Although FMCSA

Thousands of Americans die or suffer serious injuries in motor vehicle crashes because of failure to wear safety belts. In 2008, 578 drivers of large trucks died in crashes – 229 were not wearing safety belts. However, most recent studies found that safety belt usage among drivers of medium- and heavy-duty commercial vehicles has risen to 72%. Through outreach campaigns and continued commitment from the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety (CMV) Belt Partnership, we've achieved great success.

We want to thank you for your outstanding commitment and support in helping FMCSA achieve our goal - to reduce crashes, injuries and fatalities involving large trucks and buses. Without you and your participation, we can not succeed.

America's Road Team Captain Shares Life Story to Promote Safety Belt Usage

I've been a professional truck driver my entire life – starting back in 1974. Many things have changed on our highways and in my truck since that time, but the most encouraging change is the different mentality I see when it comes to safety belts.

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Back then trucks had no power steering, no air ride, and because there was no air conditioning, we drove with the windows down. Not too many people wore safety belts – myself included. That changed the day I jack-knifed and rolled my truck three times. I was totally banged up and bruised. I was lucky to escape without too severe of injuries, but I would've been a lot better off had I been wearing my safety belt. From that day on, I've faithfully worn my safety belt for every ride.

Today, I see more people wearing safety belts – and I attribute that to education and outreach programs aimed at reaching young drivers and professional truck drivers. With my work as an America's Road Team Captain, I am able to reach kids directly at school and share real life examples of how safety belts have saved, or perhaps could have saved, lives. I do the same thing when I'm at a truck show or when I see a professional truck driver leaving the yard without a safety belt on.

Kids sometimes see safety belts as a bit of an inconvenience. But my friend's daughter recently flipped her vehicle and she walked away from that accident safely. Unfortunately, I have also had the pain of losing a niece to an accident in which she may have still been with us today had she been wearing her safety belt.

When I'm working at a high school with new drivers I often ask, "Can anyone here see into the future? If you could see 30 seconds down the road and saw that you were going to have an accident, would you put your safety belt on? Then why not put it on every time you get in the car? You can't predict the future – so why not do everything you can to prepare for it."

I have traveled from coast to coast and picked up many great driving tips and techniques over the years. But I can honestly say, the best driving technique you can perform is to buckle your safety belt before you start your vehicle.



Trucker Safety Belt Use at All Time High

Safety belt use among commercial motor vehicle drivers reached an all-time high last year, according to the 2008 Seat Belt Usage by Commercial Motor Vehicle Drivers Survey, a national survey sponsored by the FMCSA. The study found a record high 72 percent of truck drivers now wear their safety belts, compared to 65 percent just one year ago.

The FMCSA announced results at Love's Travel Stop in Richmond Hill, Georgia, as part of an effort to congratulate truckers on their achievement, and to encourage more drivers to buckle up.

"Professional truck drivers know the hazards of the road. Long-haul drivers average over 100,000 miles per year, and regional and city drivers about half that amount. These men and women know that safety belts save lives," said FMCSA Field Administrator Darrell L. Ruban. "We are pleased to report that nearly three out of four truck drivers are buckling up. This is good news for these drivers, their families, and their friends. Drivers who are buckled up are far less likely to be injured or killed in a crash." Continued on page 3

Nearly 40 percent of unbelted truck driver fatalities could be prevented with safety belt use, and up to 70 percent of moderate injuries to drivers could be reduced or eliminated by the proper use of a safety belt.

As a part of the "Be Ready. Be Buckled." campaign, new promotional materials tagged "Safety Belts – A Way of Life!" was unveiled at the event. Major Wayne Beck of the Georgia Department of Public Safety pledged his full support for the new campaign, while noting: "Your chances of surviving a serious traffic crash are greatly increased when you are wearing a safety belt. Lives are saved, injuries are greatly reduced, medical expenses are lowered, and drivers are able to return to work more quickly."


