

(2) in the text, strike "Notwithstanding" and all that follows through "in such", and insert the following:

"No funds authorized to be appropriated under this Act may be used by any State or local educational agency to adopt policies that prevent voluntary prayer and medication in".

Amendment submitted by Mr. Sam JOHNSON of Texas:

Page 762, after line 8, insert the following: "SEC. 9508. PROHIBITION AGAINST FUNDS FOR PROTECTED PRAYER.

"Notwithstanding any provision of law, no funds made available through the Department of Education under this Act, or any other Act, shall be available to any State or local educational agency which has a policy of denying or which effectively prevents participation in, constitutionally protected prayer in public schools by individuals on a voluntary basis. Neither the United States nor any State nor any local educational agency shall require any person to participate in prayer or influence the form or content of any constitutionally protected prayer in such public schools."

¶27.29 WAIVING POINTS OF ORDER AGAINST CONFERENCE REPORT TO ACCOMPANY H.R. 1804

Mr. MOAKLEY, by direction of the Committee on Rules, reported (Rept. No. 103-447) the resolution (H.
