INTRODUCTION

The House of Representatives created the Select Committee to Investigate Foundations and Other Organizations on April 4, 1952, when it adopted, by a vote of 194 to 158, House Resolution 361, 82d Congress. The resolution, submitted on March 10, 1952, by Representative E. E. Cox, of Georgia, provided in part as follows:

"Resolved, That there is hereby created a select committee to be composed of seven Members of the House of Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker, one of whom he shall designate as chairman. Any vacancy occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made.

"The committee is authorized and directed to conduct a full and complete investigation and study of educational and philanthropic foundations and other comparable organizations which are exempt from Federal income taxation to determine which such foundations and organizations are using their resources for purposes other than the purposes for which they were established, and especially to determine which such foundations and organizations are using their resources for un-American and subversive activities or for purposes not in the interest or tradition of the United States.

"The committee shall report to the House (or to the Clerk of the House if the House is not in session) on or before January 1, 1953, the results of its investigation and study, together with such recommendations as it deems advisable."

On April 30, 1952, the Speaker of the House appointed Representatives Cox (Chairman), Brooks Hays, of Arkansas; Donald L. O'Toole, of New York; Aime J. Forand, of Rhode Island; Richard M. Simpson, of Pennsylvania; Angier L. Goodwin, of Massachusetts; and B. Carroll Reece, of Tennessee, as members of the Committee. Upon the death of Representative Cox on December 24, 1952, Representative Hays became acting chairman. Messrs. Harold M. Keale, Thomas J. Feeney, and John C. Kiger served, respectively, as general counsel, staff director, and director of research.

"In the course of its investigation the committee ... (1) sent questionnaires to more than 1,500 organizations; (2) interviewed personally more than 200 persons deemed to possess pertinent information; (3) communicated by letter or telephone with approximately 200 additional persons, many in positions of achievement and competence; (4) heard the testimony of some two score persons [public hearings were held in Washington, D. C., intermittently from November 18, 1952 to December 30, 1952]; (5) received the prepared statements of approximately 50 other persons deemed to have some knowledge of the subject; (6) studied and analyzed thousands of pages of answers of foundations submitted in response to the questionnaires; (7) studied the available literature on foundations...."

On January 1, 1953, the Cox Committee submitted its unanimous report (House Report 2514, 80th Congress, 2d session, 15 pp.), and thereupon concluded its labors. The report grouped the committee's findings and conclusions under five main headings: (1) "Number of Foundations, Their Aggregate Capital and Income"; (2) "Rate of Growth of Foundations"; (3) "The Role of the Foundations in Modern Society"; (4) "Present and Future Need of Foundations"; (5) "Criticisms of Foundations." Remedial legislation was recommended. In considering the questions implicit in the criticisms of foundations, the committee recognized

"all too clearly that which must be apparent to any intelligent observer, namely, that it was allotted insufficient time for the magnitude of its task.

"Four successive royal commissions sat over a period of 18 years while engaged in the task of investigating and reporting on 28,830 charitable trusts existing in England well over a century ago. This committee was given a similar task and directed to complete its work in the less than six months remaining after funds were appropriated for the work. It is obvious that the committee could not investigate thousands of organizations within the limitations of the time allotted. Expediency compelled focusing attention on a small segment of the whole. Individual attention was given to a small number of the largest foundations, but even here investigation could not be made with the thoroughness the committee desired.... The committee has endeavored to make as thorough a survey as time permitted. Its findings and conclusions must, under the circumstances, be general rather than specific. It has endeavored to bring into this inquiry such information as it could assemble and to apply to this information, incomplete though it is, its best judgment."

Feeling that the operations of tax exempt foundations merited further study by Congress, the House of Representatives, by a vote of 209 to 163 on July 27, 1953, agreed to House Resolution 217. The pertinent provisions of this resolution, which had been submitted on April 23, 1953, by Representative B. Carroll Reece, are:

"Resolved, That there is hereby created a special committee to be composed of five Members of the House of Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker, one of whom he shall designate as chairman. Any vacancy occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made.

