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## **FAQ: Where can I get a list of clinical trials for specific cancer diagnoses?**

**Answer:** The web site <http://www.clinicaltrials.gov> is a good source for clinical trials. ClinicalTrials.gov updates information about federally and privately supported clinical research in human volunteers regularly. ClinicalTrials.gov gives information about a trial's purpose, who may participate, locations, and phone numbers for more details. ClinicalTrials.gov currently contains approximately 62,000 clinical studies sponsored by the National Institutes of Health, other federal agencies, and private industry. Studies listed in the database are conducted in all 50 States and in more than 150 countries. Note however, that sponsors list studies that are privately funded voluntarily. So, there are privately funded studies that do not appear in the database.

Acurian is another source of clinical trials information. This is a private site, and its inclusion here does not indicate we endorse this site. You will need to examine it carefully, and determine if it is appropriate for you.

- Acurian requires patients to register, but it is free and confidential. It allows you to search by condition and location. It does not allow wild-card searches using, for example, drug names. Find this site at [acurian.com](http://acurian.com).
