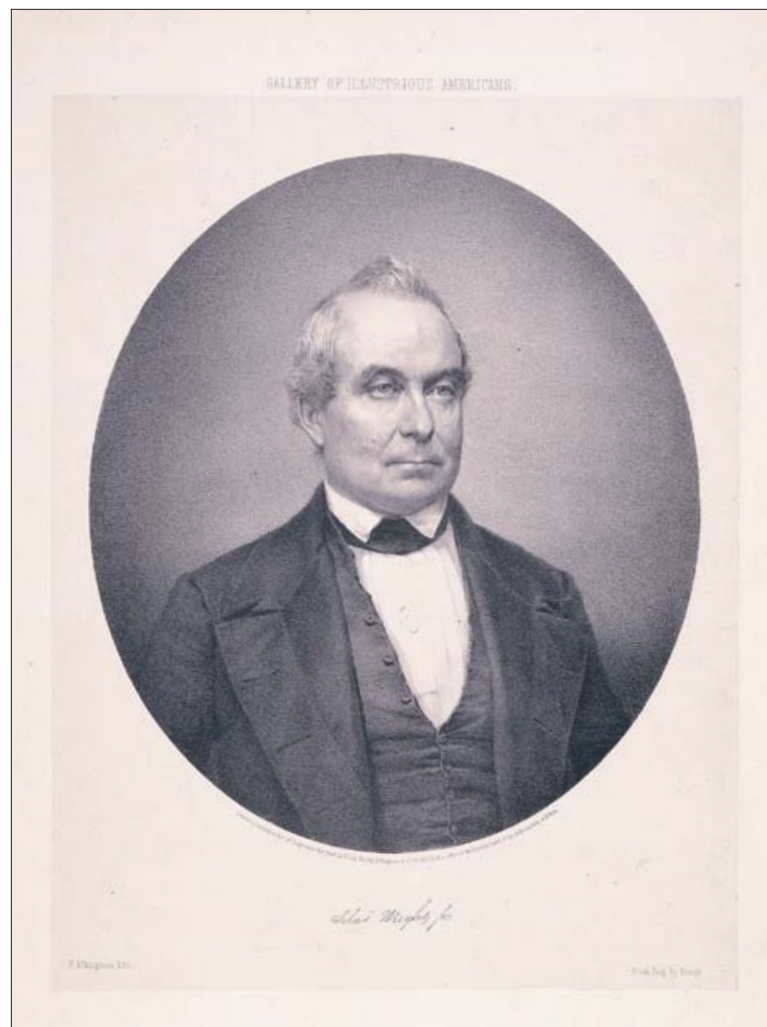