"The committee is authorized and directed to conduct a full and complete investigation and study of educational and philanthropic foundations and other comparable organizations which are exempt from Federal income taxation to determine if any foundations and organizations are using their resources for purposes other than the purposes for which they were established, and especially to determine which such foundations and organizations are using their resources for un-American and subversive activities; for political purposes; propaganda, or attempts to influence legislation.

"The committee shall report to the House (or to the Clerk of the House if the House is not in session) on or before January 3, 1955, the results of its investigation and study together with such recommendations as it deems advisable....

"Upon the passage of this resolution, the Sergeant at Arms of the House is authorized and directed to ascertain the location of all books, papers, files, correspondence, and documents assembled by the former select committee under H. Res. 561, Eighty-second Congress, and take same into his custody, depositing such records with the Clerk under rule XXVII. The Clerk of the House is hereby authorized to loan such records and files to the special committee established by this resolution for the official use of the special committee during the Eighty-third Congress or until January 3, 1955, when they will be returned in accordance with said rule."

The Speaker, on August 4, 1953, appointed Representatives B. Carroll Reece, of Tennessee (chairman); Jesse P. Wolcott, of Michigan; Angier L. Goodwin, of Massachusetts; Wayne L. Hays, of Ohio; and Gracie Frost, of Idaho, as members of the Special Committee to Investigate

Tax Exempt Foundations and Comparable Organizations. Rene A. Wormser became the committee's general counsel, and Norman Dodd the research director.

It was decided that the committee should commence its work with "an intensive period of assembling and study of material," and then conduct public hearings. Accordingly, the Reece committee opened its public hearings on May 10, 1954, continued them intermittently until June 17, 1954, and, on July 1, 1954, discontinued them by a vote of 3 to 2 in an executive meeting. However, interested foundations were thereafter allowed to submit for inclusion in the transcript of the hearings sworn ex parte statements if they deemed it fit to answer, or add to, what had been entered in the committee's record.

The Reece committee formally wound up its activities on December 16, 1954, when it presented its report (House Report 2681, 83d Congress) containing majority and minority versions of the results of its study and investigation. The majority, composed of Representatives E. Carroll Reece, Jesse P. Wadsworth, Angier L. Goodwin, presented their findings and conclusions under these headings (pp. 1-222): (1) "Prefatory Notes and Summary of Findings"; (2) "The Power of the Large Foundation"; (3) "The Concentration of Power -- The Interlocks"; (4) "The Foundations and Research in the Social Sciences"; (5) "The Political Activities of Foundations"; (6) "Foundations and Education"; (7) "'Internationalism' and the Effect of Foundation Power on Foreign Policy"; (8) "Communism and Subversion"; (9) "Some Supplemental Comments"; (10) "Special Recommendations Not Fully Covered by the

Previous Text." Added to the report of the majority was an appendix (pp. 227-416) and a supplemental statement of Representative B. Carroll Reese (pp. 223-226). On the other hand, the findings and conclusions of the minority, composed of Representatives Wayne L. Hays and Gracie Frost, were submitted under seven headings (pp. 421-432): (1) "Pre-judgement"; (2) "The 'factual' basis for the majority report"; (3) "The denial of a fair hearing to the foundations"; (4) "The nature of the public hearings"; (5) "The report"; (6) "What the report should be"; and (7) "Conclusion."

The records described in this inventory, amounting to approximately 55 cubic feet, are the records, in the National Archives, of the special committees created by the House of Representatives in the 82d and 83d Congresses, sometimes known, respectively, as the Cox Committee, and the Reese Committee, to investigate tax-exempt foundations and similar organizations. No person may have access to, or receive information from, these records without the express permission of the House of Representatives. The records of the two committees are part of Record Group 233, Records of the United States House of Representatives.

RECORDS OF THE COX COMMITTEE, 82D CONGRESS

"QUESTIONNAIRE (FORM A)" OCT. 1952-DEC. 1952. 4 ft.

A printed questionnaire denominated "Form A," consisting of 5 pages, was sent to hundreds of foundations with individual assets of less than \$10,000,000., to elicit answers to 22 queries. The text of this questionnaire is printed in toto in the Hearings of the Committee, pp. 753-755. This series of records comprises most of the executed questionnaires and, in addition, some accompanying supplemental documents; the rest of the questionnaires were set up in a special file (see entry 2). For additional related records, see entries 2, 4, and 6. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization.

