







AIDS 2012 Update: Latest PEPFAR Results

The United States is committed and will remain committed to achieving an AIDS-free generation.

Since Secretary Clinton announced the goal of an AIDS-free generation and President Obama set new targets for PEPFAR on World AIDS Day 2011, the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) has been working to put us on the path to an AIDS-free generation. PEPFAR is focusing on "combination prevention" including condoms, counseling and testing, and special emphasis on three core interventions: treatment as prevention, voluntary medical male circumcision, and stopping the transmission of HIV from mothers to children.

Latest PEPFAR Program Results

- Supporting nearly **4.5 million** people on treatment, an increase of nearly **600,000** in the first half of fiscal year 2012 (through March 2012), putting PEPFAR on track to meet the President's goal of treating **6 million people by the end of 2013**;
- Supporting more than 400,000 male circumcision procedures in the first half of FY 2012; and
- Reaching more than **370,000** HIV-positive pregnant women with antiretroviral drugs to prevent mother-to-child transmission in the first half of fiscal year 2012, putting PEPFAR on track to meet its target of reaching an additional **1.5 million women by the end of 2013**.
- PEPFAR directly supported HIV testing and counseling for more than **40 million** people in fiscal year 2011, providing a critical entry point to prevention, treatment and care.
- The U.S. is the first and largest donor to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. To date, the U.S has provided more than \$7.1 billion to the Fund.

Secretary Clinton announced:

- \$80 million to support innovative approaches that ensure HIV-positive pregnant women get the treatment they need to protect themselves, their babies, and their partners;
- \$40 million to support South Africa's plans to provide voluntary medical male circumcisions for almost half a million boys and men in the coming year;
- \$15 million for implementation research to identify the specific interventions that are most effective for reaching key populations;
- \$20 million to launch a challenge fund that will support country-led plans to expand services for their key populations; and
- \$2 million investment in the Robert Carr Civil Society Networks Fund to bolster the efforts of civil society groups in addressing key populations.
