Guidelines for the Select Use of Expired Medical Products

This Guideline documents the NIH Intramural Research Program's recommendations for the use of expired medical products in research animals.

- 1. Non-survival procedures Items that are expired or past the sterilization "use by" date:
 - a. <u>Can be used</u> if the packaging has not been opened: intravenous fluids, sutures, supplies (*i.e.* gauze, needles, butterfly catheters), devices (*i.e.*, cardiac catheters) and surgical instruments.
 - b. <u>Cannot be used</u> *regardless* of the condition of the packaging: physiologically active drugs, "anesthesia, analgesia, emergency drugs and euthanasia drugs."¹
- 2. Survival procedures Items that are expired or past the sterilization "use by" date:
 - a. <u>Can be used</u> if they are re-sterilized and their function is not compromised: instruments and medical devices.
 - b. <u>Cannot be used</u>: all drugs, fluids, devices, instruments, sutures, etc.
