HOSTING CORNER

MONTGOMERY, AL – In late February, the Open World Leadership Center welcomed its second delegation from the Youth Parliament of Kazakhstani for a program on youth in government. Though an NGO, this unique Kazakhstani organization works closely with the national parliament and has the authority to introduce and help shape youth-related legislation. (In Open World countries, "youth" encompasses young people up to age 30.) The youth parliament delegates traveled to Alabama after an intensive program in Washington, DC, during which they met with Rep. Martha Roby (AL) and DC-area young professionals. While in their host community of Montgomery, the Kazakhstanis attended the Alabama Collegiate Legislature program, a model of an actual legislative session. The delegates were impressed by the enthusiasm with which participants discussed bills on the "floor." The Kazakhstanis also met with Montgomery Mayor Todd Strange to explore how Alabama cities involve youth in government, and visited NGOs that serve youth.