"SPECIAL FILE" OF QUESTIONNAIRES (FORM A). OCT. 1952-DEC. 1952. 1 ft. 2

These executed questionnaires were segregated from the general mass of completed questionnaires "Form A," set up in an alphabetical arrangement, and denominated "Special File," because of especial interest to the committee. For a list of the folder titles of this series, see Appendix A. For related records, see entries 1, 4, and 6.

"LARGE QUESTIONNAIRE (FORM A)" OCT 1952-DEC. 1952. 3 ft. 3

This series comprises the replies (together with some accompanying documents) to the elaborate questionnaire styled "Large Questionnaire (Form A)," sent to foundations with individual assets of \$10,000,000 or more. Numbering 17 pages, and divided into 9 sections respectively labeled A to I, inclusive, the questionnaire is reproduced in full in the committee's Hearings, pp. 747-753. For a list of the titles of the records of this series, see Appendix B.

"LARGE QUESTIONNAIRE (FORM B)" OCT. 1952-JAN. 1953. 4 ft. 4

This series encompasses the replies (along with some accompanying documents) to an additional questionnaire sent to a selected group of organizations that received a large part of their funds from foundations. Identified as "Large Questionnaire (Form B)," the questionnaire, consisting of 7 pages, and divided into 4 sections respectively labeled A to D, inclusive, is printed in toto in the committee's Hearings, pp. 755-758. Included in this series are some replies to "Questionnaire (Form A))." For a list of the folder titles of this series, see Appendix C; see entries 1, 2, and 6 for related records.

"DEAD FILE." OCT. 1952-JAN. 1953. 2 ft. 5

This category of records is composed of the executed questionnaires (Form A), together with some related documents, of organizations which the committee excluded from its investigation because it deemed that their purposes were solely religious, medical, etc. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization.

"EXTRA COPIES" OF "QUESTIONNAIRE (FORM A)." OCT. 1952-DEC. 1952. 9 ft. 6

The committee instructed the recipients of "Questionnaire (Form A)" to return "THREE (3) copies of the completed questionnaire ... within 10 days after receipt"; this series comprises the duplicate, or carbon, copies of the executed questionnaires. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization. For the original, or ribbon, copies of these questionnaires, see entries 1, 2, and 4.

PERSONNEL RECORDS. APRIL 1952-DEC. 1952. 4 in. 1

In the main, the personnel records consist of applications for employment, of supporting documents, and of correspondence and

memoranda documenting personnel actions. Arranged alphabetically.

"MISCELLANEOUS CORRESPONDENCE" APRIL 1952-JAN. 1953. 1 ft. 8

In this segment of records labeled "Miscellaneous Correspondence," are found correspondence of the chairman, and of Mr. Keele, regarding the committee's agenda; correspondence with citizens commenting on the investigation, suggesting areas for investigation, volunteering information for the record of the committee, or requesting copies of its publications; staff investigative memoranda; administrative records; press releases; and statements of witnesses prepared for inclusion in the committee's record. For a list of the folder titles of the records in this series, see Appendix D. See entry 9 for related records.

"MAIN FILE." AUG. 1952-DEC. 1952. 1 ft. 2

The "Main File" is composed of correspondence and memoranda of the chairman and of the general counsel, of investigative reports and memoranda, and of informational materials, relating almost exclusively to more than 100 foundations. These records are arranged according to a numerical classification scheme, for the nature of which see Appendix E. For similar records, see also entry 8.

"PERSONAL FILE." NOV. 1952-JAN. 1953. 1 ft. 10

In the course of its investigation and study, the committee called upon the House Un-American Activities Committee for information concerning the loyalty of certain individuals and organizations. The "Personal File" consists mostly of reports from this standing committee, supplying the requisite information. Arranged alphabetically by name of individual or organization.

"REPLIES FROM SELECTED FOUNDATIONS." DEC. 1953-APR. 1954. 3 ft.

In December 1953 certain foundations were queried concerning their "grants made" and the "operating expenditures" incurred by them in 1953 and in certain preceding years. This segment of the records comprise the replies (correspondence and reports) of the foundations.

