## THE "JIM CROW" LAW.

Galveston Street Cars Fitted Out Under State Law.

Galveston, Texas, July 11.—When the cars of the Galveston Electric Company are taken from the barn tomorrow they will be equipped with little signs bearing the words "For Whites" on one side and "For Colored" on the other. The effectiveness of the city ordinance on negro separation will have gone and in its place will be the new state "Jim Crow" law, passed by the last legislature and in operation from midnight tonight.

In compliance with the new law, the street car company has at an expenditure of several hundred dollars secured a large number of little signs, and placed the necessary sockets in the cars. In the summer cars the sockets have been fastened high up on the posts, and in the winter cars over the windows. The signs are about 4x6 inches in dimensions, and fixed so that they can be placed in any socket necessary to define the two compartments of the car. In each car will be two signs, one at each side, so that they cannot easily be overlooked by a member of either race.

## PEOPLE UNCONCERNED.

On the Pacific Slope There is Not Much Thought of War.

Waco, Texas, July 11.—Sheriff Geo. W. Tilley, who was recently in California on official business, was asked whether he heard much talk regarding the chances of trouble with Japan, and replied that he did not. He said that the people did not seem to think there was going to be any war, and that most of it was newspaper jingoism and boasts for a bigger navy. The general sentiment there, he stated, was that there would be no war, and that the cloud would soon pass unless those who seem to want war in this country were allowed to dominate matters.

The law will go into effect while he is between San Antonio and Pecos City.
