John D. Hawke, Jr. Confirmed by U.S. Senate For Full Term as Comptroller of the Currency

Mr. Hawke, the 28th Comptroller of the Currency, has held the office since December 8, 1998, after being appointed by President Clinton during a Congressional recess. The Comptroller is Administrator of the national banking system.

remain strong."