"QUESTIONNAIRE ON FOUNDATION SUPPORT OF LEARNED JOURNALS." JAN. 1954-APRIL 1954. 3 in.

In the early part of 1954 the Reece committee sent to publishers of learned journals a questionnaire designed to elicit specific information concerning the financial support received from foundations. The questionnaire, among other things, sought facts on these topics: ownership and sponsorship of the journals, the enjoyment of an exemption status under the Federal income tax law, circulation, advertising, compensation of contributors, and the employment of editorial advisory boards. This series of records is composed of the duly returned questionnaires, which, in some cases, are accompanied by supplemental documents, besides correspondence with the recipients of the questionnaire. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization.

"QUESTIONNAIRE ON FOUNDATION SUPPORT OF THE MEMBERS OF THE ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN COLLEGES." JAN. 1954-APR. 1954. 1½ in.

To enable it to form "conclusions about the manner in which certain types of schools are favored or ignored in the granting of financial support by tax exempt educational and charitable funds," the Reece Committee, in January 1954, sent to certain institutions of higher learning a questionnaire devised to produce facts on the following points: number of faculty members; number of administrative personnel; number of years in operation; number of students enrolled; number and types of degrees conferred from 1952 to 1953; religious affiliation;

character of student body, i.e., male only, female only, coeducational, nonsegregated racially, white, negro. This file contains most of the returned questionnaires, together with some accompanying correspondence. For related documents, see also entry 21. Arranged alphabetically by name of organization.

TRANSCRIPT OF THE COMMITTEE'S HEARINGS. MAY 1954-AUG. 1954. 1 ft.

The stenographic transcript of the proceedings in the meetings and hearings of the committee, held intermittently from May 10, 1954 to August 30, 1954. 18 parts (volumes).

"MISCELLANEOUS CORRESPONDENCE" (SMALLER GROUP). JULY 1953-MAY 1954. 1 ft.

The records of the Reese Committee include two separate and complete correspondence files, each alphabetically arranged by the names of correspondents. Both, however, have been labeled by the committee's staff "Miscellaneous Correspondence," but they can be differentiated by their relative volume. Accordingly, the terms "smaller group" and "larger group" have been arbitrarily applied to distinguish the two files. This file consists, in general, of correspondence with private individuals or organizations, commenting on the investigation of the committee, suggesting areas of investigation, volunteering information and documents for the record, or requesting copies of publications. Also, among these records is some correspondence of the chairman, and of the research director, relating to the agenda of the committee. For related records, see entries 21, 22, and 24. Alphabetically arranged.

FILES OF THOMAS McHIECE. JAN. 1954-MAY 1954. 6 in.

These papers, resulting from the work of Thomas McHiece as Assistant Research Director, consist, in the main, of research data, and of memoranda from or to him. Arranged alphabetically.

FILES OF KARL E. HETTINGER. OCT. 1953-APRIL 1954. 2 ft.

Besides correspondence and memoranda respecting the agenda of the committee, and informational materials (including newspaper clippings), the files of Karl E. Hettinger, resulting from his activities as research consultant to the committee, include the completed questionnaires which the committee had sent in January 1954 to university presses. Among other things, this questionnaire sought information on the status of the university presses under the Federal income tax law; on the number of titles published by them between 1950 and 1953; on the number of titles suitable for publication that, however, were not published in that period because of the want of funds; and on direct and indirect financial support received from tax exempt foundations from 1920 to 1953. In addition, the files of Mr. Hettinger comprise some completed questionnaires of the type described in entry 17. For related records, see also entries 17, 19, 22, and 24. Arranged alphabetically.

"MISCELLANEOUS CORRESPONDENCE" (LARGER GROUP). JULY 1953-NOV. 1954. 4 ft.

ADMINISTRATIVE RECORDS. SEPT. 1953-DEC. 1954. 10 in. 24

The administrative records comprise staff correspondence and memoranda, press releases, payroll and other personnel records, progress reports, housekeeping files, informational materials, several prints of House Report 2514, 83d Congress, 2d session, and two prints of House Report 2681, 83d Congress, 2d session.
