General Description of Your Program	The East Texas SEARCH Project will focus on the intermediate-term components of the ARRC model. We will use our best practices and develop new approaches to more finely focus on building community-academic linkages to foster primary health care and allied health student and residents multidisciplinary team experience in underserved communities. Our established partnerships with Texas Association of Community Health Centers (PCA), Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) Office of Primary Care (PCO), Office of Rural Community Affairs – State Office of Rural Health (ORH), all eight of the State's academic health science centers and around 18 other campuses with health science schools/ programs will be enhanced by the East Texas SEARCH Project to strengthen the Texas network's ability.
Goals and Objectives	 Objective 1. Academic Partners - Engage academic partners to incorporate care of the underserved into curricular offerings through traditional required courses, elective courses, and new innovative courses, from among the Texas medical schools, graduate nursing programs, physician assistant programs, dental schools, dental hygienist programs, social work and counseling programs, as demonstrated by offering primary care clinical rotations in underserved populations. Objective 2. Training Sites Partners - Recruit clinical training sites from among the Texas federally designated and other underserved clinical services sites with appropriate learning opportunities to serve as multidisciplinary educational environments for primary care and allied health professions learners. Objective 3. Students and Residents - Recruit students and residents from among the specified SEARCH primary care and allied health

	professions programs that are more likely to select serving underserved populations as part of their career choices to participate in the enhanced learning opportunities of the SEARCH program. Objective 4. AHEC SEARCH Infrastructure - Develop the resources and processes to support enhanced learning opportunities of the SEARCH program utilizing the nine regional centers of the East Texas AHEC program as the primary linkage between academic health science programs and underserved clinical training sites.
Activities undertaken by Students/Residents in Program	 Promote service learning experiences in the communities that enhance student interaction with the community, provides learning opportunities, and results in services to the community. Foster student experience in 1)community assessment; 2) research on a specific community health problem; 3) health education, promotion and outreach; 4) survey of community resources; planning, organization; and 5) coordination of public health interventions (e.g., health screening, smoking cessation, and immunization programs), 6) increase skills and commitment to serving the underserved Foster student experience in critical-skills development, leadership development, other aspects of service-linked training opportunities, trends in healthcare settings, healthcare delivery effectiveness, interdisciplinary teams, Electronic Health Record (EHR), and Health Disparities Collaborative strategies.
Coordination	 Coordinate student placements in underserved training sites of at least 40 rotations including: Facilitate access to student housing. Facilitate student travel processes. Orient student/residents to the community and community-specific cultural competency experiences to anticipate. Make at least one training site visit per student/resident rotation to assess site, student, preceptor, interdisciplinary team, and community progress and challenges.
