

Disabled American Veterans Donate Two Vans to VAIHCS

The Disabled American Veterans (DAV) recently donated a 12 passenger van and a 7 passenger van. The two vans will transport Veterans to and from their appointments at the VA hospital in Danville, Illinois. The 12 passenger van will be utilized to transport Veterans from Decatur, Illinois to Danville. Seven volunteer drivers coordinate the trips that are made on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Last year there were 147 trips made for 805 Veterans for a total of 25,425 miles. The 7 passenger van will be utilized to transport Veterans from Robinson, Illinois to Danville on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Three volunteer drivers coordinate the trips that last year saw 134 trips for 298 Veterans for a total of 24,218 miles.

The DAV has a Transportation Coordinator, Bob Barrett, who coordinates these trips as well as others. Barrett

works with the volunteer drivers and Veterans to see that they get transportation when needed so they can make their appointments.

The Poker Run started and ended at the Friendly Tavern. VAIHCS will use this to purchase clothing for their clothing room that is utilized to provide clothes for Veterans needing it. VAIHCS will purchase all the clothes from stores in the Danville area. The 40 & 8 will utilize the money they received for nursing scholarships, which will be kept locally as well, being used at either the Lakeview School of Nursing or the Danville Area Community College.

Proposal for the Annual Controlled Substance Inspection (CSI) Award Program

The Annual CSI Award Program year begins on July 1 of the current year and ends on June 30 of the succeeding year. Since 2012 will be the first year of the award program, the criterion requiring the CSI is active for more than six months is waived for 2012 only. Also, all retired CSI's whose appointments expired six months prior to July 1 are eligible for the award. All other criterion remains applicable.

A combined award and CSI conference will

take place in July. The conference portion of the program will include educational presentations and a question & answer session. Speakers will be invited to participate by discussing the controlled substance program from the viewpoint of their area of expertise.

Award Amount:

The 2012 Annual CSI Award Amount will be \$250.00. The amount for succeeding years will vary, depending upon the availability of funds. However, there will always be an annual award for qualifying CSI inspectors.

Qualifying Criteria:

- Must have been an active CSI more than six months of the award program year.
- Must have satisfactorily completed at least 4 inspections.
- Must have completed the annual TMS "Controlled Substance Inspection Certification" module in a timely manner, and provided a copy of the "Certificate of Completion" to the Controlled Substance Coordinator.
- Must have received a satisfactory Annual and/or Initial Competency Assessment.
- Must have addressed all inspections in a timely and accurate manner.

Disqualifying Criteria:

- If the inspector resigns his/her position prior to the end of the current award program year, the inspector no longer qualifies for the monetary award. Expired appointments are not considered resignations.
- If the inspector's Annual Competency Assessment is less than satisfactory, he/she does not qualify for the award.
- If the inspector fails any of the other qualifying criteria, he/she does not qualify for the "Annual CSI Award Program".


