

- Feedback requested on areas of interest
- Research program
  - Benchmark UI with Census 2000
  - Estimate foreign born population using UI worker data


#### **Immigrant Workers**

Age Distribution by Place of Birth (Illinois 2000)




#### Firms Where Immigrants Work

### UI Compared with Census 2000

Native totals virtually identical. Immigrant UI totals about 10% less than Census 2000.



### Immigrant Workforce Dynamics

 Immigrants are significantly more mobile than natives (Minnesota 2000)



#### Conclusion

- UI and Census 2000 both have very broad coverage of the labor market
- Census Bureau resources add useful demographic detail to UI data
- UI Census partnership will greatly improve our understanding of the foreign born
