THE "JIM CROW" LAW.

Galveston Street Cars Fitted Out Un- Reeves County Legislator Can't Get der State Law.

Galveston, Texas, July 11.—When he cars of the Galveston Electric Company are taken from the barn to-norrow they will be equipped with little signs bearing the words "For Whites' on one side and "For Colred" on the other. The effectiveness f the city ordinance on negro separaon will have gone and in its place will be the new state "Jim crow" law, passed by the last legislature and in peration from midnight tonight.

In compliance with the new law, the street car company has at an expendi-ure of several hundred dollars secured large number of little signs, and laced the necessary sockets in the ars. In the summer cars the sockets have been fastened high up on the posts, and in the winter cars over the windows. The signs are about 4x6 nches in dimensions, and fixed so that they can be placed in any socket nec essary to define the two compartments f the car. In each car will be two signs, one at each side, so that they cannot easily be overlooked by a member of either race.
